

### OVER 1,500 WOMEN AT FINAL HERALD COOKING SESSION

#### Record Attendance Today At State Theater As Last In Series Is Held; Grand Prizes Awarded Today.

Completing a busy but an intensely interesting week of daily courses in home management and modern cookery, Miss Edna M. Ferguson, The Herald's culinary expert bade farewell to her final Manchester audience of the current series at the state theater this noon. One of the largest crowds ever to attend a Herald cooking school 1,500 persons jammed the theater for the final appearance of this talented lecturer.

#### CHINESE DIVISION CIRCLED BY JAPS

##### Shanghai Reports Say Fighting Is At Close Range; News From The Fronts.

Shanghai, Feb. 4.—(AP)—A ring of Japanese bayonets closed in today on a Chinese division cut off from reinforcements and supplies on the frozen, bottom-land battlefield over the highway which separates the Japanese sources, which sent word of the struggle along the Hwai river valley, said the Chinese division was in retreat from Pengpu and might fight in the Cotabambas isolated it.

### AIR BOMBERS SINK ANOTHER BRITISH SHIP

#### Freighter Sent to Bottom By Mallorca Planes; British Crew And Observer Are Saved By Loyalist Vessels

Barcelona, Feb. 4.—(AP)—The British freighter Alcira, trying to run the Spanish insurgent blockade, was bombed by two planes and sunk today 20 miles southeast of Barcelona. Her crew of 25 and an observer for the Non-intervention Control, all British, were rescued by a Spanish government sloop and fishing vessels and brought to Barcelona. A Barcelona communiqué said the planes came from the direction of Palma, Mallorca, insurgent naval air base.

Like the British freighter Enderby, sunk by an unidentified submarine off the Spanish coast Monday, the Alcira was trying to carry a cargo of coal to a government port.

The Alcira, 1,367 tons, left Gibraltar for Barcelona Jan. 31, under command of Captain M. McCracken of Glasgow.

Owners Got No Word  
London, Feb. 4.—(AP)—A Reuters (British news agency) dispatch from Barcelona today said the Spanish government Defense Ministry announced that the British steamer Alcira had been bombed and sunk by two insurgent planes about 20 miles southwest of Barcelona.

The entire crew and an observer of the non-intervention committee were rescued and were being brought to Barcelona. The announcement said:

"The Alcira, 1,367 tons, left Gibraltar for Barcelona Jan. 31, under command of Captain M. McCracken of Glasgow, nor the London admiralty and word of the sinking.

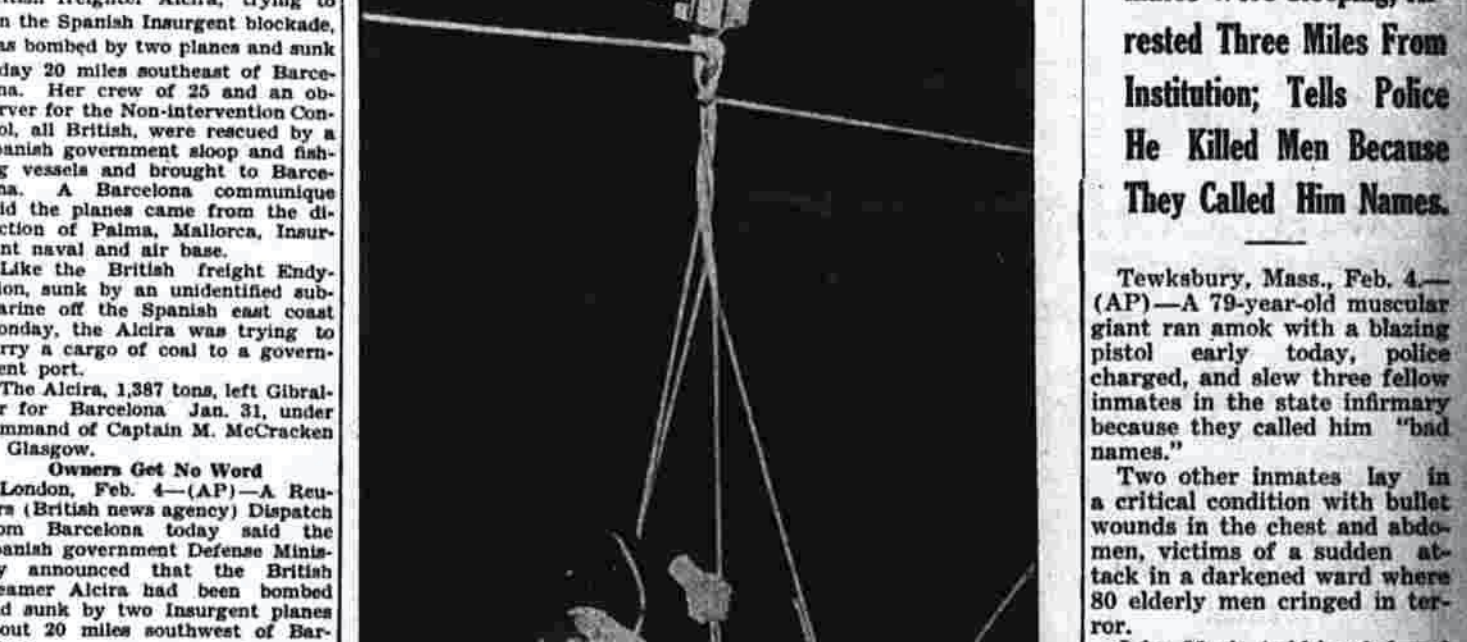

CALL SEC. PERKINS TO SENATE PROBE

Says Enactment Of Provisions Of New Maritime Bill Would Be A Mistake.

Washington, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Secretary Perkins told the Senate Commerce committee today that enactment of the labor provisions of the new maritime bill "is anything like that" would be a "mistake."

These provisions, recommended by Joseph P. Kennedy, former chairman of the Maritime Commission, would restrict the right of seamen to strike much as railroad laborers' right to strike is restricted.

Senator Burke (R-Neb.) said, meanwhile, he had "little expectation" that the Senate Judiciary committee would grant the request for an investigation of the National Labor Relations Board.

The committee, in closed session, also asked Miss Perkins to explain why her department had not deported Harry Bridges, C. I. O. leader on the Pacific coast.

Bridges, Australian-born, was a leader of both the 1934 and 1937 waterfront strikes. Miss Perkins has said the department was investigating charges that he was a Communist and subject to deportation.

The labor secretary suggested that Congress let present waterfront labor development continue as the best way to obtain eventual peace.

"The existing governmental agencies can help," she said.

The National Labor Relations Board is already helping with its election and with its enforcement of the prohibitions against unfair labor practices and interference with the right to collective bargaining.

Commissioner Can Aid "I think the United States Maritime Commission also can help a great deal by encouraging and promoting the practices and procedure of collective bargaining among the shipping companies."

The Department of Labor is also willing to assist in this development, she said.

When this has been achieved to an extent that approval of the National Labor Act will be more than the time will be right for enacting a law similar to this bill for the shipping industry.

One of the recommendations was for a permanent advisory council on small business to consult with the government.

Stephen T. Early, a presidential secretary, told newspapermen after the White House meeting that President personally did not want to name such a committee, but had asked both his colleagues to advise with Secretary Hoover with a view to setting up such an organization.

Some impracticable. When the committee of little business men ended their interview, Early said that while President felt many of the conference recommendations were constructive, he felt that others were impracticable. Early would not specify which proposals the President thought were impracticable.

He said the President had said that he had found the discussion "very, very interesting," and that while making the report had shown on the whole a wide and clear understanding of many of the problems of government.

Others in Court. An Asbury Park nurse, whom Frankel identified as Mrs. Corcoran Fisher, was the other woman in the case. She was 23 and she told him of receiving an unsigned letter threatening bodily harm to Rooney.

Rooney and Mrs. Fisher, a widow with a son, planned to marry next week, Frankel said.

The tavern keeper's husband, who is a shipping agent for an oil company in Bayonne and visited her in the case, told her she had permission to leave the tavern and to see Mrs. Rounds' auto.

"I would recommend that Rooney threatened to kill her. She was in the bathroom, had it on a table in her living quarters and warned him that she had always said that she would not have anything to do with him if he did it and it went off as he turned to go."

Rooney was shot through the heart and both lungs.
