



By last week end the island's modern dragon flies were swarming over Nanking, China's capital, aiming bombs at government offices but mostly hitting civilians' mud huts. Akitsushima officials told foreigners to scram and take their warships on up the Yangtze "at least 11 miles"— more raids were coming. U. S. Ambassador Johnson moved his office onto a river patrol boat for

a couple days, and America, Britain, France and Germany all urged Nippon to go easy. But Wednesday the dragon flies returned. 
