Race or System? By A. L. Felt

Today's Guest Editor: Many of us would be glad to express our views upon public questions...

As to whether the writer will be able to qualify according to the qualifications mentioned...

I hardly think that it is really possible to discuss any public question and leave both the question and the taxpayer as well informed readers.

Someone has rightly said that religion is what man thinks about God and of course there are as many kinds of thoughts as there are people, and Christians, and what God thinks about man, and God knows this creature which He has made in His own image and likeness.

Personally I am very much inclined to believe that what we need is a mixture of a lot of real Christianity and a very little politics to make this old world a better place to live in.

If the above mentioned definition of religion is acceptable then it would be possible for us to safely discuss an article which appeared in the Herald recently regarding the Miller's treatment of the Jews in their present economic difficulties...

If the news has come to us correctly through the newspapers then it is true that just about the time of the World War the Germans at least those who had control of the arm of the government, dedicated themselves emphatically in favor of the private ownership and control of the means of life as against that political party which was at that time advocating the government ownership and control of the means of production and distribution of the means of life.

If the private ownership of the few individual business men is paramount to the interests of the people as a whole, then why complain if the Jew is a Jew better business man than the rest of us and gets control of the largest percentage of the wealth of the country?

What reason has Germany or Italy or believe that the other Gentile capitalists has the interests of the general public at heart any more than the Jew, and if this plan of the individual ownership and control of the means of life was wrought disaster to the welfare of the German people then it might be well to look to our own back yard and see if we will not have the same thing to face some day in the very near future if we do not have that problem on our hands right now.

Of course it is not good politics or religion either to permit any small group of individuals to monopolize the means of life for their own personal benefit when it works against the interests of the people as a whole, and neither is it right to blame all of the consequences of this system upon the Jew just because he is the strongest competitor, when competition is entrenched as "the life of trade."

It looks to me as though the whole world will sooner or later be up against the same proposition and will be compelled to decide whether to leave the interests of society as a whole to the tender mercies of a few of the strongest competitors who have learned the habit of looking out for their own individual interests first, last and always, or else come to the realization that we are in need of a government that is righteous enough to take over the ownership and control of that which the people as a whole need for their inalienable rights to life and liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

FARRINGTON CASE: There are a great many people in the state of Connecticut who are not yet ready to see the discipline in school classrooms set aside in the name of "individualistic" or "self-determinative" freedom of the pupil. It comes as a welcome relief to the "Windsor school case" then, to learn that the other side of the coin has been returned to a verdict in favor of Principal Farris at Windsor.

As to whether the writer will be able to qualify according to the qualifications mentioned in the case, it has in the past been very difficult for him to get an article published in a religious paper or magazine because there was too much religion in it.

If the above mentioned definition of religion is acceptable then it would be possible for us to safely discuss an article which appeared in the Herald recently regarding the Miller's treatment of the Jews in their present economic difficulties...

If the news has come to us correctly through the newspapers then it is true that just about the time of the World War the Germans at least those who had control of the arm of the government, dedicated themselves emphatically in favor of the private ownership and control of the means of life as against that political party which was at that time advocating the government ownership and control of the means of production and distribution of the means of life.

If the private ownership of the few individual business men is paramount to the interests of the people as a whole, then why complain if the Jew is a Jew better business man than the rest of us and gets control of the largest percentage of the wealth of the country?

What reason has Germany or Italy or believe that the other Gentile capitalists has the interests of the general public at heart any more than the Jew, and if this plan of the individual ownership and control of the means of life was wrought disaster to the welfare of the German people then it might be well to look to our own back yard and see if we will not have the same thing to face some day in the very near future if we do not have that problem on our hands right now.

Of course it is not good politics or religion either to permit any small group of individuals to monopolize the means of life for their own personal benefit when it works against the interests of the people as a whole, and neither is it right to blame all of the consequences of this system upon the Jew just because he is the strongest competitor, when competition is entrenched as "the life of trade."

It looks to me as though the whole world will sooner or later be up against the same proposition and will be compelled to decide whether to leave the interests of society as a whole to the tender mercies of a few of the strongest competitors who have learned the habit of looking out for their own individual interests first, last and always, or else come to the realization that we are in need of a government that is righteous enough to take over the ownership and control of that which the people as a whole need for their inalienable rights to life and liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

FARRINGTON CASE: There are a great many people in the state of Connecticut who are not yet ready to see the discipline in school classrooms set aside in the name of "individualistic" or "self-determinative" freedom of the pupil. It comes as a welcome relief to the "Windsor school case" then, to learn that the other side of the coin has been returned to a verdict in favor of Principal Farris at Windsor.

As to whether the writer will be able to qualify according to the qualifications mentioned in the case, it has in the past been very difficult for him to get an article published in a religious paper or magazine because there was too much religion in it.

I hardly think that it is really possible to discuss any public question and leave both the question and the taxpayer as well informed readers.

Someone has rightly said that religion is what man thinks about God and of course there are as many kinds of thoughts as there are people, and Christians, and what God thinks about man, and God knows this creature which He has made in His own image and likeness.

Personally I am very much inclined to believe that what we need is a mixture of a lot of real Christianity and a very little politics to make this old world a better place to live in.
