MACDONALD QUITS UNDER FIRE

GREAT BRITAIN, FRANCE REACH PACT FOR WAR

Agree to Pool Vast Armed Strength in Mutual Defense; Seek to Aid Czechs Against Economic Strain.

London, April 29.—(AP)—Britain and France, agreed on a pooling of their vast armed strength in the world's greatest defensive alliance, today mapped an economic-diplomatic campaign to prevent Germany from starving Czechoslovakia into submission. When the premier and foreign ministers of the two democracies suspended their momentous conference for lunch it was known that plans for relieving economic pressure on Germany's smaller neighbors was taking form.

Previously they had drafted main outlines of plans to link their army, navy and air force resources against any threat of invasion to either. The moral force of this combination, strengthened by the fact that they turned to the question of safeguarding against war dangers in Central Europe, where Nazi expansion imperils Czechoslovakia, France's ally.

Details of the military merger were left to the general staffs of the two powers, but the ministers were believed to have drawn the allied armies and British direction of the navy and air forces.

Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain and Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax, K. British Premier Edward Daladier and foreign minister Georges Bonnet, for France, drafted the new common treaty against the war peril. Their conference, begun yesterday, was to end tonight.

The French put forward the proposal for help to Czechoslovakia.

PROGRESSIVE PARTY STARTED; OLD PARTY PRINCIPLES JUNKED

Gov. La Follette Of Wisconsin Pledges Security To All Through Right To Earn Living By Working.

Madison, Wis., April 29.—(AP)—A new party pledged to the goals of ensuring freedom and security for the people ahead, forth today upon the national political scene.

The National Progressive Party of America, dedicated to those ideals, was offered to the nation last night by Philip F. La Follette, governor of Wisconsin, and the widely known and respected leader of the old party and of other parties and set a new course in its direction.

"Definitely and irrevocably we are in the lists to stay until the American people renounce their heritage," La Follette said in a speech.

"This heritage is defined as the right to live in peace, to earn their bread, to security, to freedom of conscience and control.

To attain these ends, La Follette declared, he would not retreat from control and ownership of money and property.

PUBLISHERS RAP N. L. R. B. ACTIONS

Also Score Senate Lobby Probers For Seizing Records, Papers, Accounts.

New York, April 29.—(AP)—The American Newspaper Publishers Association stood in firm opposition today to what it regarded as unconstitutional actions of the National Labor Relations Board and the Senate Lobby committee.

Resolutions adopted at the annual convention yesterday set forth the association's views and commended resistance to "unwise" actions.

The resolution on the Labor Relations Board spoke particularly against calling "publishers to account for material they have printed and circulated," cited two instances in which they said this had been attempted, and urged each editor and publisher "not to succumb to the demands of the committee, but to stand firm and to turn to his fellow publishers for aid."

Concerning the lobby committee, the association said it had "sought to intimidate citizens in the exercise of their constitutionally guaranteed right to petition Congress, by attempting to compel them to turn over to the committee by the command of a subpoena the contents of their records, papers and accounts."

Gannett Is Praised

The resolutions praised Frank E. Gannett, Rochester, N. Y., publisher of the nation's largest newspaper, for his stand in support of the constitutional right to free speech.

"Mr. Gannett and all other citizens who have resisted or do resist the further encroachments of the committee," the resolutions said, "are hereby commended for their stand in support of the constitutional right to free speech."

The resolutions also urged that the committee be "prevented from attempting to improve the administration of the newspaper industry."

"So long as municipal government is mismanaged," Dewey said, "we have no reasonable right to expect its counterpart in Washington to be much different or better."

REICH TO EXPLAIN ANTI-JEW DECREE

Foreign Embassies And Legations Make Many Inquiries About New Laws.

Berlin, April 29.—(AP)—The German government probably will offer soon an official explanation to all foreign Embassies and Legations here of the purpose, implications and working of Field Marshal Hermann Wilhelm Goerring's anti-Jewish decree of Wednesday.

Diplomatic inquiries have been numerous the spokesman for the economic ministry said today, that an official explanation probably would be prepared.

Goerring ordered such German Jews to report his property by June 30 if it exceeds 5,000 marks (\$2,000). Jews of foreign citizenship were required to evaluate and report any property in Germany in excess of that figure.

Inasmuch as foreign Jews having investments or property in Germany are affected by the decree, they are especially interested in its details.

JAPS ENCOUNTER STIFF RESISTANCE

Military Observers Believe No Further Gain Possible Without More Troops.

Shanghai, April 29.—(AP)—While Japanese celebrated Emperor Hirohito's 27th birthday his weary soldiers in north Shanghai province continued an indecisive battle today which was boosting Chinese hopes of achieving a stalemate or repulsing the "Tairerchwang" victory.

Newspapers here were encountering stubborn resistance. "Fifteenth of August" and "Fifteenth of August" plans for May First; "Original Attempt On European Peace."

The great manpower of the Chinese army again was the most important factor in the war's further decline. Fresh reinforcements constantly were being sent against the tired Japanese.

Chinese were fighting steadily for nine days since the capture of the city.

Japanese were making progress only by yards in their advance toward the Lanchow railway, southwest nerve center of the front in Central China.

They still had about 10 miles to go to reach their objective.

The advance was at such cost of men and munitions in 1937 and military observers expressed doubt whether it could succeed without heavy additional reinforcements.

Chinese were profiting from the advice of their foreign military advisers, they said, engineering "times methodical retreats, avoiding mass casualties."

BUSINESS MEN'S 'INNER COUNCIL' MAY AID F. D. R.

Group Of 16 Studying National 'Balance Sheet' For Industry; Conservatives Support Advisory System

Washington, April 29.—(AP)—John W. Hanes, securities commissioner and an administration business adviser, advocated a "national balance sheet" for industry today as a means of stabilizing production and employment.

Hanes disclosed that the plan, designed to help control the output of goods with anticipated demand, was being studied by the 16 bankers, industrialists and insurance executives who pledged their aid in bringing about closer coordination of government and business.

Other economic developments in the capital included:

1. President Roosevelt was reported to be considering creation of an "inner council" of business men to consult with him on economic problems.

2. The Justice Department said it would give full publicity to future antitrust cases to give business men both "guides and warnings" on the type of acts which may be considered violations of these statutes.

3. Senate conservatives said they would seek to place control of the administration's new public works program under Chairman Jesse Jones of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation instead of Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Ickes, who heretofore has directed the PWA.

4. Talk of the possibility of an "inner council" of industrial "businessmen" was current among some of the President's more conservative advisers, who have urged that if the economic ministry said today, that an official explanation probably would be prepared.

Among those mentioned for membership on such a council were Brigadier General Robert E. Wood of Chicago, president of Sears, Roebuck and Company; Frank C. Walker, New York attorney and former director of the National Emergency Council; Robert W. Woodruff, president of the Coca-Cola Company, and O. Max Gardner, former North Carolina governor and now general counsel for the Cotton Textile Institute.

Anti-Monopoly

President Roosevelt meanwhile put the finishing touches on his anti-monopoly message, which he expected to send to Congress either this week or early next week.

Some informed persons said that, contrary to previous expectations, the message might not be so strong.

Mackenzie Tells How The Recent Boost Will Affect The Man In The Street.
