TOWNSEND, READY TO SERVE SENTENCE, RECEIVES A PARDON

Head of Old Age Pension Plan About To Enter Jail When President Acts; In Very Happy Mood He Says

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today pardoned Dr. Francis E. Townsend, old age pension advocate, as he was about to enter the local jail to serve a 30-day sentence for contempt of a House committee.

Townsend had already reported to the district attorney's office and announced he was ready to begin service of the jail sentence when the President's pardon was announced.

The 71-year-old pension advocate was walking out on a special committee which was investigating his plan to pay a \$200 a month Federal pension to all persons over 60 years of age.

Townsend was in the office of U. S. Marshal John H. Colony, awaiting removal to jail, when the pardon was delivered to him.

He emerged grinning broadly with the pardon in his hand.

"I am very happy," he said. "It is a complete vindication and an act of confidence on the part of Congress."

Townsend said he would fly back to the west coast "within a few days."

FRANCE TAKES STEPS TOWARD ITALIAN PACT

Would Make Deal Similar To One Closed By Britain On Saturday; Both To Recognize Ethiopian Conquest.

Paris, April 18.—(AP)—A foreign office spokesman announced today that the French embassy in Rome had taken steps toward opening Franco-Italian negotiations for an agreement similar to that between Britain and Italy, signed Saturday.

The spokesman said Jules Bonjean, French Charge d'Affaires, called on Italian Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano Saturday to propose conversations that would result in a French-Italian pact.

France has not had an ambassador in Rome for more than two years, because she refused to accept an envoy to the Italian king as emperor of Ethiopia, which would have meant recognition of Italy's East African conquests.

France believed ready now to follow Britain in such recognition.

The foreign office hoped Premier Mussolini's answer would arrive before Wednesday's meeting of the French Cabinet, at which Premier Edouard Daladier and Foreign Minister Georges Bonnet are expected to present their plan for a Franco-Italian accord.

Before Hitler's Visit. Hope was expressed here that a pact could be signed before German Reichsmarshal Hitler visits Britain in mid-May.

Determined To Avenge Setback, Nipponese Launch Major Battle In Central China—On Other Fronts.

Shanghai, April 18.—(AP)—The Japanese launched a strong attack in the last sector today, preparing a major battle in which they apparently were determined to avenge the series of stinging defeats they have suffered recently at the hands of the Chinese in central China.

Force fighting was reported to the southeast, Shantung province, where both Japanese and Chinese have been making rapid advances and munitions for a decisive engagement.

The Japanese sworn to re-venge the disastrous setback around Tientsin, where they were defeated in a major battle last week, and marked the retreat of Japanese drive down the railway to the coast.

Equally resolute, the Chinese were fighting to break up the Japanese campaign against central China and recover all the lost territory.

BYRD'S PROPOSAL FOR TAX CHANGES

Senator Would End Tax Exemption Securities By Constitutional Amendment.

Washington, April 18.—(AP)—President Roosevelt's suggestion for legislation to remove tax exemptions on government securities and savings bonds, a proposal today introduced by Senator Byrd (D-Va.) to accomplish the same result through a constitutional amendment.

Byrd, a frequent critic of the President's policies, said he would appear before the Senate Judiciary committee to urge approval of his amendment. Elimination of the present exemption, he said, would result in:

A substantial increase in revenue, a broadened revenue source base, an increase in the direction of tax burden more to the wealthy, equalization, elimination of special privilege and tax evasion by those best able to pay, a greater incentive for productive investment—and a reduction in the incentive for government extravagance.

Mr. Roosevelt soon will send Congress a special message on the tax exemption question. He is expected to call a conference last week he thought employees would be humbled a little to work.

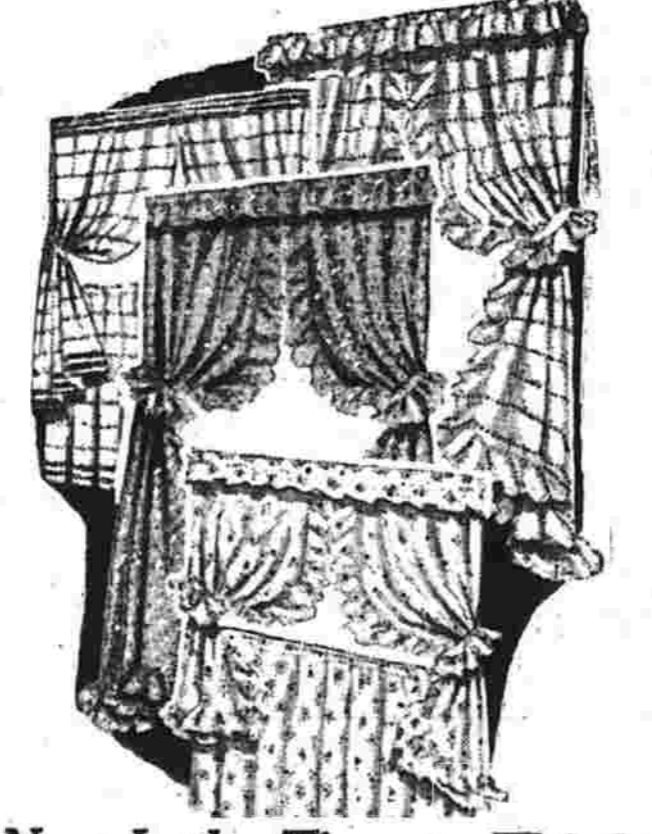
