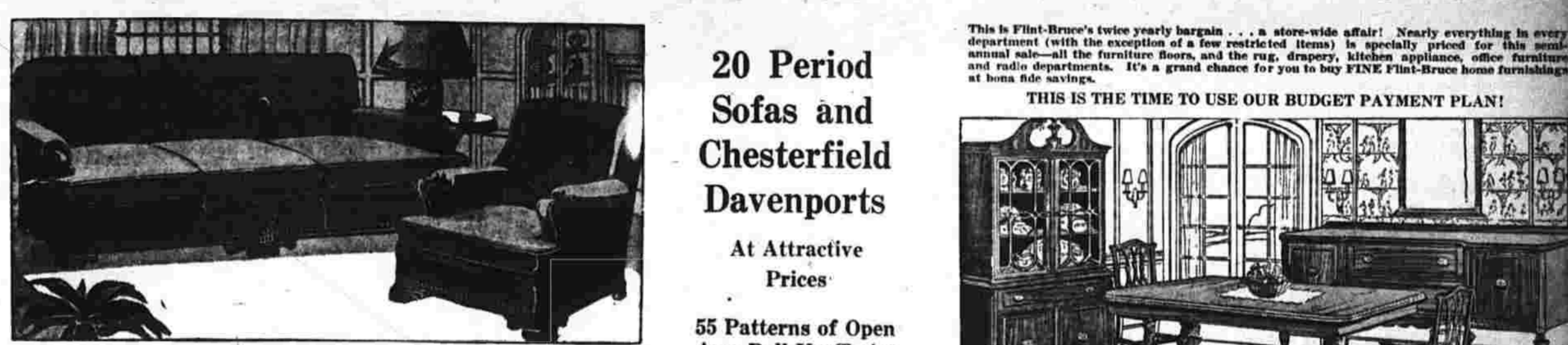

Alexander Earns Place As Baseball Immortal

"Old Pete" Only Player Named To Hall of Fame In Annual Poll By Writers; Set Great Slab Record in Twenty-Year Career.

New York, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Baseball's solemnly elected immortals showed over on their pedestals today and welcomed their newest member, one of the best loved of them all, Grover Cleveland Alexander.

"Old Pete," the great pitcher, who stood big league batters on their heels for 20 years, joins the select little group enshrined in the Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, N. Y., by a flattering vote of the Baseball Writers' Association of America.

Of 117 players of the past who were named to the Hall of Fame, Alexander was the only one to receive the greatest number of votes, 197 out of the 200. Needing 100 votes for election, he received 197.

Three Stars Just Missed
These other bignames stars fell just short, George Sauer getting 179 votes, Wes Willie Keeler 177 and Eddie Collins 173. One possibility of two of them, should make the grade next year. Others who trailed Alexander included Red Dahlen, 148; Frank Chance, 133; Ed Delaney, 132; Ed Walsh, 119, and Johnny Evers, 91.

Those whom Alexander joins in the baseball temple are Ty Cobb, Babe Ruth, Honus Wagner, Christy Mathewson, Walter Johnson, Napoleon Lajoie, Tris Speaker and Cy Young.

LAUNCHED FASCISM IN NEW WORLD

SINCE he seized the presidency through a military revolt in 1936, Getulio Vargas has led Brazil through the disposal of Brazilian legislative bodies and assumed dictatorial powers. Now, in a final coup, he has promulgated a new constitution for the Southern American republic, dissolved all legislative bodies and assumed dictatorial powers.

This ends the democracy which Brazil first knew 48 years ago with the depositing of Emperor Dom Pedro II, and the corporate state principle is introduced for the first time in the New World. Both Rome and Berlin hailed the Vargas dictatorship as a totalitarian advance.

Year by year Vargas has been intensifying himself, winning the military to his cause. His first act in 1937 after he seized power was to recall to active duty all officers who were exiled or retired for their participation in the Sao Paulo revolt of 1934. He promoted, he suppressed a Latin uprising against his regime. Brazil operated under virtual martial law since thousands of political offenders have been imprisoned, absolute censorship has been imposed, and the press has been gagged.

TOO COLD TODAY FOR OUTSIDE JOBS

Reports of Temperature As Low As 25 Below Reveal; Many Autos Freeze Up

It was too cold this morning for men employed on WPA projects in Manchester to work. Although they reported at the town garage at 7 o'clock this morning ready to go to work the reading was 18 below zero, considered too cold to carry on outside work.

The town's garage is located on Harlow's street and low readings came from that section of the town this morning. At Pitkin's and East Center street there was a reading of 24 below. On Tanner street readings of 22 below were recorded and in Buckland there was a reading of 24 below. In the northeast corner of town readings of 20 below were reported. Delmont street reported a 20 below reading and at the police station at 7 o'clock this morning there was a reading of 18 below. At Main and Oak street at 7 o'clock there was a reading of 18 below, but in most places the average was about 12 below.

A big change was noticed in the temperature in three hours at Depot Square. With a reading of 10 below recorded at 7 o'clock this morning the mercury started to mount and at 10 o'clock it was 15 above.

Gasoline stations were doing a big business this morning furnishing anti-freeze, and in many cases cars left in cold garages could not be started. Towing was demanded starting early this morning and several found it necessary to use buses and trolley cars to get to work because of inability to start their cars.

Many auto motes were noticed on the streets this morning, proceeding behind clouds of steam that came from frozen radiators.
