

years the federal government has spent more money than it has taken in without going broke.

Then why all the pressure from so many sources for a balanced budget right now? Wall street, the treasury, the President—everybody seems to be raising the cry.

Actually, it all boils down to this:
The budget should be balanced now simply because most of the people who are used to handling big money think this is the time to balance the budget.

Emergency conditions, therefore, leave the government with the only extensive reservoir of savings. Some governments, such as our own, have drawn on their savings own, have drawn on their savings.

That's how the Roosevelt administration operated in the last depression, a technique that kited the national debt up to the \$37,000,000,


