**THREE ANESTHETISTS ON HOSPITAL STAFF**  
Last Year There Were 1,071 Operations Requiring Presence of Anesthetist.  
The Memorial hospital now has two registered anesthetists and one assistant anesthetist on the staff in readiness day or night, for this important duty in connection with the class A hospital service. Previously there was but one anesthetist on duty and such relief service as was required was performed by the resident or interns physicians, according to the annual report. This arrangement was not entirely satisfactory. These changes have made it possible for the operating surgeon or obstetrician to have an anesthetist present at any hour of the day or night and the arrangement has been satisfactory from all angles.  
Last year there were 1,071 operations in which the services of an anesthetist were required, an increase of 108 over the previous year.  
During 1933 a new McCosson gas machine has been added to the service.  
Miss Beatrice Carlson, R.N., is the regular anesthetist and Miss Doris L. Hutchinson, supervisor of nurses, and former anesthetist, shares the operating room service with Miss Carlson. Dr. Ralph M. Towell of Hartford was appointed chief of the department of anesthetics last July.
