

Dissolve yeast in milk and let stand ten minutes. Cream butter and sugar, add eggs, grated lemon rind and add the yeast mixture alternately with the flour to make a dough. Beat well as the ingredients are added. Let rise until double in bulk. Shape into rolls, or squares about five inches square, and fold over. Fill with poppy seed, cream

about five inches square, and fold over. Fill with poppy seed, cream cheese, chopped nuts, stewed prunes or apricots rweetened. Let rise until double in size and bake in moderate oven twenty minutes or more, depending on the size of the bun. Sprinkle with powdered sugar when cool.

The following is the recipe for the poppy seed and cheese filling: Pour a cup of milk over 3 cups of ground poppy seed, add 1 cup of sugar and a tablespoon of butter. Raisins and chopped nuts may be added.

Cheese filling: 1 cup dry cottage cheese, 1 egg, 1-2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 cup yellow raisins. Mix together and use as filling.






