### MIDDLETOWN BRIDGE TO OPEN NEXT YEAR

#### Substructure Finished During Summer; Work Well Advanced on Superstructure and Approaches; Building Deck Large Job.

Work of constructing the biggest bridge ever built in Connecticut, the new Middletown-Portland span above the Connecticut River, has been rapidly pushed ahead during the past summer, and despite many unexpected problems which confronted engineers during the course of construction, the structure will be completed some time early next summer as originally scheduled.

August saw the substructure, including the foundations, piers, etc., entirely completed, and the superstructure has been advanced within 100 per cent of completion. Work on the approaches is also well along. The bridge will be the stable one of building the state, and will be a landmark in the history of Connecticut.

Most unique and most valuable feature of the new Middletown-Portland bridge from the viewpoint of the motorists who use it, and there will be thousands crossing the bridge every day, will be the fact that traffic will be interrupted no time. There will be no delay in getting on or off the bridge while motor traffic is delayed above.

The bridge has been built with a clearance of 93 feet above the water level, in accordance with War Department regulations, and will allow river traffic to pass beneath it. The motor traffic may flow steadily over 45-foot roadway, and the structure, building the bridge at this height was a major task.

Including its approaches built on piers on both shores of the river, the bridge will measure about 2-3/4 miles in length. The actual length of the main river spans will be 1,210 feet. The bridge will consist of two spans of equal length. The high span spans the roadway and the six-foot side-walks on both sides of it will be 104 feet above the water while the low span will rise above the water above the river. The bridge goes down below the water to almost as great a distance as it rises above it. For the maximum depth of the center pier at which the arches are tied in 110 feet below the low water mark.

The now completed substructure required 22,000 cubic yards of concrete, 24,000 cubic yards of excavation, 400 cubic yards of masonry, 40,000 barrels of cement, and 2,100 tons of steel in caissons, piling and reinforcing. Approximately 8,000 tons of steel is now spanning the river in the superstructure.

#### AWAIT DECISION ON EXTRA SESSION

Senators Minton and Thomas Ready to Press for the President's Proposals.

Washington, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Administration supporters in Congress said today they are prepared to push President Roosevelt's legislative program to quick enactment at the extra session of the regular session in January.

Senators Minton (D., Ind.), and Thomas (D., Utah), among others, indicated they would advise Mr. Roosevelt to call a special session. The President said yesterday that the extra session would be held in the latter part of the year.

Such a session would begin a new attack on prime administration objectives, among them crop control, wage-hour and child labor laws, government reorganization and creation of regional planning boards. It would begin between Nov. 8 and Nov. 16.

Senator Thomas, who is slated to head the Senate Labor committee, said he would seek enactment of the wage-hour bill in the form it passed the Senate during the last session.

The wage-hour bill, which would give labor standards board power to establish minimum wages of not more than 40 cents an hour and a maximum work week of not less than 40 hours, was steered through the Senate by Justice Hugo L. Black, then chairman of the Senate Labor committee. The measure was held up in the House by the House Agriculture committee to get the Oppose Change.

Thomas said he would oppose modification of the bill to provide for flat rate for all industry. Senator Minton urged Senate and House Agriculture committees to get the bill passed.

Greenfield, Ind., Oct. 7.—(AP)—From the home tonight, featuring talks by "old cronies" of the poet, this is a day James Whitcomb Riley would love to write about. A day at his "Old Swimmin' Hole" which he probably would blush could witness the homage being paid him by his beloved home town 21 years after his death.
