





'Amendments Bring Women Suffrage and Repeal'



No. 6-

"Votes for women" had been an objective of reformers for many years, and by 1914 women had achieved the vote in 11 states. The states are still, except for certain restrictions in the Constitution, judges of who shall vote within their bor-ders. Constant parades of "Suffragettes" before the White House kept the issue in the papers, and a lively lobbying campaign was waged.







Latest of the changes in the Constitution is the 20th, ratified also in 1933. This abolished the "lame duck" sessions of Congress in which a Congress defeated at the polls sat for another session. Congressmen now take their seats within two months after election. A permanent place of exhibit awaits the original draft of the Constitution in the new Archives Building in Washington.


