

PURGE WITNESS WORE TALISMAN CARRYING CURSE
Rosengoltz Lays It To His Wife; Experts Find Gorky And 3 Others Died From Lethal Acts Of Doctors.

Moscow, March 9.—(AP)—A scribbled prayer wrapped around a crust of dried bread was introduced today as further evidence of guilt against one of the 21 persons who have confessed to treason and murder in Moscow's greatest blood purge trial. This incident and further confessions to four bizarre medical murders ended examination of defendants in open court. A secret session was to follow soon. It was the trial's seventh session.

Says Wife Was Responsible
Rosengoltz quailed visibly in face of this apparent evidence of religious tendencies. His dark hair, his face took on the expression of a frightened bull. He said his wife put it in his pocket one day saying it was a talisman of her family and would protect him from danger. "I carried it for three months. Only after my arrest I found out about the prayer," he confessed.

Medical experts named by the court unanimously found that Maxim Gorky, the writer; his son, Maxim Fechtel; and Vsevolod Menshinsky, once head of the secret police, suffered from treatments administered by three eminent physicians accused of their murders, and that a heart ailment of Valerina Y. Kuzhisher, first hand-on the five-year plan, was criminally neglected.

AUSTRIAN LEADER ASKS REFERENDUM
Vote May Be Taken On Independence Within Next 8 Days, Vienna Reports.

Vienna, March 9.—(AP)—Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg, champion of Austria's independence, was reported reliably today planning an early referendum to win a mandate for his resistance to German encroachment. Semi-official quarters and sources at the Fatherland Front, Austria's only legal political party, said the plebiscite might be held within eight days.

SEC. HULL TO SEND ENVOYS TO TURKEY
U. S. Delegates To Arrange For Trade Treaty; First Time This Has Been Done.

Washington, March 9.—(AP)—Secretary Hull, who doesn't worry about polite questions of precedence when his reciprocal trade treaties are involved, soon will send a crew of American negotiators to Turkey. It will be the first time that the State Department has sent its trade agreement experts to a foreign capital, seventeen other treaties were negotiated at Washington, and Britain's representatives are well under way.

Coalition Of Democrats And Republicans Win Approval For Amendment By 180 To 124 Vote Despite Warning That Roosevelt May Veto Measure—To Be Brought Up Again.

Washington, March 9.—(AP)—The House tentatively struck from the tax revision bill today a proposed surtax on family-owned and closely held corporations.

Defeated in their initial attempt to save the most controversial item in the measure, administration forces said they would demand another vote on it before the House ballots on final passage of the bill.

A coalition of Republicans and Democrats succeeded in winning House approval for an amendment to strip the levy on closely held firms from the bill, although members had received shortly before a warning that a revenue measure with that tax eliminated might be vetoed by President Roosevelt.

Chairman Doughton (D., N. C.) of the Ways and Means committee, seeking to avert the fate of the amendment to kill the surtax, told the legislators that if the surtax were eliminated "in my judgment the bill will be vetoed."

There were yells of approval when he concluded. McCormack took exception to statements by proponents of the tax that supporters of its amendment had made an "unpleasant" middle class.

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Lie Detector Now Used As Advisor to Lovelorn

New York, March 8. — (AP) — Some repression or hidden trait may be an associate and a real subject—this is responsible for the trouble.

Dr. Marston whose book, "The Lie Detector Test" is published this week, said in several instances that the use of a lie detector has helped husbands and wives.

The William M. Marston test is used on all sorts of people from the man who accuses his wife of infidelity to the man who accuses his neighbor of being a burglar.

"The lie detector," Dr. Marston says, "is not a lie detector, but a truth detector."

He says that normally a person who tells the truth has a certain muscular reaction when he is asked to answer questions which are in any way contrary to his own feelings.

The "truth detector" is an instrument which records a jump in blood pressure when the person who is being questioned answers the question.

"Usually within a few minutes the person who tells the truth will uncover his own secrets," Dr. Marston says.
