CHINESE HAVE A MILLION MEN FOR HUGE FIGHT

Lini Fast Becoming Center Of Great Battle; Japanese Land Five New Divisions And Vast War Stores.

Shanghai, April 18.—(AP)—As a prelude to a grand new offensive in South Shantung province where they have met with severe reverses, 6,000 Japanese reinforcements have arrived on the Yi river, four miles from Lini. They fought their way overland, despite constant Chinese harassment from Tsingtao, Shantung port 120 miles away; airless distance, Lini, 80 miles southeast of Suchow, rapidly was becoming the center of a battle which military experts said might develop into a major engagement of the nine-month-old war.

Another Japanese column was reported sweeping to the southeast of Lini. Chinese sources said five fresh Japanese divisions had arrived in Shantung from Japan and Formosa, while 25 transports were unloading munitions.

Japanese aircraft carriers were reported stationed off the coast, presumably for a concerted air attack.

Million Chinese.

On their part, Chinese commanders declared they were ready to pour 1,000,000 soldiers into the battle. Already thousands of reinforcements had thrown up strong entrenchments along the Yi river line.

Better led and equipped than at any time since the conflict started, they were preparing to follow up recent successes in the hope of administering a major check, with Shantung province a great slice of Central China as the stake.

Meanwhile slugging guerrilla attacks continued upon Japanese garrisons on a dozen fronts, especially in the western province of Shansi where withdrawal of Japanese garrisons to reinforce the Lini drive was reported. The Japanese were reported to have many towns and

STRIKES AGAIN HIGHLIGHTS IN TRADE PICTURE

Truck Drivers Quit In Rochester, N. Y., Trolley Men In Columbus, O., And Fisher Body Plant Closed.

A truck drivers' strike in Rochester, N. Y., a transportation strike in Columbus, O., and suspension of operations at Fisher Body Plant No. 1 in Flint, Mich., highlighted the nation's industrial picture today.

At the Wilmington, Calif., assembly plant of the Ford Motor company a strike curtailed operations, but officials of the company reported en route to the coast to try and settle the difficulty.

Produce dealers and strike leaders in Rochester started their second conference in the four-day strike, hopeful that an agreement would relieve pressure on the Rochester public market. Truck company operators other than produce dealers, however, did not yield to the drivers.

Truck operators are asking a cumulative 4-hour week with a maximum of 9 hours for a working day before overtime rates become effective. Under the present contract overtime rates of time and a half are paid after 40 hours work-week. The Associated Trucking Industry, Inc., which includes most of the big truck fleet owners, has refused to yield to union demands for higher wages and a continued 48-hour week.

Fear Sympathy Strike

A sympathy strike of coal truck drivers and ice peddlers was forecast by Edwin R. Young, business agent for the Brotherhood of Teamsters, Chauffeurs, Stevedores and Helpers Union, if the strike is not settled at once.

In Columbus, U. S. Conductor John L. Connor called a meeting today in an effort to settle the three-day-old strike of street car motor bus operators which left the transportation facilities badly crippled. The strike started at midnight Saturday after the Columbus & Southern Ohio Electric company refused to grant demands from the carmen union for wage increases and a closed shop.

Fisher Plant Closed

The Fisher plant in Flint and the assembly line where motor car plants were closed today when the United Automobile Workers of America renewed their dues collecting drive at the body company rates, forming a closed line through which non-union workers and union workers behind in their dues were not allowed to pass.

FRANCE, ITALY AGREE TO TALK OF FRIENDSHIP

Will Begin Diplomatic Conversations At Once; Early Accord Expected; Czechs Recognize African Empire

Rome, April 18.—(AP)—Italy and France agreed today to begin conversations immediately to reestablish their traditional friendship, shattered by the Ethiopian war. Italy's readiness to bury the hatchet was expressed to Jules Boncompagni, French chargé d'affaires, by Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano, officials revealed.

Blondei on Saturday asked Count Ciano if Italy were prepared to open negotiations, and the affirmative answer was handed to him today when he called at the foreign office.

France took the initiative, informing Ciano that it was ready to support the British resolution at Geneva next month to clear the way for recognition of Italy's new empire in Africa.

Otherwise, it was said, France's principal bargaining ace would be played without receiving anything in return.

Name Envy First

Although actual negotiations are not likely to begin until after Franco names an ambassador to Italy, France, it was said, hopes to get the name of the Italian ambassador, it was learned authoritatively.

Neither side anticipates long negotiations.

Both are careful to point out that "reestablishment of Franco-Italian relations does not mean a weakening of the Rome-Berlin axis."

The projected Franco-Italian accord is expected to follow the signed Saturday by Britain and Italy as far as Spain, the Mediterranean area and Africa are concerned.

The French are more anxious than the British to keep Italy out of the Balkan islands (which Italy promised Britain she would evacuate when the Spanish war was ended).

French quarters said the Spanish question no longer was considered so difficult in view of prospects of sweeping insurgent victory. France is interested chiefly in the withdrawal of Italian troops from Libya, free use of the Suez Canal and settlement of the long-standing friction over Italian in French Tunisia.

Disposition of the French-owned Djibouti-Aden-Ahaha railway, traversing Italian Ethiopia, also must be settled.

Informed quarters expressed belief that Italy was planning wide-scale diplomatic action in the Danubian area and eventually might advance a proposal for a five-power accord including Italy, Germany, Britain, France and Poland.

Czechoslovakia gave formal notice she had recognized the Italian empire, which includes conquered Ethiopia, Eritrea and Somalia.

The Czech ambassador in Rome, Generalissimo Ciano in an hour's conference. He is accredited to Emperor of Ethiopia.

Rebel Advance Troops Already Occupy Suburbs Of Tortosa; International Brigade Forms Backbone Of Loyalist Defense; Many Prisoners Are Captured.

With the Insurgents Before Tortosa, April 19.—(AP)—Large detachments of government troops, including International Brigade units, were captured south of Tortosa today after Ebro river bridges were dynamited by the government to hold back the insurgent movement to encircle the strategic south Catalonia city.

General Garcia Valino's Navarrese Legionnaires occupied the suburbs of Tortosa and the right bank of the Ebro; then started to cut off the city proper, where the government massed thousands of its best shock troops.

Insurgent officers said International troops formed the backbone of the government defense and that the Catalonian units themselves offered little resistance to the insurgent drive toward Barcelona, 95 miles to the northeast.

33 Miles of Coast

Occupation of the rebel Ebro river by General Valino's troops and the continued advance southward from Benicassim General Miguel Aranda's Galician forces toward Valencia widened the insurgent-controlled stretch along the Mediterranean coast to 33 miles. Generalissimo Francisco Franco was moving his heaviest artillery coastward to support concerted defenses against the government capital at Barcelona and the important seaport of Valencia.

Navarrese troops captured Cherta and Alfove, south of Tortosa.

A large group of international fighters was reported captured in the mountain west of Tortosa, where Legionnaires completed a quick encircling movement in the Sierra de Moles, the Sierra de Caro and the Sierra de las Bases mountains.

Insurgent tanks and armored cars yesterday drove government depots from Amposta, at the head of the Ebro river mouth, and the south approach to Tortosa.

General Aranda's division operating in Castellon province, moving in the direction of Valencia, occupied the towns of Tirig and Salsadella.

Insurgent heavy artillery blasted enemy positions on both sides of the river Ebro, southeast of Tortosa, throwing up a protective barrage for the continuing advance of General Valino's division.

Navarrese and Galician fighters captured Amposta, government airplane base below Tortosa on the right bank of the Ebro, making the city's fall fairly certain.

Hold Both Roads

Capture of Amposta gave the insurgents control of both highways leading north from Vinaros to Tortosa, also the delta projecting into the Mediterranean from the mouth of the Ebro.

A little more than 100 miles to the east of Spanish coast, a half-hour airplane flight, the insurgents hold in reserve a strong force at Palma, on the Isle of Mallorca. Valino's troops occupied the strategic positions on the highway, including Santa Barbara and Muro, 20 miles north of Tortosa.

The Main Barrier

The Ebro river is now the main barrier to quick capture of Tortosa, a city of 100,000 people, which has been besieged since the city from Castellon, secured a quick maneuver against the enemy's tank and captured strategic positions on the highway, including Santa Barbara and Muro, 20 miles north of Tortosa.

The government fighters vainly tried to impede the advance with attacks, but anti-war artillery protected the maneuver.

HULL WILL NAME TREATY VIOLATORS

State Department To Designate Japan, Germany And Italy If Request Is Made.

Washington, April 19.—(AP)—State Department officials said today Secretary Hull would designate treaty violators if requested by Congressional resolution to name treaty-breaking powers.

Rep. Scott (D., Calif.) introduced a resolution, now under consideration by the House Foreign Affairs committee, calling upon the President to say what nations, if any, have in recent years violated treaties to which this country is a party.

His move, he said, was preliminary to advocating a boycott of the aggressor states.

Any State Department reply mentioning Japan, Germany and Italy will not, however, be a new citation of the three alleged aggressor nations, nor will it advocate any action against them.

Officials said it would simply refer to the fact that Secretary Hull has already mentioned Japan, Germany and Italy, directly or indirectly, as treaty violators.

Hull Statements

In a strong statement October 6 Hull said that Japan, by invading China, had acted contrary to both

WALLACE EXPLAINS WHEAT INSURANCE

Declares Projects Which Need Co-operation, Help Make Democracy Work.

Omaha, Neb., April 19.—(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace launched the administration's program to insure the wheat crop with a statement here today which made "help make democracy work."

In a speech prepared for delivery over a nation-wide hookup and before a meeting of midwestern farm leaders to learn administrative details of the program, Wallace said:

"Projects like crop insurance which require both planning and cooperation, help make democracy work. The success of boom and the swing from surplus to shortage of farm products is one of the causes of that succession.

"The cycle of glut and scarcity is one of the most menacing aspects of our economy. More stability of supplies and prices is the aim of crop insurance. Such stabilization safeguards democracy."

Wallace explained the procedure under the program, and coupled it with an attack on "rigged individualism" which he termed a "hopeless policy" for dealing with depression and drought.

Explains New Plan

Under the new plan the farmer can insure his crop for either one-half or three-quarters of the average yield, paying a smaller premium for one-half. Wallace explained.

He estimated the cost of insuring three-fourths of the average crop at about one-half bushel per acre per year on the best wheat land, one-half bushel on good wheat land, and two to two and one-half bushels on high risk land.

When the farmer pays his premium he can take his wheat to the elevator as usual, and have a separate warehouse receipt made out for the amount needed to pay the premium. Wallace said. It is a pay-as-you-go system which will be a help for his premium.

Wallace said "we do not know how it (the program) will pay out, but we do know that the principle of insurance is applied to wheat every year, and that it is almost self-evident that it will give farmers adequate protection against crop losses in the event of a bad year."

His prediction of the plan's success, however, will be expanded to cotton, corn and perhaps other crops, if it is successful.

DECLARES R F C LOANS DUPLICATE PWA PLANS

Senator Glass Asserts He Will Support Funds For Relief But Not Public Works Grants To States.

Washington, April 19.—(AP)—Senator Glass (D., Va.), charged today that the administration proposed revival of public works under authority recently given the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

Glass, chairman of the Senate Appropriations committee, said he would support President Roosevelt's recommendation for \$1,250,000,000 for relief but would not vote for a \$1,000,000,000 fund to provide public works loans and grants to cities and states.

The newly-named RFC lending bill, which Glass sponsored, authorizes that agency to make public works loans to state and municipal governments. The same statute also assigns the agency "blank check" powers in making loans to business. As far as is publicly known, however, city business loans have been considered.

When he introduced the bill, Glass said, he believed it would "take care of public works."

"Otherwise I would never have introduced it," he added.

Some legislators interpreted the situation as evidencing a keen rivalry between the RFC and the Public Works Administration for control of the big new lending program. Glass's address to the Senate today was interpreted as having favored RFC control because of the known conservatism of Chairman Jesse H. Jones.

Jones discussed the general relief program in a radio speech last night, declaring: "We must have confidence in our own country, and if we demonstrate that confidence in our own country, we will have confidence in our business will follow."

"So much has been said about fear that we have all become imbued with the idea that something is wrong with the country, when as a matter of fact, we have never had a greater abundance of every thing needed for a really high standard of living than we have now."

Explaining the operation of the RFC lending program, Jones said his board would not feel authorized to make loans unless it appeared the borrower would be able to pay back the money.
