

**CHURCHES HAIL JOYOUS EASTER DAY WITH SONG**

Programs of Rejoicing At Special Services in All Churches Tomorrow; Sunrise Service at 5 A. M.

Six weeks of solemn Lenten observances in Manchester churches will be climaxed tomorrow by the age-old appreciation of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the hillside tomb of Joseph of Arimathea near Jerusalem 1900 years ago.

Churches will be hushed with the traditional Easter lilies and other beautiful flowers of the season and clergy and lay people will rejoice in sermon and songs and pageantry accentuating the hope of all Christians—the Eternal—(an indelible record in the Resurrection of the Master.

The Old Goff lots off East Center street will be the scene this year of the annual Easter sunrise service sponsored by the Epworth League of the South Methodist church. Rev. Douglas McLean, pastor of the Wapping Federated church will be the sunrise service speaker. His subject will be appropriately "New Dawn." Easter hymns will be sung by the congregation under the direction of G. Albert Pearson, choir director of the Emanuel Lutheran church and music will be provided by the Salvation Army band.

**WRIGHT WORKSHOP DEDICATED TODAY**

Men Who Pioneered in Aviation Gather in Detroit; Orville Wright Is Present.

Detroit, April 16.—(AP)—Men who are leaders in present-day commercial and military flying gathered in Dearborn today to dedicate the Orville Wright workshop.

Orville Wright, who built the first successful airplane and taught the world to fly. Topping the list of notables was Orville Wright, who came here from his home at Dayton, O., for the anniversary of the 71st anniversary of his brother's birth, dedicating the newly-restored Wright home as a workshop in Henry Ford's early American village.

The house, in which Orville was born and in which Wilbur died 26 years ago, and the bicycle shop where they manufactured parts for their airplane were moved piece by piece from Dayton under the sponsorship of Henry and Edsel Ford.

Present in 1938  
 Two survivors of the little group that stood transfixed on the sands of Kitty Hawk near Kitty Hawk, N. C., on Dec. 17, 1903, when the Wrights demonstrated their theories of flight were here. They are John T. Daniels and A. D. Eberhardt, chief quartermaster who helped the Wrights in the historic flight.

Here also are three Army officers who observed military tests of the first Wright airplane offered the government. They are Major General Benjamin D. Foulois, retired, chief of the Army Air Corps; Col. Frank P. Lahm, Second Corps Area, Governors Island, N. Y.; and Col. Frederick E. Humphreys of New York City.

Among the notable aviators expected here are Vilhjalur Stefansson and Sir Hubert Wilkins, Arctic explorers; Major Lester Italian and Major Albert Hegenberger, and Major Albert Stevens, aerial photographer.

Also taking an active part in the day's program were the Earhart-Bridges organization of pioneer aviators which initiated the movement to reconstruct the Wright biplane in Greenfield Village to honor what is intended eventually to be one of the most complete aviation exhibits in the world.

While a comparatively few were to be actual witnesses of the dedication, radio listeners were to hear the 15-minute ceremony at 5 p. m. (e.s.t.) over National Broadcasting System networks. William J. Cameron, representing Henry Ford, was to make the dedicatory address.

**INSIST BERLIN ROME AXIS IS NOT AFFECTED**

Italians Hail British Pact As Surety of Peace But Feverishly Prepare Great Reception For Hitler.

Rome, April 16.—(AP)—European peace hopes rose today as Britain and Italy wrote into the Mediterranean tension which in the last three years had brought two traditionally friendly peoples to the verge of war. Italians hoped the signing (scheduled for noon e.s.t.) by Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano and the East of Perth, British ambassador, of an accord preliminary to an agreement between the two nations would mark a new era marked by understanding and mutual respect.

An additional guarantee of Mediterranean tranquility was promised with the signature of the Egyptian minister to that part of the agreement concerning Italian relations with Egypt.

Italians Believed  
 That resumption of friendly relations with Britain brought a feeling of relief to Italian everywhere was evident from the comment of the main Italian press as well as from the approving, albeit carefully defined editorials in the controlled press.

But the latter pointed out that the accord in no way replaced the Rome-Berlin axis nor changed Italian policy in general.

Fervent preparations continued for a grandiose reception to Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany, who is to visit Mussolini May 5.

Virginia Gayde in the authoritative Giornale d'Italia declared Italian policy "is not accustomed to change according to the whims of the season." It continues that course fixed by the keynote of the Rome-Berlin axis. "The Rome-Berlin axis is not unaccompanied," she said, "by a similar relationship with the United States."

The rank and file of Italians rejoiced at the prospect of end of the European war which had tended to divide Europe's great democracies and totalitarian states into two hostile camps.

See Ethiopian Recognition  
 They forecast the recognition of their Ethiopian empire. They were heartened by the prospect of a return of tourist traffic and trade relations once crippled by war across and press columns.

It Popok di Roma noted the coincidence this is the second Easter wherein the Fascist government signs records of fundamental importance for the present "systematization of its foreign relations: last year with Yugoslavia, today with England."

**YALE ECONOMIST FOR F. D. R. PLAN**

Prof. Rogers Declares Opponents of Spending Are The Dangerous Radicals.

New Haven, Conn., April 16.—(AP)—Professor James Harvey Rogers, Yale political economy advisor, today says any person who would oppose Roosevelt's program of government spending and credit expansion for recovery.

Refusal to co-operate in the program, Professor Rogers said in a formal statement, would give comfort to European dictators who regard our free economic system as outmoded and dangerous.

He described the president's plan, which he said was "the soundest yet offered by the Roosevelt administration," as "a program of holding things together" until "the economic crisis is past." He said that any revision of too drastic reform measures are accomplished.

The person who opposes such expenditures is today the dangerous radical, he said.

Only Means Available  
 Professor Rogers said that because business was severely contracted the President's program was the only means available for providing the population with income.

"To allow business to starve the public," he continued, "is to go to the only point of view but it is completely untenable for anyone holding to maintain our present economic order of free enterprise based on private property."

He said that "unstable" government policies which were being rapidly corrected by legislation now before Congress had brought about a reduction of the incentives (1) of business to expand and (2) of investors to purchase new securities and (3) of investment banking men.

**BIG NAVY FOES CENTER ATTACK ON HUGE SHIPS**

Three Committee Senator To Fight 45,000 Ton Floating Forts On Floor; Hold They Are Not For Defense Only

Washington, April 16.—(AP)—Opponents of the administration's "Big Navy" bill centered their efforts today on an attempt to eliminate authorization for three 45,000-ton super-dreadnaughts. If we can't defeat the bill, we may at least stop the building of these huge battleships, said Senator Nye (R-N.D.), a leader of the bloc which contends such vessels are unnecessary except for a campaign of aggression.

The Senate Naval Committee approved the \$1,150,000,000 expansion bill by a unanimous vote yesterday, but three Democratic members who did not vote—Borah of Washington, Gilette of Iowa and Holt of West Virginia—said they would oppose it on the floor. The measure may come up for debate Tuesday.

Both Senate and House were in recess today and also will take a holiday Monday.

Quick Passage  
 A pre-dawn rush for early passage came from Chairman Walsh (D-Mass.) who sought to win Senate approval before the end of next week. The purpose of the bill, Walsh declared, is to "put the world that sought for the relative strength of American, British and Japanese navies."

Some Senators said the committee's addition of an amendment to the Walsh-Hearley Act in construction of all new ships, might provoke a fight on the floor.

Walsh contended, however, that the act's minimum ship requirements would have little effect, since it was said, in the ship building trades did not come into the "new ship" category.

In addition to increasing the capital ship tonnage from 10,000 to 15,000 tons, the act would increase the number of aircraft carriers from 20 to 40, and the number of submarines from 10 to 20.

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**COMMUNICATIONS CUT BY MAGNETIC STORMS**

Telephone, Cable, Telegraph And Radio Systems Disrupted All Over The Nation For Three Hours.

New York, April 16.—(AP)—A severe magnetic storm swept across North America today, disrupting communications systems for several hours in many sections.

Scientists said the storm was caused by activity of the sun and described the accompanying display of Aurora Borealis in the northern hemisphere as the most brilliant in 25 years.

The rare "Northern Lights" gleaming like a giant neon tube in the heavens, flickered in bright streaks that ranged from dim pink to "almost blood red" in color, Harvard Observatory reported.

Relatively few persons saw the Aurora, however, for the display did not begin until 1:30 a. m. (e. s. t.). The storm, bringing with it rain and unsettled weather as an eastern prelude in many places, caused grief to thousands of electrical engineers in telephone, cable, radio and telegraphic centers over the nation.

Wires, Radio Disrupted  
 For three hours or more they struggled helplessly to keep wires clear under the erratic influence of a bombardment of capricious magnetic earth currents.

News dispatches which left New York as "Diplomatic Sources Disclosed" arrived in San Francisco as "Cabled" in the city.

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**VICTORIOUS REBS PUSH NORTHWARD**

Barcelona, Madrid And Valencia Are Next Objectives Of The Insurgents.

Madrid, April 16.—(AP)—The Spanish Frontiers, April 16.—(AP)—General Franco's insurgents, their red and black flags flying, pushed northward along the coast today.

They began closing in on the delta town of San Carlos de la Rapita. Their strategy was to force a crossing of the Ebro river and take Tortosa from the east, since their columns have been blocked for days in rolling country to the west.

Additional reports indicated that the Spanish government militia sought to block the path of the insurgents.

Loyalist aviators bombed towns freshly fallen to the insurgents.

Reports reaching the border early today said Gen. Miguel Aranda's Italian and Spanish troops had driven to within less than a mile of San Carlos de la Rapita.

25 Miles Off Coast  
 The strip of seacoast now in the hands of the rebels is 25 miles long.

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**JAPS IN CRISIS AS CHINA HAS NEW VICTORY**

Konoye May Resign In Cabinet Split Over Army Dictatorship; Jap Force Amushed In Kansu March

Shanghai, April 16.—(AP)—A Chinese army vigorously assaulted Tibetan in Shantung province today with artillery, bombing planes and infantry, determining the great victory it tasted at Fairchewang, 20 miles farther south.

New field guns hammered at the walls after cracking Japanese positions on the east, southeast and northeast, and planes dropped bombs.

Chinese infantry systematically attacked Japanese machine-gun nests dotting the hills and countryside surrounding the town. Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's commanders declared the fall of the town was certain, as all its supply lines were cut.

From foreign sources it was learned that another Japanese force had not a serious reverse at Wuyu in Kiangsu province where the infantry vanguard has out-distanced its supporting artillery and been ambushed.

This column had departed from Nantungchow, north of Shanghai for the eastern end of the Luanchai railroad, objective in central China.

Rome Celebrates The End Of Lent With Impressive Rites; Priests Ordained

Vatican City, April 16.—(AP)—Church bells, attired since Holy Thursday, rang out the end of lent and the joy of the risen Christ in the Eternal City's multitude of churches today as priests within them struck flints to light the paschal candles.

At Florence, fireworks were employed to express the joy of the faithful. A metal dove, carrying a lighted flag, was released from the cathedral's high altar and traveled out of the structure of wire reaching an out-cast locked with each wire which it set off in the square outside.

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**SEC PLANS TO AID 'LITTLE BUSINESS'**

Decides On Red Tape Cutting, Will Set Up Unit To Help In Raising Capital.

Washington, April 16.—(AP)—Little Business, wanting more capital, will be helped by a new unit set up by the Securities Commission today.

President Roosevelt's suggestion that SEC red tape be cut in order to help small business raise capital more easily, the commission declared today.

(1) To establish a unit in the Division to aid private registrants.

(2) To reduce the amount of financial information required in registration statements for small businesses.

(3) To broaden the exemption for issues of less than \$100,000.

The commission has been making a study of rules under the Securities Act of 1933 to determine whether it can make the issuance of securities cheaper and simpler.

In Effect 6 Months  
 The program will remain in effect for six months, pending completion of the study.

The new registration unit will tend to reduce the legal expenses and save the time of registrants, the commission said.

The "small established enterprises" was defined as an enterprise with annual sales of less than \$100,000.
