New England Governors Confer On Flood Control

Fresh Labor Disturbances Arise As Premier Organizes Government Backed By The Moderate Leftists.

FACES TROUBLE

Paris, Jan. 19 .- (AP)-New bor disturbances arose today t harass the remodeled government of Radical-Socialist Camille Chautemps, and the premier at once called a conference of his ministers to deal with them. The labor issue and accompanying 'all of the france forced out Chautemps' previous People's Front Cabinet which included Socialist ministers and had Communist support in Parliament.

Eighteen of the 20 ministers in the new Cabinet are Radical-Socialists. No Socialists are included, and Communist support apparently will be unnecessary to keep it intact.

Radical-Socialist Foreign Minister Yvop Delbos and Defense Minister Edouard Daladier retain their posts, assuring continuation of France's vast defense program.

Chautemps formed the government yesterday, the fifth day of the longest French Cabinet crisis since the World War, when Socialists in the Chamber of Deputies assured him their Parliamentary support.

The Cabinet meeting was set for Thursday morning.

Bordeaux Deadline Set

The recurring labor disturbances included a demand by Bordeaux municipal employes that the City Council increase living allowances. The notice set Jan. 27 as the deadline for completing negotiations before a general strike order.

Paris municipal employes gained increased living allowances by general strike last month, and the rising cost of living attributed to the fall of the franc has been the basic cause of the strike wave.

The regional office of the General Federation of Labor approved a striffe by Lyons laundry workers, after employers teclined to accept arbitration of a wage controversy.
