HAWAII, OUAKE SHAKEN, FEARS ITS VOLCANOES

Mauna Loa May Have Been Seat Of Temblor; Damage At Honolulu Not Heavy; Watching For Eruptions.

Honolulu, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Hawaii residents today repaired minor damage resulting from an earthquake which scientists kept a close watch for possible eruptions of numerous active volcanoes on Hawaii, southernmost island of the mid-Pacific group. Possibility that Mauna Loa, one of the three great volcanoes on that island, might have originated the temblor, was expressed by Commander J. H. Peters of the Coast Geodetic Survey.

Peters expressed belief the epicenter of the quake, which began at 10:05 p. m. Saturday (3:35 a. m. Monday local time), and lasted two minutes, was around Hawaii Island. Assistant Volcanologist Hugh Weesche said if the quake originated there it probably was from Mauna Loa, though he declared earth tremors of the type felt did not forecast an eruption.

The earthquake cracked plaster, tumbled crockery from shelves and frightened island residents, but no casualties were reported.

Thought 100 Miles North. Dr. Thomas A. Jagger, volcanologist, said at Hilo, Hawaii, the earthquake's center was near Molokai or Lanai islands, approximately 100 miles north of the active volcanoes on Hawaii Island.

He said the quake might have been in Molokai Channel, and expressed belief it was "probably very big at its origin, and may have been very deep."

Waimanalo, at Lahaina, Maui, were put out of commission, and cracks in the earth were reported elsewhere on the eight islands which felt the shocks with varying degrees of intensity.

At Santa Clara, Calif., Dr. Albert J. Nevins, director of United States University's Board of Observations, said his seismograph registered shocks of great intensity from the vicinity of the Hawaiian islands for two hours 20 minutes, beginning at 12:30 a. m. Sunday (3:30 a. m. local time).

Worst in 11 Years. Though damage was slight, Peters said it was the "worst earthquake in 11 years."

Mauna Loa, which put on a spectacular display late in 1935, is outstandingly active, and is outbursting with its "pit of everlasting fire," Hialemauani, another famous crater at Hualalai.

Mauna Loa's last eruption threatened Hilo, a city of 20,000 population, with damage from molten lava, but army fliers dropped 600-pound bombs on the outlets of lava tubes and sealed them up.

FRENCH LOCATE GUNS AGAINST FRANCO PLANES

Air Warfare On Spanish Border Spills Over Into France; Both Factions Engage In Deadly Bombings.

Perpignan, France, Jan. 24.—(AP)—French army authorities today hastened installation of new anti-aircraft batteries along the Spanish frontier to fight off insurgent warplanes as Spain's devastating aerial warfare had spilled over into French territory.

At least 50 persons were killed and hundreds wounded in the fury of the air warfare between the Nationalist and government striking and receiving punishment in return.

GATHER EVIDENCE AGAINST KIDNAPER

G-Men Believe Ross Slayed Will Be Sentenced Quick- ly To The Electric Chair.

Chicago, Jan. 24.—(AP)—John Henry Seadlund, confessed kidnap-slayer of Charles E. Ross, sat chained to the bars of a skyscraper cell today while Federal agents forged the case against him. He is charged with the slaying of Ross on September 25, and with kidnaping the latter's son, James Atwood Gray, the swarthy fugitive's accomplice in the crime. Their bodies were found chained in a crude, wood-lined cave in the Wisconsin north woods.

The Lindbergh law provides the death penalty if the victim had not been liberated unharmed. Lawyers said since Seadlund made a complete confession and led Federal agents to the bodies and to his cached ransom he would likely plead guilty.

An expert began the task of sitting thousands of words spoken by leaders of industry, labor and government during three weeks of hearings. President George H. MILTON TAKES SEAT IN SENATE DESPITE PROTESTS BY LABOR

While the new Democratic Senator was signing the Senate register, Vice-President Roosevelt announced that he was referring to the elections committee protests filed against Milton by the Non-Partisan League and others.

The new Senator was sworn by Garner before galleries crowded with spectators and friends.

Milton was escorted to the rotunda to take his oath by Senator Smathers (D., N. J.). Standing in the rear of the chamber watching the ceremony was Governor A. Harry Moore, his predecessor in the Senate who appointed him.

After Garner had referred the Non-Partisan League's protest to the elections committee, Chairman George (D., Ga.) of that committee said he had received "numerous letters and protests" to the appointment of Milton.

Garner said these also would be referred to the elections committee. "Corrupt Machine."

The Non-Partisan League's protest against Milton on the grounds he owed his appointment to a "corrupt political machine" and was previously out to hold the office.

Two officers of the league said in a complaint that Milton was named to the Senate because of an alliance with a "corrupt political machine" which has consistently voted against the league since the late election laws, which has lashed the public treasury and which has encouraged a reign of virtual dictatorship.

Dozens of Senators crowded around Milton as he took his place at a desk in the rear of the Republican side where the overflow from the big Democratic plurality is seated.

CAMPAIGN FUNDS FIGURE IN CHARGE

Governor Cross Reveals Letter Describing Activities in Highway Dept.

Hartford, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Changes of high pressure campaign fund activities by the state highway department estimated at \$40,000 shortly before the 1937 state elections were revealed today by Governor Cross.

The charges, the governor said, were made by Edward J. Holohan, a department employee on one of the first Merritt highway PWA construction projects.

Mr. Holohan, according to the governor, wrote him a letter of protest in which he said that he refused to contribute and subsequently was discharged.

Mr. Holohan, then Democratic candidate for Representative in the town of Danbury, and now employed as an engineer in Washington, told the governor that he was approached on Oct. 4, 1936, by the highway engineer, who told him that "Mr. W. Bushnell, engineer, was in contact with you and asked you to contribute to the campaign fund."

The governor made the Holohan letter public today and will accept from a Bridport engineer, who he made on Oct. 31, 1934, in which he denounced the method of disbursement.

The governor quoted Holohan's letter in describing the campaign program as "political chicanery."

Soliciting campaign contributions by projects commenced by Federal funds is a violation of Federal law, the governor said.

Governor Cross disclosed that he interviewed Holohan and later, William S. Meany, former Federal coordinator in Connecticut, "who said it and gave me a verbal report."

"I took it up with Washington," the governor said. "Inquiries into the Federal angle of the matter are being investigated. What because of this investigation is a matter that is apparently located in the secret archives of the Federal government."
