For the sake of the health of their children, mothers are urged by Elisabeth C. Nickerson, director of the Bureau of Public Health Instruction of the State Department of Health, to watch more carefully what goes into the school lunch if it is carried from home, and to lend complete cooperation with the allied lunch and health program in the schools which the children attend. At the same time, Miss Nickerson ingusted mothers to write to the Schite Department of Health for infrastion on proper nutrition. The noon-day lunch is a particular problem with high school pupils, since the school session extends over the noon period with only a short time permitted for eating. Therefore, in most instances, pupils do not have time to return home for lunch, and develop the habit of gulping their food hurriedly and of washing it down with large amounts of liquid.

This habit should be discouraged as well as that of slipping off to the nearest store to buy food of uncertain quality instead of patronizing the cafeteria service usually provided by the school. The school dictitian has the problem of providing healthful foods at low prices and failure to patronize her well chosen food may cause a deficit in the school budget, Miss Nickerson pointed out, speaking in this week's health department broadcast. The dictitian knows she must provide milk or some hot drink made with milk, some main nourishing disheither hot or cold, according to the weather, bread, rolls or sandwickes and a light dessert or fruit. Hot soups often form the main dish, since many students bring sandwiches from home and soup makes a good supplement.














