While they waited for Germany to aid by making war against the Soviet Union, Rosengoltz said the conspirators collected about \$800,006 from the Germany army in exchange for Soviet military secrets. Rosengoltx asserted that Trotaky got more than a million dollars additionally through foreign companies and through a supposed agreement by Rosengoltz with an official of a foreign state and various firms.






