ABOR BOARD WINS IN SUPREME COURT IN MACKAY DISPUTE

Highest Tribunal Decides Workers Are Entitled To Protection If They Strike FLASHES! Because Of Unfairness. MEXICAN STUDENTS RIOT

Washington, May 16.—(AP)—
The Supreme Court ruled today that working men, who strike as a result of an unfair labor practice by their employer, are entitled to protection of the National Labor Relations Act.
This decision was given in upholding an order by the National Labor Relations Board directing the Mackay Radio and Telegraph company to reinstate five employes who had gone on strike in San Francisco.

MEXICAN STUDENTS RIOT

Mexico City. May 16—(AP)—Several persons were wounded today in a clash between students and several hundred members of an organization known as "Socialist Youth" who had occupied buildings of the University of Mexico.

The "Socialist Youth" force, armed with pistols and knives, seized buildings of the university and its preparatory school early this morning and resisted efforts of police and firemen to eject them.
