11 MEN ARRESTED AFTER A RAID ON COVENTRY STILLS

Bootleg Outfit Capable Of Cheating Government Out Of \$2,000 A Day In Taxes; More Arrests Expected

Hartford, May 9.—(AP)—The number of arrests made in the largest raid in Connecticut in several years against revenue violators was raised to 11 today with half a dozen more expected in various parts of the state.

Arraignments were begun here today before U. S. Commissioner William J. Whelan following the roundup early Sunday of an alleged bootleg ring which operated two stills in Coventry of a total capacity of 1,200 gallons.

The bootleg outfit was capable of cheating the government out of \$2,000 a day in liquor taxes and Harold L. Henneberry, head of the Federal Alcohol Tax Unit, who with 16 agents and six state police seized the still on the Coventry farm owned by Peter Cappetta, of Hartford.

In a concerted sweep made in three towns at the same time the local and state police together with Federal agents arrested three men in Coventry, three in Hartford and five in New Britain.

A tenth man escaped in a desperate chase when they were within 40 feet of his car, both automobiles traveling at 70 miles an hour in Coventry. The unidentified fugitive jammed on his brakes and leaped out as the car left the road and demolished a stone wall.

Long Investigation.

The raid was the result of weeks of undercover work and was aided by four agents from the Boston alcohol tax office. Eight cars including three trucks were seized. Total capacity of the vat containing fermenting mash was 10,000 gallons.

Today the equipment had been removed or destroyed.

Demore and Demore were arrested at Telmott and West streets in New Britain, in a car containing 22 five-gallon cans of alleged alcohol.

CHINA REPORTS NEW SUCCESSES IN BATTLE ZONE

Guerrillas Continue To Harass Lines Of Communication; Japs Claim Two Minor Gains In Central Area

Shanghai, May 9.—(AP)—Stalled in their desperate and costly effort to reach Suichow from the north, the Japanese today reported rapid progress for two secondary thrusts from the south toward that nerve center of the Central China battle zone.

Japanese dispatches declared that two columns driving northward through central Anhwei province along the highway from Pengpu southwest to Suichow after a desperate battle.

Another column moving up the Tientsin-Pukow railway was apprehended near Suichow, a Japanese army spokesman said. This force had gained 20 miles in 48 hours.

Suichow, junction of the Tientsin-Pukow and the Hankow-Linghai railway, is the prize for which Japan and China have been contending nearly five months.

But the Japanese could report no progress for their primary offensive in southern Shantung province, where they met a major reverse at Tachichung April 6 and where renewed drive has been checked bloodily on almost the same battlefield.

Chinese said they had repulsed savage Japanese attacks between Tachichung and Pihon to the east using tanks and smokecreens.

Reports from Hankow, temporary Chinese capital, reported heavy Chinese successes from Chinese guerrillas in their war of harassment against Japanese armies in north China.

Great Wall Crossed.

The Rumanian foreign minister said that a mobile column said to have crossed the Great Wall where it intersects the Peiping-Suichow railway northwest of Feng and is to be advanced to Changping, only 20 miles from the ancient capital. HITLER ON VISIT TO MEDIEVAL CITY

Spending The Day In Florence Before Leaving Italy; His Talk With Il Duce.

Rome, May 9.—(AP)—Germany's Fuehrer Hitler earlier today from Rome today fresh assurance of Italian friendship and high fascists indicated this included a pledge by Premier Mussolini to let him have a free hand in Czechoslovakia, so far as Italy is concerned.

After six days of military display princely entertainment and intensive talks with Premier Mussolini, Hitler's program allowed him ten hours to take the rich, medieval culture of Florence.

The day was a national holiday, second anniversary of the foundation of the Italo-Ethiopian empire, helping to swell the crowds along his route to the Tuscan capital.

It appeared that the major result of the Hitler visit was a strengthening of friendship by application of German to possible trouble spots in the Rome-Berlin Axis. Hitler's gains were believed to be the pledge by Premier Mussolini to let him the freedom he would want in Czechoslovakia, where he would see the German minority population of \$3,500,000, of which Hitler himself is himself the ultimate protector; postponement of Mussolini's ideas about a peace pact (Italy, Germany, France, Britain); and an assurance that neither the new Italo-Ethiopian nor the Rome-Berlin Axis.

Mussolini was believed to have requested from Hitler recognition of an economic and political link in Central Europe, and a promise to let his Austrian traffic as a consequence of Austria's absorption by Germany.

Hitler, in addition, and to the disappointment of some of his followers, renounced any design on German population in the Italian South Tyrol, before the war a part of Austria.

The German Fuehrer made his assurance of the present frontiers between Germany and Italy at Zurich night's state dinner, a high-point of the visit.

THOUSANDS VIEW BIG ARMY PLANES

Airport Jammed As Visitors Look Over Bombers To Be Used In War Games.

Hartford, May 9.—(AP)—Giant bombers and sleek, attack planes roared away from Hartford airport today in a display of military might to thousands of spectators.

LEAGUE COUNCIL TO RECOGNIZE DUCE'S CLAIMS

Majority Of Members Reported As Favorable; Britain And France Co-operate In Drafting Final Plan.

Geneva, May 9.—(AP)—A majority of the League of Nations Council members was reported today as favorable to granting France and Great Britain freedom to recognize the Italian conquest of Ethiopia.

"Realistic" diplomacy, as the French and British term their current policy of temporizing with Premier Mussolini, appeared to have swayed the League Council at its opening session, against Emperor Haile Selassie.

If the British and French gain their points, as is expected, it will be tantamount to ousting the exiled Ethiopian ruler and his conquered African state from League membership.

Vicount Halifax, the British foreign secretary, and Georges Bonnet, French foreign minister, drew the plan which could be voted down only by a majority of the Council.

And only five of the thirteen nations were "on the fence" when Halifax and Bonnet sent the plan around for Council consideration before its formal presentation at the Council's closed meeting set for today.

These five nations were Iran, Soviet Russia, China, New Zealand and Bolivia.

Statement of Fact.

If the Franco-British plan carries, it means the Council will pass either a recommendation or make a mere "statement of fact," according to all league members, their freedom to recognize Italian conquest of Ethiopia if they choose.

Fifty of these League members voted to take restraining action against Italy in the days before treaty-making, when the League was trying to check Mussolini's encroachment on African territory.

Selassie to Be Present.

Haile Selassie, anxious to bring to his empty title of "King of Kings," Selassie to come to Geneva with his legal experts to fight the powers which once snatched him in his opposition to Italy.

The odds, however, were overwhelmingly against him. Both French and British expressed the belief that nothing could arrest the play of the "stacked deck" they were using at Geneva.

It was the Rumanian foreign minister, M. Comares, was chosen by Halifax and Bonnet to present their petition to the Council League sources said.

MRS. JOYCE DENIES GUILT IN MERRITT TRANSACTION

Surrenders To The Superior Court In Bridgeport; Says She's Innocent Of Charges

Bridgeport, May 9.—(AP)—Mrs. Joyce M. Merritt, 25, of Greenwich, rendered herself in the clerk's office of Superior Court here at noon today and was placed under arrest on two indictments brought by the Merritt Highway Grand Jury charging her with common law conspiracy to defraud the state.

In a statement to reporters after she was arrested, Mrs. Joyce, who is completely absorbed in her work, said she would be absolved of the charges.

Appearing at the clerk's office with her attorney, Abraham Weinstein of New Haven, Mrs. Joyce was arrested by Sgt. William Thomas E. Abbott and was then freed upon furnishing \$5,000 surety bond.

Mrs. Joyce was charged by the grand jury with conspiring with G. Leroy Kemp, former state agent, and others in three real estate deals for the \$25,000,000 Parkway.

"Two real estate transactions are the basis for the criticism of my business conduct," Mrs. Joyce told the newsmen. "Because of them, I and Mr. and Mrs. Norton Hurst have been indicted. I want to say without the slightest reservation that I am absolutely innocent of any wrong doing, legally or morally."

"Mr. and Mrs. Hurst appeared in those transactions solely as an accommodation to me and while I feel badly over the fact that I am charged with a crime, it grieves me more to find that they were charged with anything when I know that what they did was entirely justifiable."

The indictment by the Grand Jury came as a terrible shock to Mrs. Merritt. "I am certain that we will be completely absolved, I came up here voluntarily because I have nothing to fear."

The nine physicians—eye, brain and chest—will meet in a conference at the Garfield Park community hospital where the five weeks old infant is confined.

Attorney Samuel A. Hoffman, a spokesman for the family, said the specialists will decide whether to operate for the removal of both eyes; remove only the left eye and have the right eye fitted with a glass.

Washington, May 9.—(AP)—Chairman O'Connor (D., N. Y.) of the rules committee proposed today that the House expedite action on the controversial Wage-Hour bill.
