F. D. R.'S PRESS TALK EXCERPTS ARE GIVEN OUT

President Makes Public The Language Of Many Chats With Reporters That Cast Light On New Deal Aims.

Washington, March 14. — (AP) — President Roosevelt made public today, in the form of excerpts from the stenographic record of his press conference, the language in which he explained some New Deal objectives to newspapermen during the first four years of his administration. Much of the language, originally "off the record" or "for background, not quotation," became public for the first time. They were little in its substance, however, which had not subsequently been included in speeches, messages to Congress and proposed legislation.

Chief interest attached to the evidence it provided concerning presidential thought processes, to Rooseveltian mannerisms, to the general catch phrases like "horse and buggy era" and "managed currency" and to the time when certain projects formed in the executive mind.

Selected Excerpts.
The President did not release the complete stenographic report of his conference. He selected only portions of transcripts of 16 of the 324 held from March 8, 1933, to December 29, 1936. These portions contained explanations either considered pertinent to the development of the story of the New Deal. Mr. Roosevelt had asserted, in describing the material, that it was selected for use in voluminous telling that story.

Five subjects relating to government have failed to be brought up in press conferences, though not all have been discussed fully there. For that reason, the selection of subjects touched on today's releases was accepted in some Washington circles as an index to the issues the President considered important.

Whenever the significance of the selection, the President chose labor and other social reforms, the independence of the states, the broad view of interstate commerce, the matters of tax evasion and avoidance, neutrality, anti-trust laws, holding companies and the Supreme Court for representation in the excerpts first made available to afternoon papers.

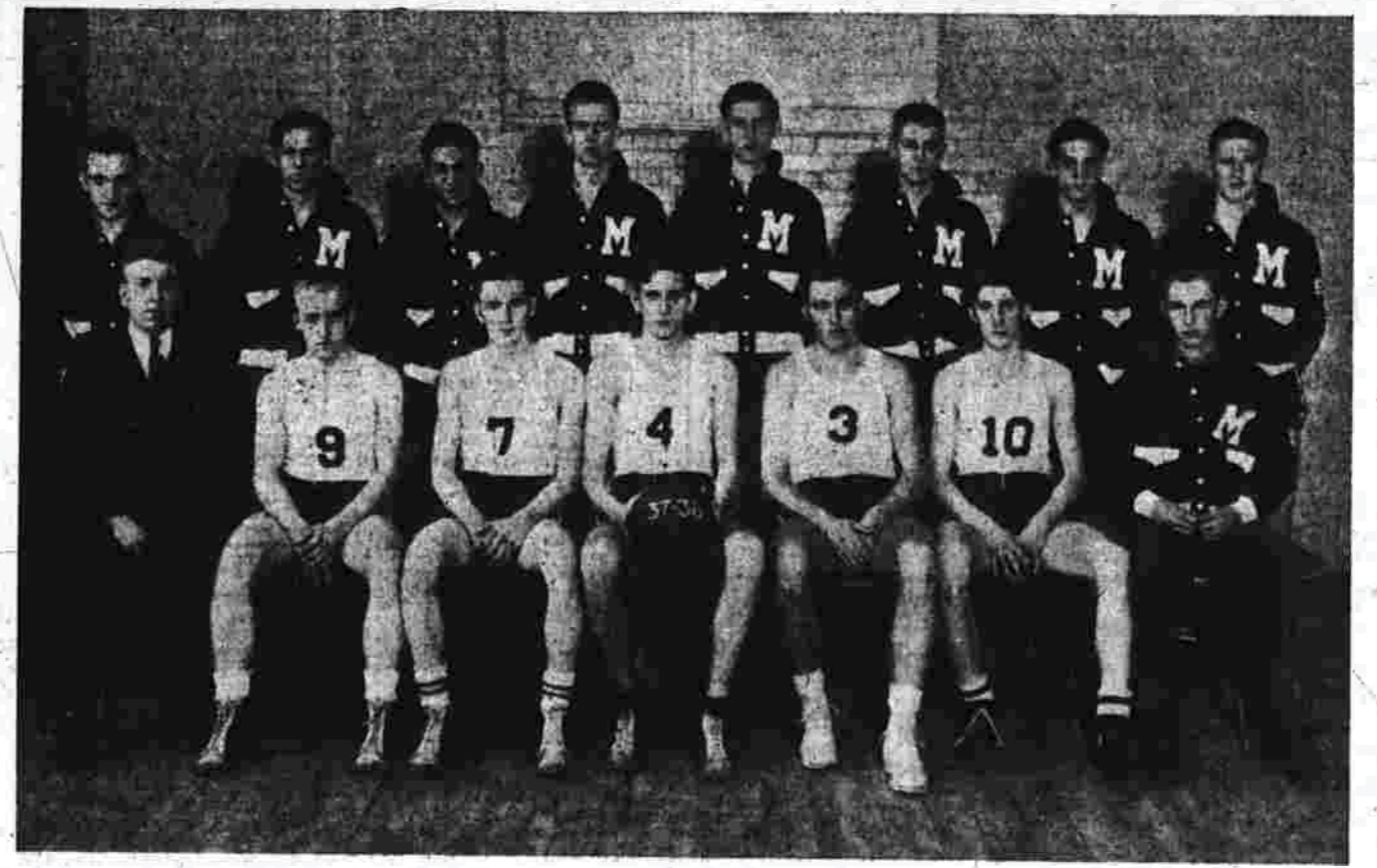

BRITAIN GAVE NO PLEDGE TO HELP CZECHOSLOVAKIA

Premier Tells Commons France Was Not Promised Aid If She Goes To War To Save The Republic.

London, March 14. — (AP) — Prime Minister Chamberlain today plainly warned Germany that Britain would expand her vast rearmament program to match force with force in answer to Reichsfuehrer Hitler's absorption of Austria.

However, the prime minister, in a vital statement of policy before a House of Commons packed and tense, did not promise British backing to France if she should go to war to save Czechoslovakia from Pan-Germans.

Chamberlain said Czechoslovakia has been in consultation with Britain and the United States. He said Britain would do its utmost to guard the Central European Republic for whose 3,000,000 soldiers Germany Hitler had proclaimed himself protector.

Chamberlain bluntly rejected a German statement that Britain had agreed to interest itself in Austria independence, the German answer to the World War by the annexation of Austria.

Chamberlain insisted Britain "must always be interested in developments in Central Europe." Ever since the World War they had learned to think of an independent Austria.

Chamberlain announced an immediate "review" of the British rearmament program.

ITALY'S FRIENDSHIP EXTENDED TO REICH

II Duce Sends Greetings To Fuehrer But Italians Seem Confused By Late Events.

Rome, March 14. — (AP) — Premier Mussolini today gave Reichsfuehrer Hitler his personal assurance of Italian friendship.

In a telegram to Hitler at Vienna II Duce declared "my attitude is determined by the friendship between our two countries connected in the Rome-Berlin axis."

Mussolini's communication was in reply to Hitler's earlier message that he would "never forget" II Duce's attitude toward his annexation of Austria.

Meanwhile many Italians, swayed by a controlled press from a stand for independent Austria to support the Anschluss, were told by the sudden turn of events.

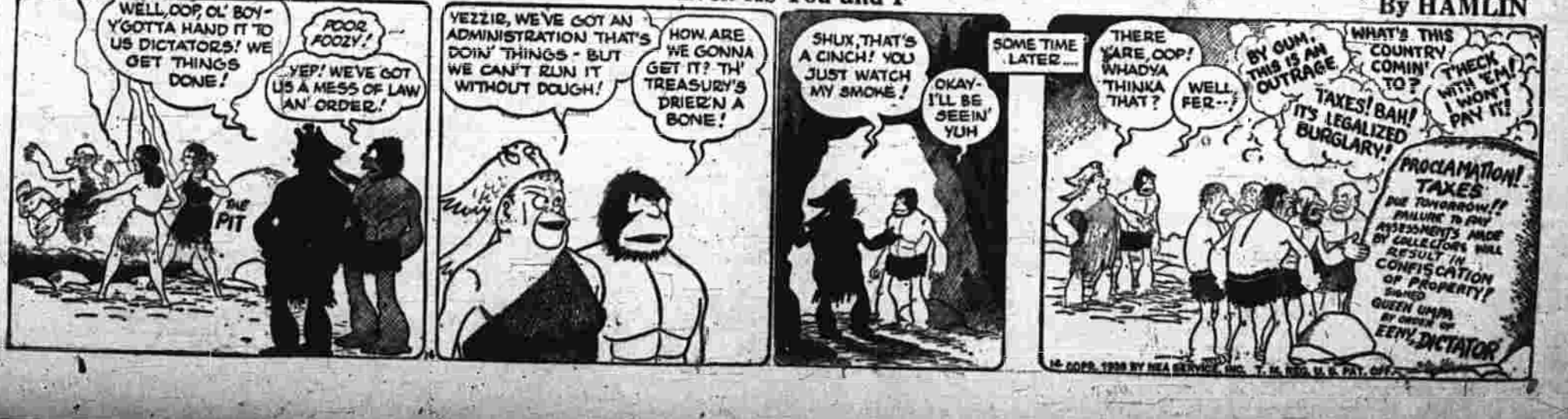
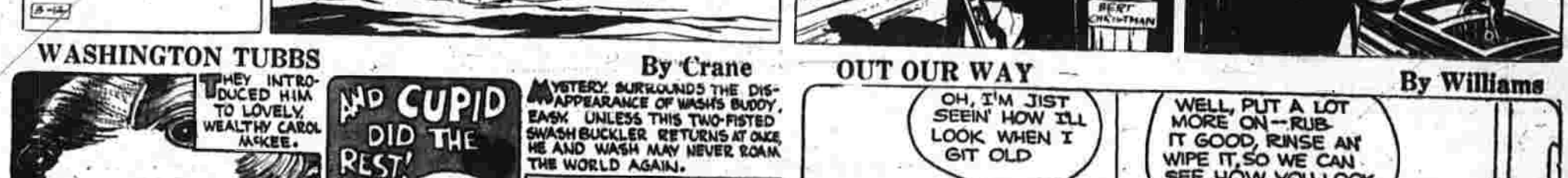

YOUTH SAVES LIFE OF YOUNG BROTHER

Eske! Buckland Binds Severed Artery From Which Brother Was Bleeding.

Bringing into play valuable teachings of his Boy Scout membership, Eske! Buckland, Jr., 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Eske! H. Buckland of 433 Kenner street, yesterday afternoon saved his younger brother, Everett, from bleeding to death when, in a fall through a glass door, the younger boy severed an artery and lacerated his right wrist.

As he fell downward, his wrist caught against the jagged glass, which knifed through artery and tendon, leaving the hand hanging useless. Blood, spurting from the artery, would have drained the boy's life out quickly had not his older brother seized a cord and made a rough tourniquet about the wrist which stanchied the flow of blood.

Returning the Bucklands took their son to the hospital where he received the attention of Doctors George A. Lundberg and D. M. Caldwell, who removed a long piece of glass from the boy's arm where it had been driven up under the skin by the force of his fall.

An operation was performed to save the motion of the muscle in the hand, and today, Everett was resting comfortably, due to his brother's quick, cool action.
