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CHURCHILL IN NEW PLEA FOR 10 POWER PACT

Suggests Scheme Of Keep Armed Peace Based On League Covenant; Would Protect Smaller Nations.

London, May 10.—(AP)—British's rebellious Tory, Winston Churchill, stepped forward today as the nation's new champion of international idealism and offered a plan for armed peace based upon League of Nations principles.

The fighting wartime chief of British sea forces, in a speech at Manchester last night, touched off a country-wide campaign to whip together a non-party movement dedicated to formation of a ten-power entente with the League Covenant as its guiding star.

The Manchester gathering was the first of a series under the guidance of the powerful League of Nations Union calling on the world—Churchill's words—to "arm and stand by the covenant."

Churchill said he would like to see France and Britain "go to all the smaller states that are menaced, that are going to be devoured one by one by Nazi tyranny and say to them 'We aren't going to help you if you aren't going to help ourselves. Are you prepared to take special service in defense of the Covenant?'"

The states he listed as possible members of the Entente were Yugoslavia, Rumania, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria, Greece and Turkey—with the way left open for aid from Soviet Russia in the event of war.

Italy May Help

He expressed the belief that Italy also might cooperate eventually in such an alliance, adding "we could get as far as that, the war danger would be removed, perhaps that would signal her encouragement and sympathy."

Formation of a combination of nations "for mutual defense against probable aggressors," Churchill said, was a "highest moral duty and virtue."

"We must gather together around the joint strength of Britain and France and under authority of a League of Nations prepared to resist and if possible prevent acts of violent aggression," he declared.

Path to Safety

"There is the path to safety and there is the only guarantee of peace," he said.

He scathingly condemned any peace pact with Germany which might return her war-torn colonies or result in muzzling the British press.

"That policy," he asserted, "is one which in my view would be disgraceful and disastrous. In the first place it would lead us straight to war. We should be helped to meet the present emergency by gagging, apparently consenting spectators to the horrors which would spread through Central Europe."

The press gave the elder statesman's speech a cool reception, some reporting it curtly and others lengthily but buried among obituary notices in the liberal News Chronicle recognized his plea with editorial comment.

"Churchill has given a magnificent answer to the question which has surrounded the country's leadership," the News Chronicle said. "The News Chronicle said: 'The News Chronicle has sounded well and an echo to millions of British homes now dismayed by government feebleness.'"

Ultimate success of Churchill's plan would mean defeat of the Conservative Government, overthrow of Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain or an upheaval in government policy.

SENATOR BRIDGES SCORES SPENDING

Declares It Is Vote-Buying Scheme Of The New Deal; Says It Is A Swindle.

Concord, N. H., May 10.—(AP)—U. S. Senator H. Styles Bridges of New Hampshire today turned governmental spending under the New Deal into a vote-buying scheme and said it was a swindle.

In an address prepared for delivery before a gathering sponsored by the Republican Women's Club of New Hampshire, Bridges asserted many New Deal measures have been enacted to save President Roosevelt's face.

"Franklin D. Roosevelt," he said, "has one chief characteristic of the Oriental—his face must be saved. Not once has he admitted he was wrong. Not once in nearly six years has he allowed to be corrected. Something has always been done to save his face and meet the face-saving gestures have

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LEAGUE ASKED TO AID CHINA AGAINST JAPS

Dr. Koo Hints That Only One Nation Has Done Any- thing To Help China To Resist The Invaders.

Geneva, May 10.—(AP)—Dr. V. K. Wellington Koo, Chinese delegate to the League of Nations, today asked the League Council to apply provisions of the Covenant in giving China aid against Japan.

He cited two resolutions, one by the League Assembly last October and another by the Council in February, which recommended that League members consider individual aid to China.

"With one exception, the aid none of the League members has come to China's aid. He did not name the country which had supplied the help, but it was believed to be Soviet Russia.

"China expects to receive from other members of the League material aid and effective cooperation in restraining the forces of aggression," he declared.

"Such aid and cooperation is more urgent because it will hasten the termination of hostilities and insure the defeat of the forces of disorder and violence."

"In the name of my government I ask the Council to apply provisions of the Covenant and implement the resolutions of the assembly and council with concrete measures."

Would End War

"By such action, Japanese aggression with all its horrors and cruelty may effectively be brought to an early end and the principles of the world, indispensable for the establishment of durable peace in the world, may be fully vindicated."

Earlier British Foreign Secretary Council that the recent Anglo-Italian agreement was a contribution to world peace, thereby aiding the cause for which the League was built.

The talk Britain was followed by France's foreign minister, Georges Bonnet, who echoed his words in support of the French-Italian agreement which still is under negotiation.

Lord Halifax said the fact that Britain and Italy were able to reach an agreement entitled both to claim a contribution "to the cause of international peace, thereby strengthening the League of Nations and the society which it represents."

Among the facts Halifax cited in support of the agreement was President Roosevelt's statement on the subject which the British foreign secretary said was "appreciating to his Majesty's government."

President Roosevelt said April 19 that the United States government viewed conclusion of the agreement "with sympathetic interest."

He was born in Washington 32 years ago, the son of the late Admiral Royal Rodney Ingersoll.

He was educated at the Naval Academy and during the World War received the Navy Cross for his work in organizing the communication system of the Navy Department.

In 1923 he accompanied Admiral Standley to the London naval conference which resulted in the Anglo-Italian agreement.

Ingersoll's present home is at LaPorte, Ind.

CAPT. INGERSOLL WINS PROMOTION

Chief Of Navy's War Plans Division To Be Made A Rear Admiral; His Record

Washington, May 10.—(AP)—Three Japanese columns advanced steadily northward toward the vital Lanchow railway today as five new divisions of troops were sent to the front.

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BIG SPENDING BILL SUPPLIES JOBS FOR 4 MILLION PERSONS

House Body Reports On The Measure Which Is Being Pushed Toward Passage As Quickly As Possible.

Washington, May 10.—(AP)—The administration's \$3,000,000,000 spending-lending bill will provide jobs for 4,135,000 persons, the House Appropriations committee estimated today.

The committee included that figure in its report recommending enactment of the bill, submitted shortly before the House began debate on the measure.

The primary purpose of the legislation, the report said, is to furnish direct employment away from the site of work, for some of the millions who are unemployed and destitute or hounded by the specters that haunt the destitute group.

The committee conceded there might be disappointment because of its failure to set aside specific types of work, in definite areas, "marking of the funds with reference to individual projects, localities or groups or otherwise would tend to down the program and defeat the primary urgent end and aim of the entire program."

Breaking down the job total, the report said an average of 2,500,000 would be employed by the Works Progress Administration for the period of the fiscal year ending next January 31; 1,000,000 by the Public Works Administration for the period of the 1939 fiscal year and 60,000 on Federal public buildings.

Other Jobs Provided

In addition to the 4,135,000 total, already approved for the Civilian Conservation Corps would provide employment for 200,000 individuals in the next fiscal year, while 500,000 more people would obtain work on general public works carried out under regular appropriations to the War Relocation Authority.

House passage of the big lending measure became the administration's immediate intent on adjournment by mid-June. They predicted little opposition outside Republican ranks.

BRITAIN REPORTS NEW AIR SERVICE

Making Survey For Landing Fields In Pacific Between Canada And New Zealand

London, May 10.—(AP)—The British government announced in the House of Commons today it was considering establishment of an air service across the Pacific ocean from Canada to New Zealand.

Negotiations already are underway with the Dominion and also with the United States over ownership of certain Pacific islands along the proposed route, A. J. Murray, undersecretary of state for air, announced.

He was replying to Abraham Lorne, conservative, who had asked whether "in view of British interests it is proposed to establish an air service from Canada to New Zealand and Australia; and whether any and what steps have been taken in the matter."

Murray said "tentative discussions have taken place with government of the Dominion concerning preliminary surveys are being made on a number of Pacific islands which might be suitable as landing fields."

"The matter will be further considered in connection with development of Imperial air routes," he said.

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New Star Is Discovered; May Be Earth's Nearest

Williams Bay, Wis., May 10.—(AP)—A star new to the astronomical charts claimed attention today because it was the nearest one to the earth.

The star's existence was disclosed by spectra obtained by Prof. G. P. Kuiper of the University of Chicago's Yerkes Observatory here.

Dr. Kuiper said the star, "probably is either the nearest or the second nearest star in space."

It has been designated Wolf 424 and is of the 12th visual magnitude.

Dr. Kuiper said the star is about 25 light years away.

Alpha Centauri heretofore has been the nearest star known.

The probable distance of Wolf 424 was computed at 3.7 light years less than that of Alpha Centauri.
