

G. O. P. STARTS 1938 CAMPAIGN LINCOLN DAY
Party Leaders Will Launch Fight For 60 Congress Seats At Meeting In 50 Cities Throughout Country

Washington, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Abraham Lincoln's birthday speeches will start the Republican party tonight on the 1938 political campaign aimed primarily at increasing the party's strength in Congress. Republican senators, representatives, and party leaders have deployed to more than 50 cities to speak at dinners honoring the memory of the Great Emancipator—and incidentally supplying forums for attacks on Democratic party policy.

Senator Vandenberg of Michigan, discussed by party members as a possible presidential nominee in 1940 will speak in Boston at the Middlesex Club dinner. His address (at 9 p. m., e. s. t.) will be broadcast by one of the large radio chains (NBC). Senator Lodge of Massachusetts will address the same meeting.

At Grand Rapids, Mich., a dinner of Kent County Republicans will be addressed by Senator Bridges of New Hampshire and John Hamilton, chairman of the National committee. Representative Maper of Michigan also will speak.

At Alton, N. Y., the Republican club of New York, where Senator Vandenberg spoke in 1936 and Alf M. Landon in 1927, the main speaker will be Governor George D. Aiken of Vermont. Representative Bruce Barton of New York will introduce Aiken.

Five Republican representatives were chosen to speak on a coast-to-coast broadcast from Washington this afternoon (2 p. m., C. B. S.). They are Representatives Allen of Illinois, Reece of Tennessee, Stefan of Nebraska, Tobey of New Hampshire and Reed of New York.

Party officials said that efforts in the 1938 campaign would be concentrated in about 100 congressional districts in the hope of picking up between 50 and 60 House seats. The most painstaking analysis of the vote cast in these districts as far back as 1928 has been made, one official said. "Everything has been included from the percentage of votes cast in the rural and urban areas to religious and racial alignments."

What are described as "two novelties" will be introduced in the campaign. The first, headquarters explained, will be a man at the rank and file of the party rather than from a few. The other will be the newly-formed program committee designed to bring some kind of national thinking into the party.

SEE BIG FARM BILL MAJORITY IN THE SENATE
Barkley Says Yesterday's Test Vote Of 48 To 31 Will Be Unchanged; Is Rapped By Dairy States

Washington, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Democratic leaders expressed confidence today the administration's crop control program would be approved by an overwhelming majority when the Senate votes Monday. The all-knowing senator who speaks of what he says, there will be no changes made in the bill.

Majority Leader Barkley of Kentucky said he asserted the bill had passed its stiffest test when the Senate voted 48 to 31 yesterday against sending it back to conference with the House.

The Senate will vote Monday at 3:30 p. m. (e. s. t.), by agreement, its approval would send to the White House the complicated measure for production and marketing controls on cotton, wheat, corn, tobacco and rice crops.

Barkley agreed late yesterday to avoid a Saturday session, after critics of the bill had prolonged final Senate action two days.

Opponents to speak Republican leader McNary of Oregon said Senators Borah (R., D., Neb.) and King (D., Utah) would have something to say Monday. All have been critical of the legislation.

Recommendation of the bill was asked yesterday by Senator Duffy (D., Wis.), and others because of changes made by the Senate-House conference committee in a provision intended to protect dairy and livestock regions from competition by stock raisers who cut down their production of crops covered by the bill.

Opponents of the changes contended that the bill would underwrite new competition, particularly in the dairy and livestock industries.

HUNDREDS HOMELESS IN CALIFORNIA FLOOD
Rains Continue For 17th Day; Death Toll At Least 14; Bridge Is Washed Out; Coast Highways Blocked

San Francisco, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Flood-filled lowlands dotted wide areas of central and northern California today in the wake of a record-breaking 17-day rainfall that left 1,000 temporary homeless in one town and accounted for a storm death toll of at least 14.

Hundreds of swollen streams poured flood waters across low lying areas from Fresno, 400 miles north, to Red Bluff, as rain fell today for the 17th consecutive day.

ROOSEVELT BACKS VINSON NAVY BILL
Georgia Congressman Would Amend Measure With A Non-Aggression Clause

Washington, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Most Congressmen accepted today an administration exposition of policy the proposal of Rep. Vinson (D., Ga.), to write into the Navy expansion bill a declaration against aggression.

Some members of the House of Representatives today called for a declaration of emergency in the wake of the flood.

Peiping, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Heavy Japanese troop movements toward Inner Mongolia gave credence today to persistent reports that Japan is concentrating forces at Paochow in western Suiyuan Province, for a drive to cut China's 3,000-mile-long highway artery to Soviet Russia.

Large bodies of Japanese troops, with plenty of field artillery, have been rolling through Peiping lately toward Kalgan, capital of Chahar province. Chinese authorities at Hankow, temporary seat of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's government, were reported fearful of a Japanese drive to cut China's 3,000-mile-long highway artery to Soviet Russia.

There was no accurate information as to how much help Russia has been giving China in the way of supplies, but it has been reported on good authority that plans and equipment for the drive toward Kalgan, capital of Chahar province, have been given up for the time being.

It was said that Russia had taken advantage of the opportunity to use the Chinese-Japanese war as a testing ground for her own equipment, particularly aircraft.

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HAPPY LINCOLN

It is probable that more columns of type have been printed in America, with Abraham Lincoln as their subject, than about any other person, living or dead. A stogie copy of every Lincoln biography published since his death would fill the shelves of a considerable library.

The number of surviving Americans who had come into being at the time of his death is small. Of the ten adults who knew him in life or had ever seen him, none is left.

The occasion of his birthday anniversary is always seized upon by special pleaders for every sort of economic, social and political outburst to exploit his memory in behalf of their own particular theories or beliefs.

On this 125th anniversary we have had one word too much of the stogie pleading which masquerades as tribute to that great, often bewildered but always courageous defender in the common people of whom God had made so many. That is a word of profane thanksgiving that is lived with and not on the day. He was a simple, unassuming, unassuming, God-knows-but-one may shrink from contemplating the torments which must have been subjected if his time had been spent with ours.

Happy Lincoln, in your tomb, sleeping through it all!

PUT IT STRAIGHT

Twice recently we have expressed in these columns the belief that nothing was to be gained, in the way of ascertaining the intentions regarding the use of the navy, by quizzing admirals or other subordinate before a Congressional committee. And we are now more convinced than ever that there was no probability that any amount of digging would disclose anything in a plain of mutual assistance between the American and British navies, or even anything in the way of a naval pact or agreement between the two governments.

In this relation something of very great interest has occurred. On Thursday, just before adjournment of the House before the House Naval Affairs Committee on the naval construction bill, Representative Brewster of Maine demanded that Chairman Vinson of the committee call into Arthur Brock, chief of the Washington bureau of the New York Times. Mr. Brewster wanted to interrogate Mr. Brock concerning one of his signed articles in the Times, in which he referred to the "suspicion, pervading Congress, that our present program contains more than the ordinary can see."

Brewster was especially concerned over this paragraph in the article: "Probably that suspicion is true. This important fact should be known by all who are concerned with the future of the navy. It is a fact that is being kept secret by the two great democracies, their navies would automatically complement each other."

ONLY FIVE YEARS

Seven years ago hardly anyone could have predicted the kind of political results that have been achieved in the last five years ago by the National Socialist party, whose principles were pure Fascism, but who had been a factor in the Reichstag and through its policy of intimidation on one hand and its aggressive bombing on the other obtained German million votes for Hitler against the million for Von Hindenburg for President.
