SWAPPING PLAN IS REVIVED BY TAX CONFEREES

House Levy On Profits, Senate Measure On Capital Gains May Be Accepted; We'll Get A Bill, Forecast

Washington, April 21.—(AP)—Legislators who are trying to end Senate-House discussion over business taxes revived today a proposal to trade approval of the House levy on undistributed profits for gains tax system. One influential member of the tax bill conference committee said: "That is the plan which appears to offer the greatest promise of providing a basis for a compromise. I may be possible for us to reach some decision on the vital provisions of the bill this week."

The arrangement, it was learned, would be satisfactory to at least some of the House conferees. Some Senate members have been described as having favored that procedure from the outset, but they balked at proposing it after President Roosevelt endorsed both the corporate profits and capital gains tax features of the House bill.

One difficulty faced by the conferees was that neither Senators nor House members appeared willing to make the first overture along lines of the trade.

May Vote On Antitrust
As a result, some members of the Senate Finance Committee renewed their endorsement of the proposals. Nevertheless, Chairman Doughton, Massachusetts committee more optimistically than he has for days over prospects of obtaining an agreement.

"I think we are going to get a bill," he said, "and I don't believe again on it will delay adjournment of Congress."

He would not discuss, however, in what direction he thought the conferees might move toward breaking their deadlock.

Senate conferees, who would not be quoted by name, contended their position in the tax conference.

JAPS GET LINI AS DEFENDERS QUIT THE CITY

Chinese Take New Position Two Miles Away; Little Change On Other Fronts During The Last Ten Days

Shanghai, April 21.—(AP)—After 24 hours of sanguinary street fighting, Japan's reinforced Shanghai army completely occupied Lini today. The Chinese high command announced the withdrawal of their forces from the battered walled town, a key point in their Yi river entrenchments through which Japanese in a new offensive are attempting to drive southwestward to the relief of a beleaguered garrison at Tientsin, 40 miles away. The Chinese took up new defense positions two miles south.

Ninety miles southwest of Lini is Suochow. Linghai Junction and ultimate objective of the Japanese offensive to cut the corridor separating Japanese conquests in north China and the Shanghai-Nanking area.

Forty-seven miles southwest of Lini is Tairchow, scene of the recent defeat of the Japanese. Chinese battalions which lost Suochow, on the Grand Canal and Tientsin-Pukow railway, dug in 22 miles north of Suochow.

A Japanese garrison, surrounded and besieged at Tairchow in the vicinity of Tientsin made a desperate effort in an effort to cut the way through but was forced to withdraw within the walls.

Chinese claimed the recapture for the fourth time of Pingki in Shan province on the north bank of the Yellow river. The victory was after a two-day battle in which Japanese were reported to have lost 300 dead.

Questions on other fronts were also changed in the last ten days. The general situation:

Yellow River—Although holding most of the strategic points on the north bank in Shan and Honan, have forced Japanese to withdraw with widely separated daily engagements, have forced Japanese to maintain large garrisons to keep control of communication lines.

REBEL PLANES BOMB TOWNS NEAR BORDER

Seven Civilians Killed And 20 Injured In A Drive To Smash The Remaining Catalonia Land Links.

Perpignan, France, (AP)—The Spanish insurgent air force today bombed towns, troop concentrations and one of the principal rail ways of northern Catalonia in a drive to smash the remaining land links between Catalonia and France.

Seven civilians were killed and 20 injured at Figueras, Pyrenees gateway from France into Catalonia. A Catalonian railway run by the three rebel passes still under government control.

GOV. LAFOLLETTE BREAKS WITH FDR

Splits With The President Over His Recovery Plan And Explains His Reason.

Madison, Wis., April 21.—(AP)—Governor Philip F. LaFollette, who disclosed last night he had split with President Roosevelt over his recovery plan, promised today to offer his own plan for mending the business slump.

He announced he would discuss recovery tonight in the third of a series of four radio addresses, including office-holding bureaucracy and government program of the kind he submitted in 1933 to the Wisconsin Legislature, which rejected it.

Heretofore the governor, titular head of Wisconsin's Progressive party, and his brother, Senator Robert M. LaFollette, generally had been considered supporters of the President.

LaFollette declared last night the national administration could have prevented what "some people call this recession" only if the views of the governor rather than reported administration officials had been followed.

He said he urged upon the national administration, immediately after the 1936 election and repeatedly during 1937, "the need for a sound, comprehensive and carefully worked out program. But they did the opposite. They discharged people by the thousands."

The governor said he and his brother were turned down when they urged the offer embodied in the 1933 Wisconsin bill.

PRESS CENSORSHIP SPREADING TO U. S.

Head Of Editors' Society Issues Warning Self-Government Is Now On Trial.

Washington, April 21.—(AP)—Alfred H. Kirchhofer, president of the American Society of Newspaper Editors, asserted today that "the black plague" of newspaper censorship was spreading to the American continent.

Kirchhofer, managing editor of the Buffalo (N. Y.) Evening News, opened the society's annual convention by denouncing it was the duty of newspaper editors to defend and interpret free institutions.

Today self-government is on trial, he said, "an independent press can uphold it."

HENRY FORD ACCEPTS F. D. R.'S BID TO TALK ON RECOVERY PLANS

800 Dead, Missing, 50,000 Are Homeless As Earthquake's Toll

Ankara, Turkey, April 21.—(AP)—The Anatolia earthquake toll of dead and missing soared to at least 800 today after a night of continuing shocks which 50,000 homeless spent in makeshift huts.

Terrible underground rumblings were accompanied by intermittent earthquakes over wide areas of western Asia bordering the Aegean Sea, and especially about Kirsehir, Yozgat and Tokat.

Panic-stricken refugees fled from crowded tents of boiling water. Eighteen villages were entirely destroyed, and 22 others were badly damaged.

Whole families were buried under mountainous debris. Most of the victims were women and children.

Salvage and relief squads were organized throughout the stricken country and the National Assembly voted emergency funds.

Heads of foreign diplomatic missions presented condolences to the government.

The quakes first were felt about 10 p. m. Tuesday and lasted until midnight. They were renewed last night.

The ruins were in some of the most productive agricultural districts. Following the first shocks, the Red Cross sent into the countryside.

The Red Cross sent a relief organization similar to the Red Cross, mobilized workers and doctors to give aid.

Washington, April 21.—(AP)—Henry Ford, strenuously over at odds at times with the present administration, accepted today President Roosevelt's invitation to an informal White House conference where the administration problems will be discussed.

Ford said at Sudbury, Mass., where he is visiting, that "of course" he would discuss business conditions with Mr. Roosevelt but emphasized that he did not intend to give any advice. He also said he had no axe to grind.

The Detroit automobile manufacturer, who refused to sign the automobile code when NRA's Blue Eagle was flying, was asked to lunch with a single waiter in the privacy of the President's oval study office.

The invitation to Ford was from the White House at a time when Mr. Roosevelt and his aides are seeking all means to aid business recovery.

One such move with recovery as its objective was the Reconstruction Finance Corporation's announcement that it was ready to meet the financial needs of all owners, including public utilities.

Mr. Ford's administration officials said the President's efforts to promote federally-financed expansion in the utilities industry were aimed at eventual stimulation of a huge utility building program in the White House.

White House advisers have estimated that possibly a \$1,000,000,000 utility building program could be undertaken immediately with quick and far-reaching effects in other industries, such as steel, cement, brick and lumber.

The President's invitation to Ford said the founder of the huge automobile concern might bring with him his son, Edsel, President of the Ford Motor Company, and W. J. Cameron, Ford's public relations director. The invitation mentioned no subject for discussion.

Ford, discussing his acceptance, said he wished to shake hands with the President "as an old friend."

"I want to give the President a chance to look at somebody who doesn't want anything," he added with a smile.

Refusing to sign compliance with the NRA code, Ford was denied the right to sell his automobiles to the government.

At other times, the manufacturer has been critical of administration policies which he spoke of as business uncertainty as to government interference.

He has not visited the White House since Mr. Roosevelt took office. Edsel Ford, however, was a recent participant in a conference in the President's office on discussing high pressure assemblage of automobiles.

To Aid Utilities
Utilities executives told the President several months ago they were about \$3,000,000,000 behind normal building schedule.

Impetus to the campaign to help utilities in the recovery program came from a conference Wednesday between the President, Chairman Jesse H. Jones of the RFC, and William O. Douglas and John W. Hayes of the securities commission.

Jones said afterward the utilities get money they were unable to get from the RFC, with available funds of \$1,000,000,000, was ready to sign. Another informed official pointed out several small companies have evidenced a desire to obtain government money and that the administration "hope the larger ones will follow."

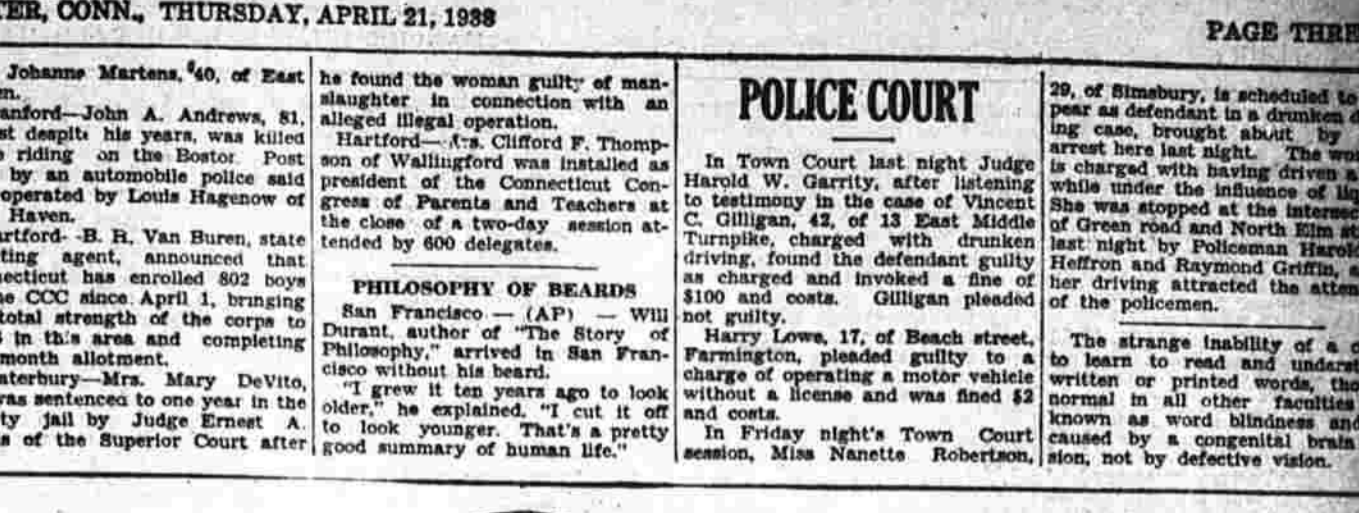
