American Express Concern Is Barred From Its Ware-

With Peace Bargains International Settlement. The protest, filed with Japanese consul-general Suemasa Okomoto, raised vital issues concerning foreign property rights in the settlement. Japanese gendarmes and consular police precipitated the metter by sealing the warehouse of the Commercial Express Company. Haif of the premises was occupied by a United States naval warehouse.

Since the international Settlement presumably is neutral territory, not involved in the war between China and Japan, and Americans and other treaty nationals enjoy the status of extra-territorialty, the Japanese action was regarded as a serious assumption of authority.
