# FEAR 41 KILLED BY BLAST

## LAFOLLETTE'S CALL MAY HINT AT THIRD PARTY

Wisconsin Governor Summons Parley Of Liberals To Organize Country For A Policy Of Production.

Madison, Wis., April 23.—(AP)—A mass meeting of Liberals, called by Governor Philip La Follette in a plea for depression-rising public action, may hold the answer to national third party speculations aroused in some quarters by his series of radio broadcasts attacking administration recovery policies.

La Follette, who has branded President Roosevelt's economic program as "inhering and patching," issued an invitation to a public conference here next Thursday (7:30 p. m., e. s. t.) in the final of his four radio addresses last night. He told the pressmen he had invited between 5,000 and 6,000 persons, more from the Midwest and some from the East. He did not divulge any names.

Non-committal on his future political course and making no direct reference to the possible founding of a national third party, La Follette last night declared the "great problem of our time" and the question that faces the nation "is how we can get organized action among a free people that will increase our food production and broaden its distribution."

Seek Unequivocal Program  
"As we look about us, we are asked in what some observers regarded as a significant question, 'where do we find a cause with a clear, unambiguous program to which we can give our allegiance, a program that is bought by favor or secured by fear—French friendship?'"

"The course to be taken, he said, 'is a decision which average men and women can decide better than a few leaders.'"

"This is why over a long period of time hundreds and hundreds of men and women in every walk of life have been wrestling with this problem. So far as I know never before have so many people taken counsel together upon a problem of this kind."

Source Security Policy  
"As a result of their effort a course of action is being worked out."

While La Follette raised the Roosevelt administration for "brilliant leadership" in showing the necessity for organized work, he criticized the administration's record of organized action to produce more.

## IRISH-BRITISH PACT IS HAILED OF HIGH IMPORT

Seen As Easing North-South Tension As Free State Is To Elect Protestant To Its Presidency; Aid To Trade

London, April 23.—(AP)—Ireland was aligned today among countries settling differences with Britain, with the conclusion of an agreement hailed as the most important between the two countries since all Ireland was partitioned in 1922. The dominions office cryptically announced the accord yesterday.

The settlement was announced by Prime Minister Eamon De Valera and his aide planned to leave Dublin tonight for London for the formal signing Monday. He will take place the cabinet room after a luncheon with Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain.

It was reliably reported in Dublin that the agreement settled long-standing land ownership and tax differences and included a compromise on the question of the border, which the agreement left untouched.

The pact, which was announced in Rome, Paris, Amstelveen, and London, is hailed as a landmark in Anglo-Irish relations.

De Valera's ambition for a united Ireland, including the six northern counties, was one of the main issues in the pact.

The pact also provides for a trade agreement between the two countries, and for the election of a Protestant to the Irish presidency.

The pact is seen as a step towards the easing of tensions between the two countries, and as a sign of the growing cooperation between them.

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## SPAIN LEFTISTS ATTACK TO WIN BACK BIG AREA

Miaja With New Forces Stages Counter Thrust On 16 Mile Front In Effort To Regain Zone On Coast.

Hendaye, France (At the Spanish frontier) April 23.—(AP)—General Jose Miaja's reinforced Government army defending the Mediterranean coastal region north of Valencia today counter-attacked along a 16-mile battlefield extending from Albuñol to Alcala de Chivert, Madrid to Hand fighting was reported in the streets of Albuñol as Government forces undertook to reconquer the 300 square miles of territory captured by the insurgents during the past week.

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## BODIES OF 22 MEN HAVE BEEN FOUND; BELIEVE REST DEAD

Rescue Squads Work In Shifts To Clear Shafts To Reach Victims—Explosion, Believed Caused By Dust, Occurs Just As Night Shift Enters Mine; Concussion Heard For Miles; Four Of The Victims Could Not Be Identified.

Grundy, Va., April 23.—(AP)—Bodies of twenty-two men had been brought from the explosion-wrecked Red Jacket mine today and a final death toll of 41 miners was indicated. Nineteen were missing and believed dead.

Progress of the rescue squads slowed down materially when they entered the "A" shaft where the last two bodies were found, burned almost beyond recognition. Debris from falling slate and coal and intense heat made the labor of the rescue workers difficult.

With 400 rescue workers present from three states, thirty minute shifts were being used because of the heat in the mine. Tired workers were being served sandwiches as they came from the scene of the rescue effort deep under Ken Mountain.

Many had been here since early last night. Debris from falling slate and coal and intense heat made the labor of the rescue workers difficult.

Payrolls of the mine indicated there were 21 workers in a shift, leaving 19 unaccounted for. Of the 22 bodies recovered so far, three were found at the mine entrance where the explosion had been, but 19 were found in the "B" shaft, now completely explored.

Four unidentified bodies were found. Friends and relatives had been unable to identify two of the bodies found at the entrance and the two found in the "A" or main shaft.

Mingo Keagle, vice president of the Red Jacket company, said the air had been cleared in all shafts, but rescue squads could not clear their way through them, but scant hope was held for any of them.

All of the miners were white men. Superintendent E. R. Kirby was one of the first to enter the damaged shafts and took charge of the rescue work. The crews found a steel fan constructed to supply 32,000 cubic feet of air per minute twisted from its base.

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## Brand New York Man Who Won't Kiss Swastika

New York, April 23.—(AP)—Because he refused to kiss a Swastika flag, a crippled editor told police today, four men beat him in his office last night and scratched Nazi emblems on his chest with sharp articles clipped in his hair.

Hospital physicians said the victim, Dr. Charles Weiss, 31, editor of "United States," published by the Anti-Communist, Anti-Fascist, and Anti-Nazi League of Brooklyn, had been beaten and scratched.

When the man entered, Dr. Weiss said, he was writing a letter about the Yiddish riot Wednesday night in which nine persons were injured in a fight between Nazis and American Legionnaires.

The editor said that after he returned to his office last night, one of the men carried the intruder down an American flag in the room, beat him with the flag and fled after scratching the Nazi emblem on his chest.

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## FURTHER CHARGES IN PENNSY FIGHT
