DEFEAT OF JAPANESE IS GREAT DISASTER; LOSE HALF OF ARMY

Shanting Force's Losses Believed At Least 50 P. C.; Chinese Assert They Have Captured Over 100 Tanks

Shanghai, April 15.—(AP)—The Japanese army's spokesman today refused to deny or confirm the conclusion of most neutral military experts here that the Japanese army suffered a major disaster, its first in modern times, in the recent battle in southern Shantung province. The experts said conservative estimates indicated Japanese forces had suffered more than 50 per cent recovery in fighting of the past ten days, in which they were thrown back from Talerchwang on the Grand Canal to Tihien, 20 miles to the northwest.

Japanese reports indicated the Japanese command was speeding northeast, south and southeast toward the shanting battlefields, with hopes of retrieving the disaster. The foreign experts believed that 50,000 Japanese engaged in the fight for Talerchwang 7,000 to 10,000 were killed and 20,000 wounded. Jubilant Chinese claims of 20,000 Japanese killed were believed too high.

Chinese Losses Heavier

Chinese losses, the foreigners estimated, were two or three times as large as the Japanese, since the Chinese had much larger forces engaged and won in the final phase by smothering their foe by weight numbers, cutting off and destroying the French-occupied detachments from hand fighting.

Disaster Not Decried

"I have no information to give. Even if the figures mentioned were accurate, this would not be the time to announce them since they might indicate the strength of the Japanese forces."

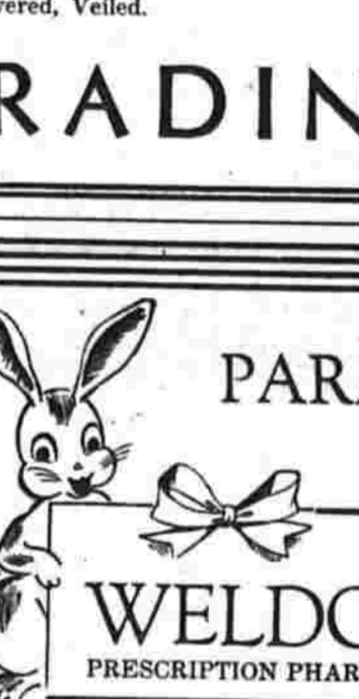

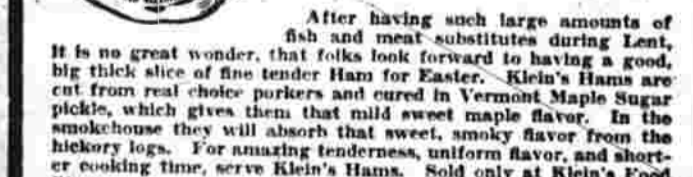

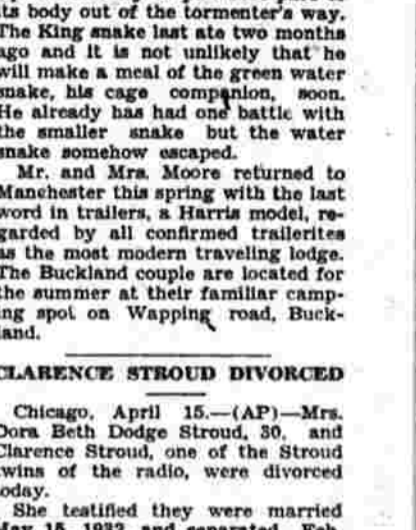

FOR centuries the harry Czechs and Slovaks groveled under the heel of the Hapsburg monarchy. Then the Austro-Hungarian Empire crumbled, and the Czechs and Slovaks, under the guidance of Dr. Thomas Garrigue Masaryk, united as a new democracy to preserve their nationalities.

But the democracy was not enough to save the man makers of 1918 included Germany and Poland and Hungary in the new boundaries of Czechoslovakia, and today these same minorities, which have been nurtured so graciously for 20 years, threaten to engulf Czechoslovakia in the greatest crisis of its history.

For Herr Hitler warns the 3,222,000 Germans in Czechoslovakia are entitled to "protection" of the Reich. Already the Nazi influence among these Germans is driving Czechoslovakia toward its final decision.

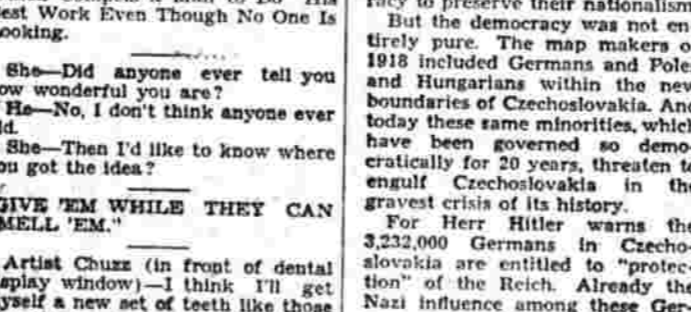

And to make the tiny nation's plight even graver, it is almost completely bounded by Germany.

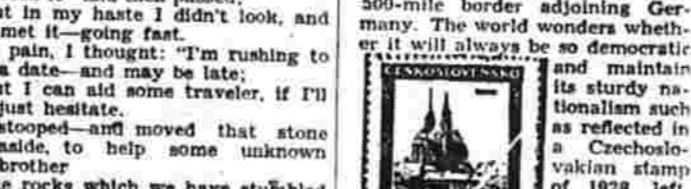
Most of its Germans live on the 500-mile frontier with Germany. The world wonders whether it will always be so democratic and may be late.
