SHANGHAI FULL OF TERRORISTS TO FIGHT JAPS

2,000 To 5,000 Reported To Be In City; Jap Offensive In Shantung Blocked But Force Fighting Continues

Shanghai, May 2.—(AP)—The danger of widespread terrorism revived war tension in Shanghai today as reports circulated that thousands of Chinese guerrillas had slipped into the city to harass the Japanese. International settlement police doubled their patrols and searched refugee camps for guerrillas equipped with firearms and explosives, hiding there.

The arrest of two bomb throwers, after an attempt to blast a truck loaded with Japanese soldiers, furnished information that more than 2,000 terrorists had infiltrated the city, aroused police apprehensions.

One report said 5,000 special agents of the National Salvation Association and other patriotic organizations were in Shanghai and the surrounding area under orders to conduct a terrorist campaign against the Japanese.

Meanwhile, fierce fighting continued on the Shantung front, where Japan has been struggling to gain control of Central China. Last dispatches indicated the new Japanese offensive against Buchow and the Laichang railway has been blocked, but neither side claimed important successes.

Chinese held attacks along the Tacheng-Tsien-Pihon-Tancheng line while making attacks along the entire line.

General H. H. H. said the Japanese offensive movement involved three army units totaling about 100,000 men, with 40,000 reserves. One body of Japanese troops is operating at Hangchow and along the Laichang-Tancheng line. Another body is operating at Tancheng and the third is at Tancheng.

The Chinese counter-offensive in Shantung and Honan provinces apparently has established a buffer zone nearly 20 miles wide on the north bank of the Yellow river.

Jap Air Losses Confirmed (Reports from Peking said foreign sources there confirmed the fact that the Japanese lost 21 planes in their raid on Harrow, temporary Chinese capital, last Friday. The Chinese lost six or eight planes.)

Chinese leaders in Hankow said the drawing of all available Japanese manpower from other fronts to Shantung has prevented the Japanese from consolidating military control of provinces north of the Yellow river, preparatory to political and economic development.

GREAT ITALIAN FORCE USED TO GUARD FUHRER

Hundred Thousand Soldiers Gather in Rome; Public Parks Become Camps; 6 Or 7 Thousand Jailed.

Rome, May 2.—(AP)—Troop trains rolled into Rome today upon their way to the front, and the city was everywhere the turmoil of last-minute preparation to make the welcome to the Nazi chieftain tomorrow night the greatest pageant in the ancient city's history. Parks were closed to the public and converted into military camps. Merchants refused deliveries because their trucks could not move through downtown streets choked by soldiers, detectives and tourists.

SWISS NEUTRALITY PUT UP TO LEAGUE

Tiny Republic Asks To Be Freed From Obligations To Impose Punishments
Geneva, May 2 (AP)—The delicate problem of Swiss neutrality was discussed today by the League of Nations' top body when it was asked to consider a proposal to impose League penalties against aggressor nations.
Calling himself the "Guardian of the Alps," Switzerland referred pointedly to the fact that her powerful neighbors, Germany and Italy, no longer are in the League fold.
Switzerland declared she would support herself to the danger of attack, but she was obliged to go along with the League in applying economic sanctions against such Italy in an unsuccessful attempt to halt the Ethiopian conquest.
