CROP CONTROL BILL SENT TO PRESIDENT; PROGRAM IS READY

As Soon As Measure Is Signed 15,000 Persons Will Take Part In Carrying It Out; Various Comments.

Washington, Feb. 15.—(AP)—Agriculture Department officials, jubilant over Congressional approval of the crop control bill, arranged today to begin the new half-billion-dollar program the minute President Roosevelt signs it. More than 15,000 persons, they said, will have a part in carrying out provisions of the measure, which the Senate passed late yesterday and sent to the White House. These persons include more than 3,000 employees of the Agriculture Department, and the members of some 2,800 state and county committees. Two Republican Senators—Capp of Kansas and Prager of North Dakota—joined with 33 Democrats and Senator Norris (Ind-Neb) in approving the measure. The 11 votes cast against it came from 17 Democrats, 11 Republicans, two Farmers-Laborites and Senator La Follette (Prog-Wis). "This is a best farm bill that has ever been enacted by the Congress to deal with a great problem of American life," said Democratic Leader Barkley of Kentucky. McNary's Comment. Republican Leader McNary of Oregon, on the other hand, commented: "This bill does only one new thing for farmers. It puts new restrictions upon them and blankets them with compulsion. It will make every farmer a vassal of the secretary of agriculture." The measure, written by a Senate House committee from separate bills passed in December by the two chambers, establishes a system under which the agriculture secretary, working with farmer committees, may prescribe limitations on the quantity of wheat, corn, cotton, rice and tobacco grown or marketed.

POLICE FRUSTRATE NEW BRITAIN PLOT

Gang Had Arranged Elaborate Plans To Hold Up Telephone Office There.

New Britain, Feb. 15.—(AP)—Elaborate plans to stage a burglary at the Southern New England Telephone Company office here were frustrated by the arrests of Joseph Fioroussi, 23, of 130 Gold street, Frank Donigan, 24, of 71 Grove street, and Vincent Karwowski, 21, of 515 Burrill street on Sunday, Jan. 6, by Policemen Herbert Warner and James McGuire. It was revealed by State Policeman Henry Zaher of the Danvers barracks last night, as he and other state policemen continued their investigation into the burglaries in the State.

State Policemen Zaher said that two gangs of burglars, all of New Britain, had a working agreement. He said they staged 20 burglaries and obtained loot estimated in value at \$10,000. The disclosures were made, he said, in alleged confessions of some of the six arrested men. The others held are Michael Hanulak, 29, of 25 Willow street; Sebastian Rosseto, 34, of 34 Silver street and Aram Bogwian, 29, of 120 Leavor street; William Lavery, 37, of 466 Woodland street, Hartford, also held as an alleged fence. The State Policemen Zaher said that the local residents under arrest at the Southern New England telephone plot which called for the burglary about Feb. 10. Machine Makes 'Quakes' To Show If Ground's Firm

New York, Feb. 15.—(AP)—A boring holes to find out what kind of foundations to build on.

It also can be used to "densify" loose soil, such as new fills for highways or earth too loose for safety in building. He gave an example of a machine shop that was to be set on a foundation of piles. Instead of the upper ten feet of soil, shaking it down until it was so solid that the piles were not needed. The use of magnetic needles to locate the world's "biggest" meteorite, which is believed buried underneath meteor crater in northern Arizona, was reported by Hans Landberg, geologist, at the San Francisco bay.

These scientists have guessed that the meteor, coming in at a slant, buried itself not directly under the crater but 100 miles away. The magnetic needle, Landberg said, confirmed this scientific opinion, and indicates that the meteor lies about 1,200 feet down.

The next step, he said, will be to apply electric currents to the earth to locate lakes and streams of water that are known to lie above the meteor. After they are located, he predicted it would be possible to sink a shaft to reach the meteor. Surface fragments of the meteor, he said, are 96 per cent iron. It is supposed to weigh millions of tons and to have been broken into thousands of pieces.





New York, Feb. 15.—The resistance which Reichsmarschall Hitler is encountering in his attempt at complete Nazification of Germany represents the ferment of democracy showing itself.

It is a clear-cut indication—some choose to call it a warning—that this twentieth century no enlightenment of freedom will submit indefinitely to wholesale suppression of personal freedom and rights of participation in the affairs of their own country.

President Roosevelt recognized this trend in his recent message to Congress when he made the prediction that representative forms of government will return to, or be established in, those countries now so lacking it.


