PREDICT DEADLOCK AT VALERA PARLEY TO UNITE IRELAND

Observers At London Conference Say There Will Be A Breakdown If Free State Head Insists On His Stand

London, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Special police details were stationed in Downing street today to hold back hundreds of Irish men and women gathered there to cheer Eamon De Valera as the prime minister of Ireland arrived for his peace conference with Britain's leaders.

The problem arising from De Valera's desire to bring Ulster (northern Ireland) into union with the rest of Ireland (formerly the Irish Free State) is presently the chief obstacle to an accord to compose the long strife between Ireland and Great Britain.

Shouts of "Tip Devo" and fluttering green handkerchiefs greeted De Valera and other ministers of the new Irish regime as they entered at No. 10 Downing street for the official reception which opened the conference.

The crowd was held at the Whitehall end of historic 1111 Downing street by the Bobbies.

Earlier, in preparation for the meeting which may bring truce to the long Irish-English struggle, Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain conferred with other members of the British cabinet, including Malcolm MacDonald, secretary of Dominion affairs; Sir Samuel Hoare, home secretary; and Sir Thomas Inskip, minister for coordination and defense.

The long trade war between Ireland and Great Britain and the question of fitting Ireland into the British Empire's defense plans were understood to be the points discussed.

Compliment observers believed the outcome of the discussions hinged on whether De Valera would accept immediate British recognition of the withdrawal of recognition from the National Government, has taken the stand Japan's "responsibility for peace in East Asia" now even heavier than before.

JAPS MAY SET UP A CHINESE CENTRAL RULE

Tokyo Suggests That Will Be Next Move Toward "Pacification In East Asia," Japanese Make Statement

Tokyo, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Establishment of a new Central Chinese government centering on Shanghai was proposed today as a sequel to Japanese withdrawal of recognition of Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist regime.

A statement attributed to Shigen Kawagoe, Japanese ambassador in London, suggested the setting up of such a government as Japan's next move toward "pacification" of East Asia.

"It is imperative that Japan and the new Chinese regime should cooperate together, cooperate to tide over the difficult situation," Kawagoe was quoted in a Domei (Japanese News Agency) dispatch.

"I believe the atmosphere is fast developing to favor establishment of a new regime in Central China, centering on Shanghai. In that event, it would not be so difficult to adjust relations between the north China and Central China regimes."

A new Japanese-inspired government at Peiping, made up of Chinese, proposed to be the provisional government of North China.

CHAUTEMPS FIGHTS TO BRING AN END TO FRENCH CRISIS

Former Premier Tries To Form New People's Front Ministry; Financial And Labor Situation Acute.

Paris, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Camille Chautemps struggled in a new atmosphere today to form a new People's Front ministry to end France's four-day crisis, precipitated when his own Cabinet resigned Friday in the face of financial and labor troubles.

President Albert Lebrun summoned the Radical-Socialist former Premier after Leon Blum, Socialist leader, failed to gain support for a "National Union" government.

A strained calm pervaded the halls of the Chamber of Deputies as France's acute financial and labor problems continued unabated because of the failure to organize a ministry.

Both LaGuardia and Mayor Harold Burton of Cleveland, who testified after him, urged expansion of the WPA program to take care of all jobless employables in the nation. The browned, gray-haired mayor of Cleveland said the government should keep out of the "boundless" field of direct relief.

LaGuardia recommended that, in addition to launching a new public works program, the Federal government should prescribe for uniform work day and week standards.

He urged that the WPA take care of all employables who were out of work.

Representative Fitzgerald (D., Conn.), a member of the House Labor committee and ardent supporter of the wage-hour bill said the solution of New England's industrial property lies in long-time planning.

"England and Connecticut," he said, "should turn to new industries in order to replace the textile and shoe plants that have shut down or moved to other parts of the country."

Fitzgerald suggested that the New England states attempt to attract aviation, refrigeration and radio industries.

The best way to bring new industries in, Fitzgerald said, "is to improve the labor situation in those industries, available. That would attract these industries."

Fitzgerald, author of an Act compelling the Labor Department to improve the labor situation in order to safeguard the welfare of apprentices, said he believes industry should cooperate more closely with apprentices.

SEE NO OPPOSITION TO SEATING REED IN SUPREME COURT

Gov. Cross Receives Macdonald's Report On State's Parkway

Senators Expect Meeting This Week On Qualifications Of New Associate Justice Will Be Only Routine; No Objections Heard Thus Far In The Capital.

Hartford, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Gov. Wm. C. Cross revealed today that he had received Highway Commissioner John A. Macdonald's report on the Merritt Parkway land purchases and had turned it over to Attorney General Charles McLaughlin who said further investigation of the transactions, "particularly in relation to the brokers involved," seemed warranted.

The governor also said that Macdonald will now begin the task of preparing a reply to Public Works Director Robert A. Hurley's report on the entire highway department. This report contains charges of "waste and inefficiency."

The governor, who gave Macdonald a copy of the Hurley report, said that while no request for an answer had been made it has always been "understood" between him and the highway commissioner that a reply would be forthcoming.

Will Be Available
The governor, although he did not say when he expected the reply to be ready, indicated he believes it will be available for the Fairfield County Grand Jury if its consideration by that body is deemed necessary.

The question of land purchases for the Merritt Parkway, superior highway stretching across Fairfield county and connecting with the Hutchinson river parking in Westchester county, is a matter of official concern following published reports that prices paid by the state for land along the right-of-way in many cases greatly exceeded the assessed value.

In the midst of the discussion thus aroused Public Works Director Hurley filed with the governor his report on the entire highway department on which he had been engaged for months.

Hurley, currently involved in a court contest to determine whether recent reorganization statutes give him or Macdonald supervision over highway construction, about 200 miles and involving a sum estimated in the neighborhood of \$6,000,000. Governor Cross said he had made no demand upon the highway commissioner to answer Hurley's charges but that such action would be "the thing for him to do."

"Now," the chief executive said, "I expect that Macdonald will reply to the Hurley report once he has the thing for him to do. Naturally you would expect him to reply."

The subcommittee was formally set up by the full Judiciary committee to consider the nomination. Headed by Senator Logan (D., Ky.), it also included: Senators King (D., Utah); Fletcher (D., Ill.); McGill (D., Kans.); Van Noy (D., Ind.); Borah (R., Ida.); and Norris (Ind. Neb.).

Logan said the subcommittee would meet Thursday "to see whether anyone wants to be heard."

Members of the committee expressed certainty that Reed would be confirmed as a Supreme Court justice this week, enabling him to take his seat before any new cases are heard.

Of the Senators who commented on the nomination of Reed, only Senator Logan, not one raised any objections. Senator Frank Holt (D., Va.), a frequent administration critic, was among members of both major parties indicating approval.

"The amazing thing about it," said Holt, "is that the President appointed a judge instead of one of his fervent haters."

Nevertheless the Judiciary committee arranged for careful scrutiny of Reed's qualifications, even as Justice George Sutherland, whom he will succeed, made his final appearance on the bench.

No cases of national interest were up for decision by the justices meeting at noon, for the last session before a two-week recess. The retirement of the 75-year-old Sutherland will become effective at midnight.

Informal Discussions
After an informal discussion of Reed's nomination by the entire Judiciary committee, Chairman Ashurst (D., Ariz.), said he would turn further consideration over to a subcommittee headed by Senator Logan (D., Ky.).

The subcommittee will hold hearings. Ashurst added, and any person wishing to do so may appear before it.

Commitment expected the hearings would be only routine, however. They said an informal discussion had been held at the Senate's office in the Capitol building. Reed's nomination was held up by a filibuster in the Ku Klux Klan.

Now that Reed has been picked for the court and he has been picked for the Justice Department's post, Roberts will be in the majority for the first time since Mr. Roosevelt took office. Reed, a Kentucky Democrat, lawyer has held a judicial position. Originally brought to the government service by President Hoover, he became counsel for the farm board in 1929. Later he was an attorney for the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, where he drafted much administration legislation. President Roosevelt appointed him solicitor general in 1935.

Although Senate liberals were less glowing in their praise of Reed than some more conservative members, the former recalled that Reed frequently called for a broad interpretation of the Constitution while arguing in support of Roosevelt legislation.

"The Constitution is a guide for our progress," he once said, "not a gale to preserve the status quo."

When Reed is confirmed, most senators expected him to become chief justice of the Supreme Court. This that group would have a definite majority for the first time, although Chief Justice Hughes and Justice Roberts have voted with it in support of some administration legislation.

Justice Cardozo now is seriously ill of a heart ailment, and some persons have expressed belief he will retire shortly. If this should happen, Mr. Roosevelt could make his third Supreme Court appointment.

JAPS PUSHED BACK BY CHIANG'S FORCES

Generalissimo In Visit To Front Lines Orders Men Not To Retreat An Inch.

Shanghai, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Chinese armies on the Northern, Central and Yangtze river fronts were reported today to have pushed back Japanese invaders in a series of counterattacks.

Advices through Chinese channels said Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek in a second visit to front lines ordered his troops "not to retreat a single inch."

The Chinese Eighth Army, organized from once-outlawed Communist units, inflicted heavy losses on Japanese in Central Shansi province.

A Chinese force along the Yangtze above Nanjing pushed back Japanese outposts, occupied two villages near Wuhi and prepared for an attempt to recapture Wuhi itself.

A Chinese guerrilla unit captured Chwan-sha, on the Pootung river, the government purchases the 1936 Flood Control Act today permit the government to pay all expenses for construction of dams and reservoirs on flood control projects.

(Dr. H. H. Kung, China's second powerful leader, declared China "can continue the war for years," and said "all current talk of Japanese peace without having been partially inspired by Tokyo aid efforts is utterly false.")

From Nanchang, in Kwangsi province, Soviet-manufactured airplanes raised Japanese airfields and planes concentrated there.

South of Shanghai, a strong Chinese force on the south bank of the Chongting river was said to have blocked Japanese attempts to advance from Hangchow. Checking detachments operating from hills near Hangchow harassed the Japanese lines.

Japanese army and navy spokesmen announced jointly that they were "the major developments" on any front. There were only scanty reports on the Chinese counter-drive in southern Szechwan, where some 400,000 Chinese were trying

to escape from the Japanese.

ASKS GOVERNMENT TO BUY UTILITIES

But Wilkie's Suggestion To President Gets Scant Support From Congressmen.

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—A proposal that the government buy out the largest private utility group in the Tennessee valley received scant support today from the first members of Congress to discuss it.

Wendell L. Wilkie had suggested that "as a last resort in a desperate hour," the government purchase the power companies in that area which are subsidiaries of the Commonwealth and Southern Corporation.

Rep. Rankin (D-Miss.), leader of the Public Power bloc in the House, was more favorably inclined toward the idea than other Legislators who were present. He expressed willingness for such a purchase if the price not based on inflated values.

Business Men (D-Miss.) of the Senate Military committee, however, say such purchase "at any price" as "begging of State Socialism."

Senator Norris (Ind-Neb.), father of the Tennessee Valley Authority, said the government should make purchase only to avoid duplicating transmission lines or other equipment of private companies, but added:

"The utilities have made this difficult by asking a price that nobody could afford to pay."
