READING A BOOK

"To many juvenile courts," declared Dr. Charles G. Chakerian, professor of psychology at Connecticut State College, in a child welfare conference at Bridgeport yesterday, "there are judges who have been trained in criminology who have never read a book on psychology in their lives."

Chakerian seems to regard as complete confirmation of his assertion that "the program of child welfare in Connecticut is a mess" the more the intrusion of so-called child psychologists into the situation the worse the mess becomes.

There are a good many people in this state who will agree with the professor that the child welfare program is a mess—and that more progress is developed and the greater the intrusion of so-called child psychologists into the situation the worse the mess becomes.

It is to be taken for granted that Dr. Chakerian is convinced that an essential to adequacy on the part of a judge of a juvenile court is that he should have read a book on psychology—perhaps several books.

It is to be inferred then, that when a judge is dealing with crime committed by children and the sentence under 16—or where there are many—his training in criminology is a detriment and that what he should really have is a training in psychology.

But what is a training in psychology? How do you proceed to train someone in a thing which is neither a science nor an art nor a craft—something which has never been taught to anyone before?

It is to be said, most folks would tell you that psychology is the "science of the mind," but that definition is a mere convenience, because there is no agreement as to what constitutes the mind. There are some psychologists now who assert that the mind and morals are as well as matters of glandular phenomena.
