Hartford, March 28.—(AP) —The 3 John's church for 20 years.

He had been ill for several weeks with a form of bronchial pneumonia and a throat infection. Although he preached Sunday, he was still severely ill and last night he complained of a tooth aliment.

Lewis telephoned West Hartford police after finding the body, and Dr. Henry N. Costello, medical examiner, inspected the body and gave permission for its removal to Pratt's funeral rooms.

Mr. Hooper was born in Bristol.


