CITE LEVITT CASE IN HIGHWAY SUIT

State Deputy Attorney-General Attempts to Unseat Black

Hartford, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Attorney General Black figured today in a Connecticut court battle for control of the State Highway Department.

The U. S. Supreme Court ruled that Levitt had no standing in court in his motion to unseat Justice Black because he could not show that he suffered any special damage as a citizen that was sustained generally by the public through the Black appointment.

Dennis P. O'Connor, deputy attorney general, appeared before Superior Court here today before Judge John A. Cornell and presented a lengthy argument in support of Black's removal.

Mr. O'Connor charged that the plaintiff, bringing an action in equity as taxpayers have no right to sue by the routing of former Attorney General Edward J. Daly that highways were reallocated to the State.

"It appears you are taking notice of the Levitt case in the Supreme Court," Judge Cornell remarked to Mr. O'Connor.

"Yes, I am," Mr. O'Connor replied.

William L. Averill, counsel for the plaintiff and Mr. O'Connor's chief counsel, said that the State organization commissioner's report on evidence that the plaintiff had no intention of placing the Highway Department under the jurisdiction of the Public Works Department.

Mr. O'Connor objected to the proceedings, saying that the commissioner's report was a statement and therefore had nothing to do with this case.

Mr. O'Connor, arguing for a demurrer, claimed that the plaintiff had no case not only because they were not injured by the action of the department but that they had not used the highway method and that they had not been damaged.

Judge Cornell took the case under advisement but before he had rendered a ruling on whether the plaintiff has a right to come into court as a taxpayer.

The judge asked Mr. Averill if he felt satisfied that he had adequately covered this phase of the case. Mr. Averill said that he was satisfied.

The status of the plaintiff must be settled first, the court stated.

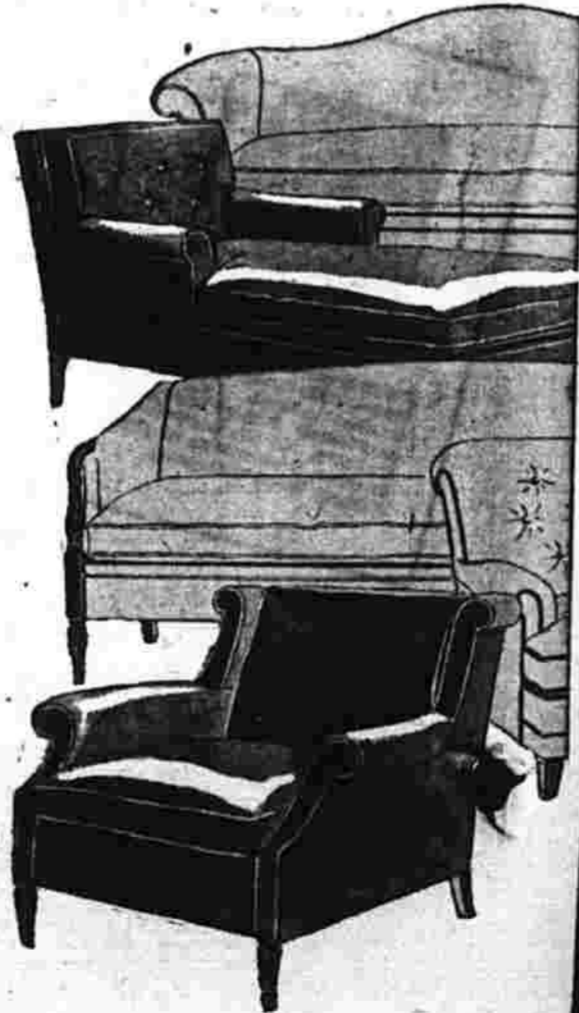

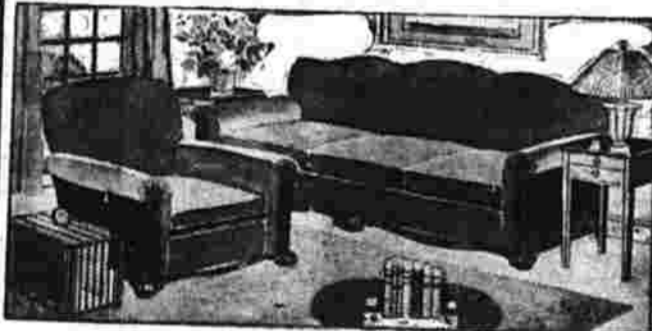

### The Well-Groomed Man Keeps An Eye On Detail

If you're a genius, a millionaire or a castaway on a palm-fringed isle you don't have to worry about your appearance. You can be as shabby as you please.

But if you're not an eccentric, a magnate or a ship-wrecked sailor you should have a decent concern for your dress and its condition. Your employer didn't like a collar, but you can be sure that some of the good impressions you made came from your spick-and-span appearance. Don't be too busy to keep yourself that way.

Here are a few suggestions to help you keep that well-groomed appearance:



This fellow is hand-clapping himself. A well-pressed suit, neatly-tied necktie, reblocked hat, a tie pin and well-polished shoes would make him appear what he is—a bright young business man.

Don't wear a suit two days in succession. Good materials return to their unwrinkled shape when they have a "rest," making for sound economy by cutting pressing bills. Two suits worn alternately last more than three times as long as one worn day after day.

Avoid Tight Suits.

Hang your suits on wooden clothes hangers. Those thin wire affairs the tailor sends your clothes home on leave a crease across the trousers and permit the shoulders of the jacket to sag.

Don't get suits that fit too tightly. The strain takes all the "bounce" out of the material, shortens its life enormously.

If you're conspicuously stout don't buy clothes which dramatize your size. Vertical stripes on dark or medium-dark materials will give a slimming effect. Single-breasted suits are better for short, stout men than the double-breasted ones.

Harmonize your accessories. Men, once they get around to giving a few moments attention to color-blending in dress, discover they're just as good at it as their wives. Don't be afraid to experiment with colors.

Pay particular attention to the "V" formed by your collar line and coat lapels. This area, though relatively small, is most conspicuous. If it's dressed properly, chances are you'll present a picture of good grooming. A neatly-tied necktie of good materials, of a tone to blend or contrast with your suit can do wonders.

The Handkerchief.

If you have a short neck don't wear a high collar. It's possible to buy either stiff (preferred) or soft collars which conform to your peculiar neck construction.

If you wear a soft collar use a collar pin, unless it has tabs or buttons down. Pins should be plain.

A pocket handkerchief gives a final, smart touch to a man's dress if it's right. Wear a white handkerchief (of good linen) with a white shirt or white collar. Wear a harmonious colored square otherwise.

### CRADLE OF MAN MAY BE SHIFTED BY BUTTERFLIES

Colorado Springs, Colo.—Something he learned from butterflies has put Dr. F. Martin Brown here on the trail of a theory he says may upset accepted ideas about the birthplace of mankind.

This is Dr. Brown's discovery: "Nearly every variety of butterfly found any place in the world can be matched in the Rocky Mountain region."

And as far as he can find out, Dr. Brown says the Rockies are LOMALIKES.

Butterflies in the left column were found in the Rocky Mountain district. Those in the right, looking just like the others, were collected from scattered parts of Europe. The only region where such a situation exists. So he has drawn some conclusions.

He says: "This indicates that all the butterfly varieties originated in this region, spreading to other places. If this is true of butterflies it is logical to believe it was true of other life, including man and animals."

"Apparently when the glaciers retreated, the butterflies migrated as new land was uncovered. Animals likewise would follow the butterflies and the glaciers. Man, depending on animals for food, would have followed that food wherever it may have roamed."

However, Dr. Brown's theory conflicts with the geological history of the Rockies. They are known as "young mountains" compared with some in Europe.

"But," Dr. Brown adds, "it is entirely possible that while the mountains are comparatively young, there may be plateaus and mesas which were undisturbed when the mountains formed and on which there was life long before the mountains were carved by glaciers."

### HOBBY Just For Fun, Film Actor Studies Heredity In The Vinegar Fly

Hollywood — Sig Rumann, film character actor, rides a hobby horse that already has cost him \$35,000—microscopic research and micro-photography, a field singularly lacking in what Hollywood

calls "glamor."  
Between pictures and in other spare time the heavy-set German comedian spends hours in the laboratory behind his Brentwood home.

Man At Play  
His hair tousled, his clothes protected by a dirty rubber apron, his hands stained with the dyes used in microscopy—he is dissecting the pupae of a vinegar fly.

With glass needles, one one-thousandth of a millimeter in diameter, Rumann digs into the salivary gland of one of his flies. In the center of any one of the cells of this gland is a nucleus, and in this nucleus are chromosomes.

Under the microscope these chromosomes look like an irregular pile of disks. Each of these "disks" is a gene, the basis of life itself.

Scientist's Dreams  
The gene determines the characteristics and future of the cell—whether, roughly speaking, the individual which grows from it will have blue eyes or brown, spindly legs or chubby ones.

Theoretically, if a scientist could go into the single cell from which human life springs and rearrange these genes, he could change the characteristics of the human being.

"But that," Rumann explains, "is too far in the future to be considered as yet."

**Health and Diet Advice**

**DEAFNESS DUE TO CATARRH**

The most common type of deafness is that which is due to chronic catarrh. This is the principal cause in from 80 to 90 per cent of the cases. And yet catarrhal deafness may be relieved in practically every case when treatment is started soon enough. The fundamental cause lying back of any type of chronic catarrh, whether involving the structure of the ear, or some other part, is usually an excess accumulation in the blood of too large a quantity of material formed from the faulty burning of starches and sugars.

Complete deafness of the catarrhal type does not come on suddenly without warning as there is a gradual loss of the sense of hearing, covering a period of several years before the patient becomes conscious that he does not hear as well as his friends.

An unusually hard cold will often quite suddenly make such a great change that it seems as if the deafness came on very abruptly, but this is seldom true, as the chronic state of catarrh has been developing for a long time.

The Eustachian tubes leading to the ears from the back part of the throat have been slowly becoming more and more filled with mucus, until finally the passages are entirely closed. While there are local treatments which are excellent in bringing relief from catarrhal deafness, they should be combined with constitutional treatment if a permanent improvement is desired. The constitutional causes must be removed, and errors in living must be corrected before any lasting change will usually take place.

If local treatment brings temporary relief, this is a good indication that there is a reasonable chance of completely restoring the hearing if the proper constitutional changes are made by removing all of the excess catarrhal material from the blood stream. This change must be brought about almost entirely by such measures as fasting, dieting, and the use of the enema. If the best results are to be obtained, the dietetic regulation should be preceded by a short fast. While the hearing will slowly improve simply through the adoption of a very careful diet in which only the minimum of starch, sugar and milk is used, the patient who desires a faster relief will do well to first take the fast.

Recently I have received many inquiries regarding manipulative treatment of finger treatment for catarrhal deafness. Possibly these were suggested by an excellent article appearing in the magazine, "Coronet" which described the "Finger Surgery" worked out by Dr. Cecil Snyder of Philadelphia. According to this report, Dr. Snyder has been able to bring about an improvement in hearing through treatment given with the finger, working directly against the parts surrounding the Eustachian tubes in the back, upper part of the throat behind the soft palate. Part of this improvement is possibly the result of freeing the Eustachian tubes from plugs of mucus and part is possibly the result of bringing a better blood and nerve supply to the parts treated.

Judging from the description given of the technique used it is somewhat similar to a method which I have used in my practice and have found to be an excellent supplementary treatment, capable of aiding in the restoring of all or part of the hearing which has been lost. However, it has been my experience that to gain the most lasting improvement, the patient must fast and diet at the same time. back. I have a curvature which I have heard called "swayback" and of course, when in a standing position, this defect brings about a faulty posture with the result that my stomach sticks out too far. I am very conscious of this figure fault and would like to correct it, if possible.

Answer: A mild case of swayback will respond to exercises. Try the following exercises, as all of them may help: First, lying on the back, bring the knees up to the chest and return. Second, lying on the back, bring first one leg and then the other as high as you can raise it, keeping the knees stiff and toes pointed downward. Third, still in the back position, raise both legs at the same time, keeping knees stiff. Fourth, use the "bicycling exercise" which is also taken while lying on the back and which calls for a vigorous movement of the legs similar to that which is obtained when riding a bicycle. You will find that hanging exercises are of value where you hang by your hands. If you have no suitable apparatus for this exercise, you can grasp the top edge of a door with both hands and hang from this. I also suggest that you train yourself to stand correctly, with the lower abdomen pulled in. Maintaining good posture will help considerably and in time it will become habitual with you to stand or sit with the body in the correct position. While taking your daily walk, remind yourself to stride along with the chest forward, the "stomach" held in, and the spine straight. Pulling in the part which you refer to as the stomach which is really the lower abdomen, will do a great deal to improve the position of the lower back. An abnormal curve inward in the lower lumbar region is popularly termed "swayback" and is termed a lumbar lordosis by the doctor.

Let's stuff all the old black gloves we can find and fasten them to long sticks to point their gruesome way about. Why not ask the guests to dress as ghosts and witches—and let black cats (live or otherwise) prowling among cornstalks stacked in every corner? With all those cornstalks around, incidentally, it's a little safer to use electric candles in hollowed-out pumpkins. Get some extension cords and use colored bulbs or bulbs covered with orange or black paper. Set half a dozen cardboard witches galloping about on brooms. Loose an equal number of creepy bats (also cardboard—and suspended by strings from the ceiling) with wings outspread. And make your refreshments part of the decorations.

For instance:  
1. Hollow out a large pumpkin. Fill it with apples, doughnuts, popcorn balls or tiny cakes with orange and black frosting. Set a big jug of cider nearby.  
2. Make an orange or yellow cake. Frost it with chocolate icing topped with orange fondant "pumpkins." (An orange-frosted cake decorated with marshmallows on which faces are painted with candy corn and green gum drops also is lots of fun.) Then serve orange sherbet and hot cocoa.

### BREAD AND BEANS A LONGEVITY HELP

Belgrade (AP)—Bread, beans, and cheese may be the road to longevity.

Pavel Blakup, a young Czech doctor who has spent two years studying the reasons for the long lives of peasants and shepherds of a Balkan district, came to the preliminary conclusion it had to do with uniform diets that for generations seem to have been especially suited to the people.

In most cases, bread and beans were the most important foods. Little meat was eaten, and then only in winter.

Cheese was found to be an important item, but little milk was consumed, and that mostly sour. Vegetables, especially peppers, tomatoes, and onions, are eaten raw. Fruits are avoided.

Eighty per cent of the cases studied used alcohol, but in moderation.

### COLLEGE HENS AID THREE PAY TUITION

Upland, Ind. — (AP) — When Hazel and Mable Jane Smith and their brother, Logan, entered Taylor university this fall, they brought with them 400 chickens and three goats.

The chickens and goats are to earn the Smith trio's way through the university. The trio really is four, because Logan's wife, Opal, came with them. She's to be their housekeeper. It's a habit with the Smith family, farmers near Hagerstown, Omer Smith, the father, originated the poultry method of financing college expenses when his oldest daughter, Martha, started to Taylor in 1929. Martha kept chickens through her five years of university training. She now is teaching school at Connersville, Ill.

Egg Market Good  
The three Smiths now in school arrived by truck and moved into a four-room house. The job of registering for classes had to wait until the flock of chickens were housed in two poultry buildings and the goats turned out to pasture.

The egg market is good and the Smiths figure the net profits for the winter from sale of eggs will be \$500. School expenses for the three will be about \$625 and living costs \$300. Thus, the hens come close to paying the entire bill.

Hazel, now 22, is in her senior year. Logan, 20, is a junior and Mable Jane, 18, is a freshman. Opal keeps house for the other three in the home which they rent for \$100 a year.

The chickens have been bought each year from their father at \$1 each. When school is over they sell them back to their father at the same price and since most laying hens sell for \$3.50 after a year's production, Mr. Smith doesn't do badly either.

The feed is bought at home and trucked to Upland.

Hens Get Extra Meal  
Last year the youthful egg merchants didn't do so well. The market was bad and they had some hens which turned out to be "cannibals" and killed many of the others. Net profit for the year was only about \$300.

They hope to make up a little of the deficit this year. They have installed a poultry house in the poultry houses which is furnished on automatically from 7:30 to 10:30 each night. The lights cause the hens to eat an extra meal and lay more eggs, the Smiths say.

All three members of the family know the poultry business thoroughly. Their father operates a poultry farm where he maintains 12,000 chickens.

This man who expects to become Russia's Vojd, a title corresponding to Der Fuehrer or Il Duce, is 39, a Russian count who renounced his title and became an American citizen. He's built like an athlete, keeps his hair close cropped and wears a semi-military uniform.

**Washington Daybook**  
By PRESTON GROVER

Washington—Step mentally into your congressman's boots; think how much easier it must be to win elections when farmers are satisfied with crop payments, relief funds are pouring in and bridges, highways and dams spring up almost overnight.

Then glance down at the President's budget announcement showing the deficit to be \$695,000,000—and figure out what the dickens you are going to do next summer in campaign time to appease the farmers, the relief crowds and the highway contractors if the President sets out to balance the budget by lopping off funds that have satisfied these groups for several years.

That will give you an idea what faces the average congressman. And you will have an idea, too, what will face the President when he sets out to convince the congress that they will have to make appropriations—and like it.

**Interest Mounting.** Add to that a bit of further cogitation. Throw the budget message aside for a few minutes and remember that the national debt is \$37,000,000,000—more than two times what it was six years ago. New during these years of depression no reduction has been made in the national debt. Instead it has been increasing steadily. Interest on it in 1935 amounted to \$745,787,854. That is three-quarters

of a billion dollars. Interest rates in 1935 were low. Recently they have been climbing slightly. It is not inconceivable that the interest burden ultimately may exceed \$1,000,000,000 a year. In 1921 the computed rates of interest on the national debt was 4.3 per cent. It now fluctuates slightly, but is under 3 per cent. If the \$37,000,000,000 debt bore 4.3 per cent interest, that load would be about \$1,599,000,000—or nearly two times the 1935 outlay.

That means that if the government sets out to reduce the debt at the rate it did after the war, knocking it off at the speed of a billion dollars a year, several things must be done. First, \$695,000,000 must be raised to wipe out the current rate of deficit. Then the interest charge must be met. That may range from \$300,000,000 a year to two times that amount. Those two items sum up to a billion a year, or perhaps \$1,500,000,000.

Now add to that a billion a year of debt retirement. That makes \$2,000,000,000 or more, depending upon the interest rate.

**How to Raise Money.** There are only two ways to raise the money. One is to cut expenditures. That may mean fewer bridges and roads built back home, curtailed spending to help out the farmer, fewer warships, less relief spending, less of many things.

Another thing, generally agreed upon, is that it means more taxes. There may be more taxes in the higher brackets. But the treasury will tell you that taxing the big-fellows won't raise enough money. Taxing the brackets between \$5,000 and \$50,000 a year brings in most of the money.

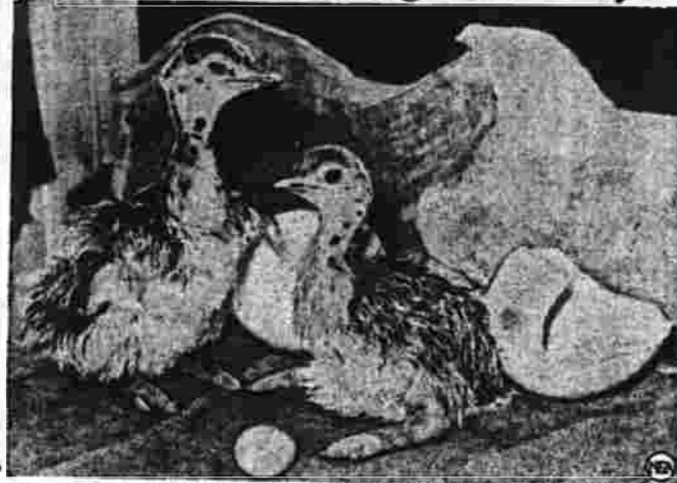
