

C. OF C. ASKS MINIMUM OF FEDERAL REGULATION

Also Announces Nation-wide Campaign To Seek Better Relations Between Labor And Managements.

Washington, May 6.—(AP)—The United States Chamber of Commerce today began a nationwide campaign to win support for a business improvement program based on a minimum of government regulation and on new employer relations with labor.

President George H. Davis of Kansas City, Mo., said just before the Chamber's annual convention closed:

"The real benefit of this meeting will come in how well you apply it locally."

He spoke after the delegates adopted resolutions asking a re-examination of all Federal measures for recovery from the disastrous depression of the last eight years have fallen short in their objectives.

The resolutions proposed Congressional investigations of the Wagner Labor Act under which the national labor relations board functions, and of the railroad revenue export markets for agricultural products.

Total Eclipse of the Moon Seen in U. S. on May 14

New York, May 6.—(AP)—For 51 minutes the night of May 14 the moon will be totally eclipsed over the entire United States and North America and over the western part of South America.

The earth's shadow will completely cover the moon at 3:18 a. m. eastern standard time and will start retreating at 4:49 a. m.

For the eastern part of the United States this means that the moon leaves the umbra at 9:11 a. m. and the penumbra at 6:43 a. m. eastern standard time. It sometimes still visible as a faint copper-colored ball. This color is the red halo of light which the moon makes around the earth at the time between daylight and darkness. To a person on the moon, this halo would be seen completely surrounding the earth. It is due to the same filtering of light by the earth's atmosphere which causes the red colors of sunset and sunrise.

NEW HAVEN ROAD AIR CONDITIONED

CARS TOTAL 611

Approaching its summer season, the New Haven railroad has now in regular service 611 air-conditioned coaches designed and equipped to make railroad transportation during the hot weather so comfortable for its passengers as an entire has been able to make it. When the summer schedule goes into effect, 49 additional air-conditioned Pullman cars will be added, making the total 660, and when new air-conditioned coaches recently ordered are delivered the total will rise to 710.

At the present time, before receiving its latest order of cars and although not comparable in size to several of the other Class I railroads, the New Haven has 11,168 air-conditioned cars on January 1 of this year had 11,168 air-conditioned passenger cars in operation. Of this number, 4,607 were provided by the Pullman Company.

In 1937, air-conditioning devices were installed in 3,000 passenger cars of which 2,411 were owned by the railroad and 600 by the Pullman Company. This equipment included sleeping cars, lounge cars, and other classes of passenger cars. More than 1,500 varieties of plants bloom in the park during the spring.

Liechtenstein Is Worried Over Threat of Nazism

Vaduz, Liechtenstein—(Correspondent's Special)—Liechtenstein is very worried. Germany's absorption of Austria led a strong aggressive Austria to the ruling house and to hold the chief of the princely government, the government party's position over the decision to remain independent is at least "precarious."

Despite a four-year-old law making the wearing of party uniforms, armbands or other political insignia punishable by 1,000 francs (about \$230) fine and six months' imprisonment, Nazi sentiment is growing. It is finding favor especially among young people.

The emigration of Jews from the principality, which became something of a haven for them after the war and the rise of the Nazis in Germany, is another consequence of the annexation of Austria.

One Jew, who had applied for citizenship and paid 50,000 francs (about \$6,000) for it, as provided by the laws of Liechtenstein, has been refused citizenship and the right of Jewish capital has become proscribed.

Nicaraguans are going back to their coasts and discarding the traffic regulations introduced by the annexation of the country. In the announcement of this change, it was said the Legislature had voted to preserve Liechtenstein.
