

CLAIMS DEPRESSION CAUSED BY ERRORS OF ADMINISTRATION

Head Of Coal Company Tells Senators Price Fixing Cre- ated Drop In His Business; Says Confidence Shaken.

Washington, Jan. 14.—(AP)—A bituminous coal producer told Senate investigators today that "this business depression was created here in Washington."
"It will have to be cured," he said, "by a frank acknowledgement of some of the mistakes that have been made."
Testifying before the Senate Unemployment committee, D. A. Morrow, president of the Pittsburgh Coal company, attacked price fixing by the National Bituminous Coal Commission, asserting that now seems likely that April and May will see a drop in coal output to the lowest level in recent years.
Head of a company which operates 18 mines in western Pennsylvania, Morrow declared his company will give the government every assistance to restore prosperity.
Morrow testified after F. G. Tryon, economist for the bituminous coal commission, had told the committee that employment and production in the coal industry had dropped off sharply in October, after having gained since 1932.

Restores Confidence.

"The adding conviction in the security of government finance and democratic institutions and individual enterprise here, which has been shaken," Morrow told the committee, "must be restored before other industry or government can expect sustained and enduring recovery. That restoration of confidence is the responsibility of government."
Chairman Byrnes said, as the inquiry progressed that the committee would investigate thoroughly the proposal that Congress make grants for direct and back relief, to be matched in part by the states.
The whole question of relief, Byrnes said, hinges on whether administration should be in the hands of the states or should be centralized in Washington.

"We have heard the private agencies' side," he declared. "They want Federal grants administered locally in a unified program. Next week we will call in the Federal relief experts and get their opinion." Byrnes said he "supposed" Works Progress Administration officials would favor retention of their control over apportionment of work relief funds. The chairman said the committee hopes to complete its investigation next week, although it turned aside today to an inquiry into unemployment conditions, this time in the coal industry. Two charity officials urged committee approval yesterday of a plan to "unify" relief by having the Federal government make grants to local relief agencies.

VILLAGE UNEASY FOLLOWING RIOTS

Officers Use Tear Gas After Pickets Start Throwing Stones; Several Hurt.

New Haven, Mich., Jan. 14.—(AP)—Peace-makers in a foundry workers' dispute which erupted into riot and bloodshed sought speedy action today to forestall further threats of violence.
With this village of 500 inhabitants tense, union and company representatives prepared for new differences in the wake of last night's fighting in the strike-bound New Haven foundry.
A handful of pickets of the United Automobile Workers of America, obedient to a truce, patrolled the foundry area and Main street and calls to neighboring counties, which, leaving the scene quiet.
Early today, several hours after deputies had repelled pickets with tear gas in a riotous scene of snarled iron and stones, a truce was expected pending a peace party today.
Union's Charges.
The union accused the plant of violating seniority rules in recalling approximately 300 men to work on Tuesday after a holiday shutdown. Sumner D. Lamkin, foundry owner who agreed a renewal of negotiations, denied the charge.
Mistakes were hung at 50 deputies at the plant. Deputy Sheriff E. Driskay of East Detroit said, and the officers retained with gas.

HOLDING COMPANY ACT BACKED BY PRESIDENT

Chief Executive Tells News- men He Is Opposed To Any Changes; Believes All Should Be Eliminated.

Washington, Jan. 14.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today he favored the elimination of all holding companies.
The President made the statement at a press conference in expressing unalterable opposition to the legislation of the "death sentence" in the Utility Holding Company Act which had been proposed by Wendell L. Wilkie, head of the Commonwealth and Southern Corporation, as one condition to an "understanding" with the administration.
The President did not indicate how he would terminate the holding company practice, but said remote control of local community banking should be ended as well as similar practices in the utility and other fields.
He asked if bankruptcy was the way out, the President replied in the negative and said there were various other ways.
He also was asked if the taxing of holding companies was a "very important" matter. He said that he had not reached that yet.
Mr. Roosevelt told a large gathering of reporters that holding companies should be wiped out even down to those of the first degree. "Why have any at all," he asked his audience.
He replied with an emphatic affirmative when asked if he would extend his principle to all lines of business.
He then gave his illustration of the community bank which was controlled in a large financial center and that was a bad thing.
Why, he asked, can't a small bank support itself, especially nowadays with Federal supervision and deposit insurance.
He referred to his Jackson dinner speech and reiterated that owners of \$500,000,000 of private power securities were controlling a total of \$100,000,000,000.

CAPITAL, LABOR CHIEFS CALLED TO CONFERENCE

President Summons Young, Lamont To Meet With Lewis, Head Of CIO, Taus- sig, Tugwell And Berle.

Washington, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Six leaders in industry, finance and labor were called to the White House for a conference with President Roosevelt today on cooperative means of attacking the business slump.
They were Owen D. Young, chairman of the General Electric Company; Thomas W. Lamont, partner of J. P. Morgan; Charles E. Hughes, head of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company; Tugwell, former undersecretary of agriculture more than a year ago; Lewis, head of the CIO; Tausig, head of the National Industrial Conference Board; and Berle, head of the Federal Reserve Board.
The meeting follows one earlier in the week between the President and the business leaders, including the railroad, food, and building materials industries.
Next Wednesday more than fifty members of the President's National Advisory Council, composed of representatives of industry, labor, and the public, will meet at the Commerce Department and later call on the President.
An official of the Federal trade commission said, meanwhile, there had been a decided increase of interest in an established form of government-business cooperation to eliminate unfair trade practices.
Such agreements now govern nearly 200 industries. They are represented by the National Industrial Conference Board, which is the representative of an industry gathering under commission auspices. The commission is considering a new contract covering minimum standards for goods, and similar questions.
The Trade Commission has more applications for such agreements pending than it can handle at any time since this method of cooperation first was tried in 1933.
Many industries turned to these agreements when the collapse of NRA hurt them. Some of the industries which are now being urged to enter into such agreements, however, are not as interested in them as they were in 1933.
Some problems which President Roosevelt recently has mentioned—such as installment selling—are not covered by such agreements.

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Labor, Finance And War Rumors Wreck People's Front Government; Blum Called To Form New Re- gime After Cabinet Quits.

Paris, Jan. 14.—(AP)—France's wave of strikes spread today as President Albert Lebrun sought a new Premier to grapple with the grave social and monetary problems which forced the resignation of Camille Chautemps and his People's Front government.
Chautemps having declined the President's first invitation to form a new Cabinet, the President summoned Leon Blum, Socialist leader and former premier, to the Elysee Palace.
Whether Blum was offered the Premiership or merely called for consultation was not immediately disclosed.
The President worked against time in an effort to establish a new government before political passions aggravated by the labor strike and the decline of the franc which precipitated the crisis.
While he was consulting party leaders street car and bus employees of Lille voted a general strike to protest against the discharge of 92 workers and sufficient wage increases. They empowered their leaders to fix the time of the strike.
Metal workers at Lille already had voted to demand higher wages. Other strikes and labor disputes were in progress in Paris suburbs, Nimes, Valenciennes and the Metz region.
To cope with the fall of the franc which yesterday reached 200 to the dollar in unofficial sales—the Bank of France ordered all dealings in foreign currencies suspended until further notice. However, featuring Finance Minister Georges Bonnet, who like the other ministers, remained in office pending formation of the new Cabinet, permitted the Bourse, or Stock Exchange, to open "as usual."
Chautemps resigned early today after a bitter verbal exchange with his Communist allies in the Chamber of Deputies and other Socialist members of the cabinet had withdrawn. His own Radical Socialist and Communist allies together formed his people's front support.
Signs the breach in the People's Front might be healed developed today. The executive committee of the Communist party published a statement calling on Communists, Socialists and Radical-Socialists to reunite and create a new People's front government. The statement said "this now is more than ever necessary."
Just Chautemps, explaining his refusal of Lebrun's invitation to head a new Cabinet, said: "I feel the incidents of last night are too recent and would seriously hamper my task."
Unable to Change Money
The ban on foreign exchange dealings prevented even tourists from changing money.
Julius Jeanneney, aged president of the Senate, addressing that body this afternoon, pleaded for continuation of democratic government.
"Now as ever in France democracy," he declared, "may public malice strike down any who think in terms of civil war."
That could solve France's problems of a fluctuating currency, a prospective budget deficit fixed by some at \$1,350,000,000, and spreading strikes by workers protesting increased living costs.
He summoned to conference Jeanneney, president of the Senate; Edouard Herriot, president of the Chamber; and others of the national political leaders.

FRANK'S BACKGROUND

In a period when far too much of the news of each day consists in what somebody or other has done, it is not too far from the truth to say that the least of what is going on in the world is still a matter of very great importance when Glenn Frank, head of the Republican party in Connecticut, makes his first public address since accepting that tremendous responsibility position, and presents his views as to how he is extremely likely to serve as background for the committee's determinations.

Dr. Frank's field of discussion was, of course, not unlimited. He is said to direct the deliberations of a committee whose duty it will be to offer to the Republican party certain definitely expressed principles to which the party can go to upon which he could very well advocate any one of several social revolution, change in our form of government. He is a Republican and inherently the party which he is to serve is not far from the basic idea. He must act within the limits of those ideas. He re-creates much basic principle to two the maintenance of the status quo and the continuance of the capitalist system. That bars out Fascism and Communism, even moderate Socialism.

So Dr. Frank finds the job of the Republican party to be to make certain that in such a way that it will bring about a new era of being, satisfaction to all groups of the nation's citizens. And within that limit that the leading nations make extremely significant observations. Note these two paragraphs. I confess that I grow tired of wholeheartedly announcing the death of enterprise for I am convinced that the only way to bring progress is to do it in a way that is to the benefit of the people. The thing that is proving, day after day, is that the world is not what it once was, and something must be done to bring it back to its former state. It is the world's most dependable hope for a new abundant life.

Dr. Frank was speaking at a luncheon of the New York Board of Trade, a non-political body, and quite properly he announced that he was not talking "politics." So it was not the time nor the place for him to express his views as to what plans for the rehabilitation of the country's economic life the Republican party ought to stipulate, on this background. The thing that is being done is to bring about a new era of being, satisfaction to all groups of the nation's citizens. And within that limit that the leading nations make extremely significant observations. Note these two paragraphs. I confess that I grow tired of wholeheartedly announcing the death of enterprise for I am convinced that the only way to bring progress is to do it in a way that is to the benefit of the people. The thing that is proving, day after day, is that the world is not what it once was, and something must be done to bring it back to its former state. It is the world's most dependable hope for a new abundant life.

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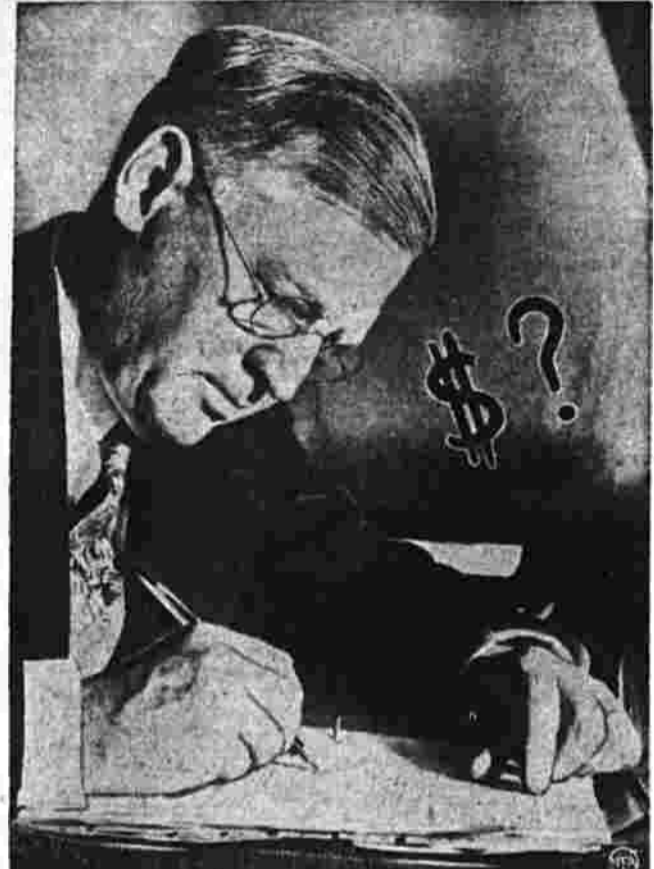

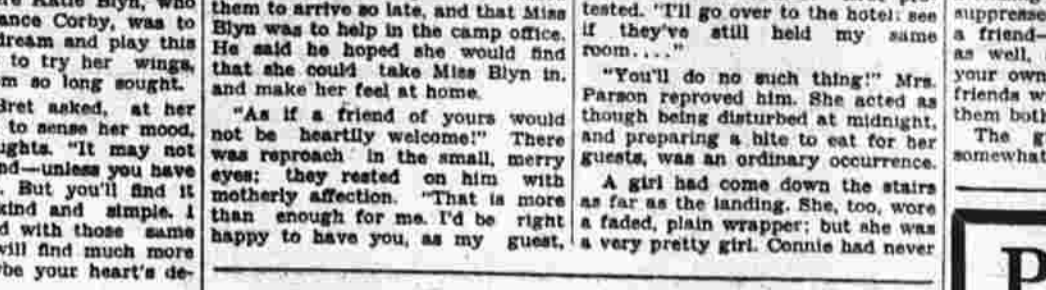

TOWN MAY ENFORCE REMOVAL OF SNOW

Selectmen May Be Asked To Organize Clearing Crew Where Job Isn't Done.

It is understood that some of the town officials are considering a move, whereby property owners who fail to have sidewalks adjoining their land cleared within the twenty-four hours following the end of a snowstorm, will have the work done for them by the town, and the bill for such labor will be billed against the property. The charge to remove a ton is \$2.85. A rate to town laborers of 75 cents per hour would be charged if the plan is put into effect.

It is claimed that, not only on the outlying portions of the town, where a few sidewalks run parallel to open lots, but in the more central parts, property owners have failed to properly remove snow from in front of their premises.

Organization of a sidewalk clearing gang may be suggested to the Board of Selectmen at its meeting of Monday night. These men might also be employed to clear sidewalks which have been cleared, but which have been permitted to become resurfaced by melting and freezing of snow.

Under a town ordinance, sidewalks are required to be freed of ice and snow within twenty-four hours after the end of a storm. The town plows public roads, but each land owner is expected to clear his own walks, or, more properly, the public walks on which his land fronts. It has been suggested that, in the removal of sidewalk snow, the town has dropped one of its former services to taxpayers. Years ago a horse plow was used to clear sidewalks of snow.

Legally, property owners own to the center line of streets adjacent to their holdings, subject to public rights of way. Also, legally, it has been decided by the courts that
