ARMY OF 40,000 JAPANESE CUT OFF IN SHANSI

Invasion Near Defeat, Says Red General Yu; Chiang Crosses Yellow River At 4 Points; Many Japs Killed

With the Chinese Red army in hopes of a decisive victory in North China, March 22.—(AP)—Chiang's Red army commander, Yu Chang-Tao, believes the Japanese army is near defeat at any time since the Oriental war began a little more than eight months ago (July 7). Guerrilla marches, the Red army general related at his headquarters here in Central Hopeh far behind Japanese lines, have isolated large forces of Japanese battling toward the Yellow River on the Central China front.

Their communications cut, transport trains wiped out, many of their small railway station garrisons annihilated, and their only food supply in some cases reaching them by airplane, many Japanese troops are in a precarious position, Yu said.

Among highlights of the situation of the Japanese, as pictured by Yu, were these:

Force of 40,000 isolated An army of 40,000 Japanese in southern Shansi has been isolated from its supply bases.

Red guerrillas scored five successes in recent days in attacks along the Peiping-Hankow Railway, wiping out small station garrisons.

MAGILL MAKES APPEAL TO KEEP PROFITS TAX

Treasury Official Tells Senate Group It Is A Means Of Equalizing The Total Tax Burden—His Plea

Washington, March 22.—(AP)—Roosevelt Magill, undersecretary of the treasury, appealed to the Senate Finance committee today to retain the undistributed profits tax.

He told the committee, in which a strong movement for repeal of the tax has been going on, that the Treasury favors the retention of a tax upon undistributed corporate earnings as a means of equalizing the distribution of the total tax burden.

Under the tax revision bill passed by the House, Magill said, approximately 88 percent of the 200,000 corporations which paid taxes in 1935 would be exempt from the undistributed profits tax. The House bill exempts corporations with incomes of less than \$25,000 and Magill declared the House also had attempted to prevent hardships upon corporations both by specific exemptions and by lower rates.

The undistributed profits tax, he said, has been improved in the House bill to contain "some notable relief features for special cases."

TOWN TO TOAST TWO CHAMPION TEAMS TONIGHT

Banquet To Be Given At Masonic Temple In Honor Of High School's Basketball Team And Track Squad

Manchester's testimonial banquet to its high school athletic champions in basketball and cross country is to be held tonight at the Masonic Temple.

Most of the guests will be devoted to the address of Arthur McKinley, sports commentator of Hartford. Joe McKinley will also talk, the former Forham High and two-time Olympian having consented to come home from New York for the banquet.

At a meeting of the general committee this morning, it was reported that plans are being made to serve 325 persons, including the guests of honor.

The committee has voted that all funds remaining after expenses are paid will be turned over to the school athletic fund and Princeton Edson M. Bailey said today that the surplus will be used entirely for a purchase of new basketball uniforms for next season.

Edward J. Murphy, a member of the Board of Education, will act as toastmaster at the banquet. Rev. K. E. Erickson, another member of the board, will deliver the invocation. Old time high school athletes will be called upon for brief remarks, as will the coaches of the teams being honored.

'NO MORE STATEMENTS' SAYS ARTHUR MORGAN AS FDR DEADLINE ENDS

As Deadline Is Reached, Chairman of TVA Refuses To Give Reasons Why He Should Not Be Removed, Is At His Ohio Home

Yellow Springs, O., March 22.—(AP)—Arthur E. Morgan announced today his flat refusal to meet President Roosevelt's request that he give "any reason" why he should not be removed as chairman of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

"I have no further statement to make, other than what I told the President yesterday," Morgan said, following his return to his Yellow Springs home.

President Roosevelt had given Morgan until 2:30 p. m. today to give "any reason" why he should not be removed as chairman of the TVA.

Morgan declined comment on what steps he would take in such an event. He said he intended to go to Chicago tomorrow and that other plans were uncertain.

The chairman, stern center of a controversy involving the TVA, came here to obtain a list of records, apparently for use in a controversy with his co-director, David E. Lilienthal and H. A. Morgan.

Fairfield Republican Leader Brings Records To Waterbury Jury; Declines To Talk To The Newsman

Waterbury, March 22.—(AP)—Harry E. Mackenzie, of Bethel, for many years a Republican leader in Fairfield county, came to the County Court House today and went immediately to the third floor where a grand jury is conducting the investigation of Waterbury affairs.

The last witness heard by the grand jury before it concluded the second week of its investigation last Friday was Charles E. Williamson of Darien, also a Republican leader and close political associate of Mackenzie.

Observers took the appearance of Mackenzie today as a further indication that the grand jury has excluded its investigation to alleged lobbying activities.

C. H. REMINGTON IS DEAD AT 62

Former Vice-President of Aetna Life Insurance Co. Passes After Brief Illness

Hartford, March 22.—(AP)—Charles H. Remington, 62, a former vice-president of the Aetna Life Insurance company who died at his home in Larchmont, N. Y., yesterday, will be buried in the Patriots cemetery, West Hartford, at 2 p. m. tomorrow. He was ill but not for many days.

Mr. Remington, who was connected with the Aetna Life for 25 years, resigned in 1926 and went to New York where he became president and director of the New York State Holding company, a real estate concern.

MEXICO PREPARING TO PROTECT TRADE

Treasury Dept. Now Taking Steps To Fix Price For U. S. S. British Oil Properties

Mexico City, March 22.—(AP)—President Lazaro Cardenas assured the United States today that exportation of foreign oil companies was "exceptional" and no similar measure was in prospect against other business.

As the Treasury Department took the first step today in taking the sum to be paid for 17 British and American oil companies for the sale of their Mexican oil properties, President Cardenas gave his assurance to industry in general in a statement that:

"No other measures which might affect the confidence of the country will be taken against other business, properties, bank deposits, values and other investments, which the government is ready to protect in accordance with the law."

He said he hopes now to create firms "which" without foundation might be created, as have been created, as a result of rumors spread by parties interested, that the measure which the government was compelled to take in regard to the oil properties will not misinterpret or obstruct.

HITLER'S SLEUTHS SEIZE SIGMUND FREUD'S PAPERS

Famous Jewish Scientist Reported Seriously Ill In Vienna; His Home Searched And His Office Closed

Vienna, March 22.—(AP)—Sigmund Freud, 82-year-old "Father of Psychoanalysis," was seriously ill today, close friends said, after a 2:30 p. m. today to present "any reason" why he should not be ousted.

The body of a middle woman clad in expensive clothing, found floating today in the Danube river, prompted police what they believed was a murder mystery.

Freud's papers, including his correspondence, were seized by the Gestapo. His home was searched and his office closed.
