

FARM BILL GAG RULE IS MET BY HOUSE PROTEST
Democrats Join in Opposition To Five Hour Limit On Debate; Dairy State Members Resent Changes

Washington, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Administration leaders attempted to force the revised farm bill through the House today under strict debate limitations despite protests of some members that a "gag" was being applied. The Rules Committee asked House members to agree to vote on the bill after five hours' discussion, without amending it or objecting to individual provisions.

RIVERS ARE RISING IN MICHIGAN AREA

Thawing Snow, Flood Danger Most Pressing Near Chatham, Ontario.

Detroit, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Rivers swollen by persistent thawing covered their banks in many Michigan communities today reviving a flood menace that seemed to have faded yesterday.

The same condition prevailed in Ontario where the Thames river resumed a rise that had halted yesterday. The flood danger there was most pressing at Thamesville, near Chatham, Ont. Dammed by a 15-mile low dam extending from Chatham to Prairie Sliding, the Thames overflowed its banks in the Thamesville area, backing up nearly 100 feet.

In Wisconsin, six roads in Kenosha county south of Milwaukee were closed by floodwaters, but the water was receding elsewhere in the state.

In Michigan, floodwaters were receding in many places, but the water was causing most of the damage yet, into the next few days.

Near Grand Rapids, the Grand river rose three feet, 24 hours North of the city, 40 families have been moved from their homes to a nearby school building.

The Saginaw river was rising but the water was receding in many places. Thousands of acres of low-lying land were under water.

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MINZ IS FINED \$10 FOR UNCLEAN HOUSE

Pleads Not Guilty But Admits To Be Lessee Of The Buckland Block.

Brought into Town Court last night on a charge of keeping an unsanitary house, Harry Minz of 221 North Main street, who said that he was the lessee of a boarding house in the Buckland block, pleaded not guilty to the count. He was represented by Attorney William S. Hyde.

It was from the Minz boarding house that Michael Strauss, aged farmer, was taken by police last week after a complaint had been made by neighbors that there was no ventilation of a neglected condition. Strauss, removed to the Manchester Memorial hospital, died there two days after his admission.

Policeman Harold V. Heffron, called to the stand, said that the information as to Strauss' condition came to him, and that, on orders from his superiors, he, in company with two other policemen and Sanitary Inspector Dr. Forbes Bunnell, went to the Minz property and found the premises in a filthy condition. Heffron said that the bed in which Strauss was found other beds in the place, that bed clothing was in a disgusting condition of dirtiness, and that litter and junk of all sorts filled the room.

Dr. Bunnell, in corroborating Strauss' statements, said that the Minz house was generally in a filthy and rotten state, and that he had issued orders for the destruction of some bed clothing and a general cleaning and overhauling of the place. Bunnell said that a later inspection showed that his instructions had been carried out by Minz.

Dr. D. C. V. Moore and Policeman Walter Casella, called to the stand by the prosecution, testified to the contents of the other two witnesses for the state in their affidavits.
