## REPORTS CZECH PLANES FLYING ACROSS BORDER

### German News Agency Says Frontier Rules Have Been Broken Five Times Within The Last 24 Hours.

Berlin, May 25.—(AP)—Reports that Czechoslovak military planes have flown over German territory have caused the German government to lodge a strong protest at Prague. Deutsches Nachrichtenbüro (D. N. B.), official German news agency, today reported five alleged border violations by Czechoslovak planes within the last 24 hours. Dr. Ernst Eisner, minister to Prague, laid the matter before Foreign Minister Kautil Krotka, who expressed regret and added that everything was being done to prevent recurrence of the reported violations. (Prague reported these assurances were given in an interview at the Czechoslovak foreign office last night.) German anger flared up at what Berlin newspapers called brazen provocations by the Czechoslovak side. A time German was observing the strictest reserve. The Bozen newspaper said the Czechs were following a "policy of pin pricks" and declared the border violations could only have been committed on order of the Prague government.

### Tension Increased

Tension along the German-Czech border was increased by the funeral at Eger, just inside Czechoslovakia, of two Sudeten Germans shot Saturday in a border incident. Reichsführer Hitler's wreaths of pine branches were prominently displayed on the coffin. Latest of the border violations reported by D. N. B. was said to have occurred northeast of Vienna. The agency said an armed Czechoslovak plane was sighted at Jesenopolen on the March river, where Germans are erecting dams against floods. It said the plane flew at 600 feet over the river, which marks the German-Czech boundary, photographed the dams and returned to Czechoslovak territory. Earlier D. N. B. in a Dresden dispatch said Czechoslovak military or police planes had been sighted over German territory at three points.

### GERMANS' FUNERAL

Eger, Czechoslovakia, May 25.—(AP)—Fifty thousand Sudeten Germans lining the streets of this ancient town today bowed in silent tribute as coffins of two of their fellow-citizens were taken to a solemn procession—each coffin bearing a wreath from Adolf Hitler. All shops of Eger, called the most German city in Czechoslovakia, were closed during the funeral. Black flags fluttered from windows of centuries-old houses. Order was preserved along the cobble-stoned streets by Sudeten German party men in uniform—riding bicycles and on foot. Reinforcements consisting of 200 Czechoslovak gendarmes were sent to Eger as a precaution, but on orders from the Prague government.

### BARKLEY ENDORSED BY HEAD OF C. I. O.

Washington, May 25.—(AP)—C. I. O. chairman John L. Lewis urged organized labor today to support Senator Arthur W. Barker for Kentucky, the administration leader, in his renomination battle against Gov. A. B. Chandler. An endorsement by Lewis in his capacity as chairman of labor's Non-Partisan League was made public at Lexington, Ky., shortly after he conferred here yesterday on campaign to select the Democratic ticket in Pennsylvania.

### Lewis Urges Organized Labor To Support Kentucky Senator In The Primary.

Informed persons indicated the Lewis faction wanted recognition of its strength and prestige in the state before giving its active support to the Pennsylvania nomination. Referring to Barker as "a veteran of the United States as an effective legislator," Lewis was quoted as saying: "It is recognized as one of the nation's leading statesmen, liberal in his viewpoint and cooperative in his attitude toward legislation in the interests of labor and the common people." ## TEN PERSONS DIE AS BIG AIRLINER CRASHES IN OHIO

### Pilots, Stewardess And Seven Passengers Are Killed; Flames Destroy Wreck; Accident Still A Mystery.

Cleveland, May 25.—(AP)—Firemen lay the bodies of nine men and a woman on the bottom of a muddy ravine today alongside the torn and charred remains of a twin-engine airplane which plummeted inexplicably to earth only eight miles from a scheduled landing. The two pilots, the stewardess and all seven passengers, died as flames leapt at the wreckage of the United Air Lines ship, bound from Newark to Chicago via Cleveland. Among the passengers was John Brostrom, Republican state chairman.

## HOUSE PASSES WAGE BILL BY BIG MAJORITY

### But Measure Facing Stiff Opposition From Southern Senators; Barkley Is Now Seeking Compromise

Washington, May 25.—(AP)—The revamped wage-hour bill, swept through the House by a triumphant combination of northern Democrats and Republicans, encountered last-ditch opposition today from southern Senators. Senator Barkley (D., Ky.), the administration leader, said he would seek to have a Senate-House committee appointed at once in an effort to work out a compromise between the House bill and the version passed by the Senate last July. There were indications, however, that Senate foes of the inflexible labor standards in the House measure would try to route it back to the Senate labor committee. Senator Thomas (D., Utah), chairman of that group, has contended the legislation should establish variations in wages between the north and the south or between industries where conditions warrant. Although there has been no definite opposition to a Senate filibuster, opponents made no secret of their hope that imminent adjournment would prevent agreement on any wage-hour bill.

### Smashing Victory.

Proponents of the legislation scored a smashing victory in the House last night, showing the measure to final passage by a vote of 214 to 97 just about a year after the original version reached Congress. Forty-six Republicans joined 226 Democrats, 7 Progressives and 3 Farmer-Laborites in favoring the bill. Opposing it were 56 Democrats and 41 Republicans.

### Government Action Discounts Reports Mexican Revolt Is Nearing An End

Mexico City, May 25.—(AP)—The Mexican government today ordered fresh troops into San Luis Potosi state and acted to cut off retreat of the rebel chief, General Lázaro Cardenas, northward. The vote was a reversal of a House decision last December when Republicans and southern Democrats shelved a different wage-hour bill. The new measure was forced to the floor over the opposition of the rule committee.

Arthur E. Morgan, former chairman of the TVA, testified before a congressional committee today that "collusion, conspiracy and mismanagement" had characterized the administration of TVA, the tall, gray-haired former chairman said. Morgan charged that the TVA directors falsified a report on TVA negotiations for the purchase of utility properties owned by the Commonwealth and Southern Corporation.

A. E. Morgan, ousted chairman of the TVA, testified before a ten-man congressional inquiry committee, elaborating on charges he had made previously against the other two directors. After making a general charge that "collusion, conspiracy and mismanagement" had characterized the administration of TVA, the tall, gray-haired former chairman said, Lillenthal made a "persistent attempt" to convince the public that Commonwealth and Southern was "arbitrarily refusing to sell its properties."

**U. S. Missioners in China Present Serious Problems**

Shanghai.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—To the American missionaries in China, the greatest organized effort of the kind in the world, the Chinese-Japanese war has brought serious problems, both present and future, and an abundance of work and danger for individual missionaries.

Many of the 6,000 American missionaries have been directly involved in war risks and hardships. Mission property has been bombed and shelled. Mission compounds have been harrowed against fighting just outside their walls. Some missionaries have seen their towns more than once.

A few missionaries have met violent deaths since the war began but nearly all these were due to isolated affairs well behind the battle lines. This is in contrast to the Boxer uprising of 1900, in which missionaries and members of their families were slain.

The end of the war is sure to bring new problems, no matter who wins. Victory for the Japanese would mean the extensive foreign missionary influence tested against Japanese and Chinese influences. Plans for spreading their "new culture" in China.

Chinese victory, experienced observers believe, may see the regular withdrawal of Chinese national consciousness. Manifestations of this spirit are the free of foreign interests and failure to distinguish between the foreign missionary and the foreign business man, brought missionary killings in 1927.

Either way, therefore, the 643,000 investment in China of fraternal states, missionaries and philanthropic societies, with an expenditure of millions of dollars annually, may be vitally affected by the policies of China's post-war management.
