At 84 Today, Mrs. Cleary Recalls How Town Grew Born at Present Center of Town She Recounts the Coming of the Steam Cars and Trolleys to Manchester.

Mrs. Julia Cleary, widow of Michael Cleary, today is observing the 84th anniversary of her birth, having been born in Manchester on February 10, 1854. Mrs. Cleary was born in a house located at the corner of Main street and what is now the Old Fellows building and with the exception of about three years of her life has always lived on or within eight of Center street.

Today she is observing the event at the home of her daughters and her son, No. 8 Newman street, where she lives with her daughter, Mrs. Cleary was the first of eight children born to John and Elizabeth (Butler) Shaw. Her father had come to the United States from Ireland on the ship "The Enterprise" in 1838, and settled first in Three Rivers, Mass., where he conducted a school, having been at teacher in Ireland. Among the papers that are still kept by Mrs. Cleary is a certificate of qualification issued by Daniel O'Connell Hall to the east boundary of property on the east side of what is now Edgerton street.

The first piece of this farm sold by the Knott family was to her father who in 1858 purchased land that had for its east boundary property owned by the Hill family. It extended from Center street back to what is now Valley street and included part of what is now Newman street. On this site he erected his home and moved into it on January 1, 1860. Mrs. Cleary has lived just over 100 yards away from that place since.

Mrs. Cleary attended the private school taught by Jane Cheney. She was a sister of the eight Cheney Brothers who started the silk business in Manchester. Among those who attended the school taught by Jane Cheney were Miss Taylor, Mrs. Catherine Farley and Miss Mary Cheney, and Frank Cheney, Jr. The school house was located at Hartford road and South street, opposite the present house of Company No. 1 of the South Manchester fire department. Mrs. Cleary recalls that the building was later moved to the north end of West street and was occupied by the John Constable family, who conducted a night school there.

The South Manchester railroad station was built in 1858 and it was possible to walk along the railroad tracks to "Opportunity" as a section was then known and to see other places. After part of the Knott family had moved to John Sullivan and the next piece to John Cleary was the piece of land now all located to the west of Knox street. The first house on this land was a street bought from the Knott farm and was known as "The Cottage". The "neighbors" on the west were the Case family, who lived at the corner of what is now Moore and West Center street, now known as the Case family property. The "Cottage" street, so there was not much crowding in the early days.

The coming of the steam train to South Manchester in 1868 was an event, but it was not as important as the coming of the trolley line through Center street. This brought more people to the city and the trolley line in building up of both sides of the street. The trolley line was built by the Manchester and Lowell street cars and trolley company.
