LEWIS DENOUNCES 'LITTLE STEEL' AMID WILD JUBILATION

CIO Head Declares Name of Tom Girdler 'Should Be Synonymous With That Terrible Word Murder.'

Pittsburgh, Dec. 16.—(AP)—John L. Lewis denounced operators of "Little Steel" today and told a raucous convention of steel workers that his dream of seeing the nation's mill men "knocked together" in unionism "has come true."

The founder of the CIO, welcomed amid wild jubilation to the floor of First National Congress of SWOC, assailed Tom Girdler, president of the Republic Steel corporation, declaring that the name of Girdler "should be synonymous with murder."

The shaggy-haired labor leader took the platform only after a delay of 30 minutes by the ovation, and then declared:

"You have found out for the first time your respective lives that you could organize you could be carried into the final list of the names of the men who are being murdered."

This statement reflected the earlier "blanket embargo" placed on present office holders, elected or appointed, as members of the steering committee.

Selection About Complete

Hamilton said the work of selecting the new group was "virtually complete." As the party's executive committee met today, the national chairman explained that final agreements on "a few remaining details" still were to be reached.

Several members of the executive group expressed hope of adjourning late today. The conference opened Monday and will close on Tuesday, Dec. 17.

It was widely anticipated that agreement had been reached as to the chairman of the steering committee.

There are those who said it could not be done, yet the impossible has been accomplished. Even the efforts of the American Federation of Labor to degrade the efforts of the steel workers to organize has not been successful.

Labor in America can do what it wants to do. The public is being told what you are thinking about and your voice is heard for the first time.

A new labor movement has been formed and assembled under the banner of the CIO—a mighty modern movement, propelled by the sentiment and the heart of the worker in this country.

Lewis, as usual, spoke extemporaneously and the 92 delegates.

JAP SURFACE SHIPS USED MACHINE GUNS ON GUNBOAT PANAY

MANCHESTER MAN TELLS OF STRIKE

Frank Bausola, Trustee Of Drivers' Union, Explains Workings of Organization

Hartford, Dec. 16.—(AP)—A grilling cross-examination of Frank Bausola of Manchester, a trustee of the drivers union was conducted by State Attorney H. M. Alcorn in the Superior Court today where Bausola testified in a trial for conspiracy.

The trial has been on for nearly three weeks before Judge Arthur F. Ellis and a jury, and there are 14 defendants besides Mr. Murphy, who is State Attorney Hugh M. Alcorn's chief conspirator.

Frank Bausola, of Manchester, and William Bausola are represented by Attorney John A. Danaher. Attorney Edwin M. Ryan, Samuel Rosenthal and Harold Strauch appear for other defendants, all of whom have been on the witness stand.
