

# QUARREL IN HOUSE AGAIN DELAYS VOTE ON REORGANIZATION

## Rep. Case Tries In Vain To Propose Means To Preserve Independence of The Comptroller General.

Washington, April 8.—(AP)—The House shouted down an amendment to the reorganization bill today which Representative Case (R., S.D.), proposed as a means preserving the independence of the general accounting office and comptroller general.

Consideration of that phase of the measure, followed House approval, without a word of debate, a provision of the reorganization bill that would authorize the President to appoint six administrative assistants. They would be paid \$10,000 a year.

After defeat of Case's amendment, Representative May (D., Ky.), proposed to eliminate all the provisions dealing with the general accounting office and a proposed new office of auditor general.

The scrap over the accounting section of the bill and another on the civil service commission, Speaker Bankhead told reporters, will make final action on the bill improbable before tomorrow.

Case said his amendment was the "crux of the entire discussion that has revolved around the comptroller general" and complained that the measure "strips every shred of independence from the comptroller."

Details of Amendment

The amendment stipulated that the general accounting office "shall be independent of the executive departments."

But Representative Vinson (D., Ky.), contended there "never has been an independent comptroller general's office."

The comptroller, Vinson said, is an executive officer of the government and may "take historical action who will take historical action."

"I submit and predict," the Republican went on, "that if the powers of the auditor general are permitted to remain as they are, you will have more saving in dollars than you could possibly hope for."

Agent of Congress

The new auditor general would make a post-audit of government expenditures and review decisions of the comptroller, however, and report to it.

Earlier Vinson had obtained approval, without any argument, of an amendment to fix a 15-year term of office for the comptroller, the same as he has under present law.

Pope contended that under the bill the comptroller general would lose his job the first time he made a decision which the President did not like. His rulings on governmental expenditures would be subject to review and criticism by a new auditor general, who would be an agent of Congress.

The House rejected the amendment in support of the bill's civil service.

## SENATE KILLS BOOST IN TAX UPON LIQUORS

### House Measure Adding 25 Cents A Gallon Knocked Out; Final Vote On Revenue Bill Near In Senate.

Washington, April 8.—(AP)—The Senate today rejected a proposal to increase the tax on hard liquor from 22 to 25 cents a gallon. The increase, voted in the House, was opposed by the Treasury and the Senate Finance Committee on the ground it would increase the price of liquor to 47 cents a gallon. The increase, which he said would have yielded \$20,000,000.

After little more than perfunctory objections from Senator Barkley of Kentucky, the administration leader, far-reaching finance committee proposals to wipe out the undistributed profits tax and over-haul the capital gains levy were approved yesterday without a roll call.

Barley forecast, however, that some form of the profits tax would be re-inserted by a joint conference of the Senate and House.

In general, the Senate voted to substitute a flat 18 per cent rate on liquor in place of a graduated scale.

Within a half hour of the 6-cent increase on imported goods, approved by both the administration and the Finance Committee, was rejected.

## ALABAMA TORNADO CAUSES 10 DEATHS

### Floods, Heavy Rains And Unusually Cold Weather Also Harassing The South

Birmingham, Ala., April 8.—(AP)—At least 10 dead, widespread suffering and wrecked property lay in the wake of a swirling storm on the Alabama-Mississippi boundary today while the south's farm population races the menace of ponding and Mississippi, as homes were looted and crops ruined.

All known deaths from the tornado which struck yesterday were at Alcoville, Ala.

Scores were injured in Alabama, and emergency stations were opened quickly and doctors and nurses rushed into the storm area.

# FRENCH SENATORS VOTE DOWN BLUM'S APPEAL FOR POWER

Paris, April 8.—(AP)—The Senate today voted down Premier Blum's appeal for dictatorial powers over French finance.

The vote came after a bitter debate in which the socialist premier, Edouard Daladier, his minister of defense, prepared a list of a new cabinet.

The vote was 223 to 49.

The senators refused to consider separate articles of the Premier's finance bill.

Blum declared that dictatorial powers over the nation's finance and economy formed the only solution to France's difficulties, and that if the Senate refused him to him they would have to give them to another government.

He said that the majority supporting him in the Chamber of Deputies—which gave his bill grinding approval Wednesday, 311 to 250—was "founded on the masses of this country in a movement of indignation."

Called Improper

# DETROIT'S STRIKE COMES TO AN END

Detroit, April 8.—(AP)—A strike that had tied up car service to 700,000 Detroit residents, ended today when union members ratified a settlement agreement. Cars immediately started to roll from barns to resume regular service.

The strike began at 4 a. m. Thursday when divisions of the Amalgamated Association of Street, Electric Railway and Motor Coach Operators of America (A.S.E.) overthrew its leaders and staged a mass walkout in an attempt to gain additional seniority rights.

Business continued to operate throughout the strike.

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# PRICES OF WHEAT STAGE AN UPTURN

Chicago, April 8.—(AP)—European nations led by Great Britain made their heaviest single day's buying of wheat in months today, a result world prices soared 3 to 4 cents a bushel.

Total purchases in the International market including the United States, Canada, Australia, and Argentina were estimated by traders to be as high as 10,000,000 bushels, a sharp contrast to recent handshakes of 100,000 bushels.

Reports indicated the United Kingdom acquired 13 to 20 cargoes of Australian wheat, 4 cargoes of New Zealand grain for fall shipment and 4,000,000 bushels of wheat during the period from September to February, and while the decline in industrial production since February has apparently been relatively small, thousands of workers are still being separated from industrial pay.

BUILDING THREE HOUSES ON FORBES ST. TRACT

Local Contractors Erecting Six-Room Dwellings In East Hartford Development.

T. E. Shannon and John Shannon of 79 Russell street, Manchester, are doing considerable work in the new development on Forbes street, East Hartford. They have been granted a permit for the erection of three houses and three garages on that street. Each of the houses will be a two-story frame dwelling with garage of the same materials. The three houses will be erected at 592, 598 and 602 Forbes street.

Plans for the three-story and two-story garages to be erected in South Windsor under a WPA project have been prepared by Architect Julius Wrenson. It will be 63 feet by 51 feet, of brick construction and two stories high.

The construction of the gasoline filling station on Brainard place by Rhoda Brothers for Malcolm Hervey and Theodore Vetas, both of New York, is well along. It will be what is known as a "one stop station." To the station there has been a driveway built by Aceto and Sivestor from two different points on the south side of Brainard place, it being necessary to remove considerable curbing in building the new driveway.
