## PRAHA STUDIES NEW PROPOSALS TO END CRISIS

### Czech Officials Continue Talks With Envoy Of France And Britain In An Effort To Halt Trouble.

Praha, May 26.—(AP)—The Czechoslovak government today studied new French and British suggestions designed to terminate the crisis arising from the demands of the Sudeten German minority and Adolf Hitler's "protectorate" over them.

Stefan Ousek, minister to Paris, returned last night by plane and reported at once to Foreign Minister Kamil Krofta. They conferred again today.

Jan Masaryk, minister to London, returned by air this afternoon to confer with both Krofta and President Eduard Benes.

It was understood that both Ousek and Masaryk brought renewed assurances of Anglo-French support but these were accompanied by undiminished emphasis on the necessity of a concession to the Sudetens whom the German Fuehrer had said he would protect from "outraging."

(In London it was reported Britain had scouted out both Germany and Czechoslovakia on a plan to place British observers in their troubled border region as a means to easing tension and giving Britain unbiased reports to guide her peace-making efforts.)

### Was Well Handled

Diplomatic quarters in Praha expressed satisfaction with the way the government handled yesterday's difficult situation at Eger when two Sudetens, killed last Saturday by border guards, were given a comprehensive funeral. The aggressive tone of funeral speeches by two Sudeten deputies, Karl Hermann Frank and Ernst Frettinger, it was hoped that another meeting between the Sudeten Fuehrer, Konrad Henlein, and Premier Milan Hodza could be arranged before the week-end.

Officials also were pleased by the comparatively calm progress of diplomatic exchanges. German Minister Franz Eisenlohr has visited the foreign office almost daily in the past four days and thus far he and Krofta have managed to keep the conversations on a fairly friendly basis.

### Leading Citizens Selected To Sponsor The Project; Building To Seat 4,500.

Hartford, May 26.—(AP)—Hartford is to have a winter sports arena, an ample and comprehensive plant that will render the same service to indoor sports as the Bushnell Memorial does in the city's cultural life.

The Hartford Auditorium Company, sponsors of this project, will have seven leading Hartford citizens as its advisory committee—Charles E. Cook, vice president and general manager of the Royal Typewriter Company; Francis S. Murphy, publisher, Hartford Times; Henry H. Conland, publisher, Hartford Courant; Leon P. Broadhurst, president of the Phoenix State Bank; M. E. Little, president of the M. S. Little Manufacturing Company; Seth Hadfield, of Hadfield, Rowell, Soule and Coates; and by Remsen V. Ogilby, president of Trinity College.

They will supervise the expenditure of all moneys in connection with the erection of the structure and will have supervision of all the contracts in that connection to emphasize the civic tone of the project and to offer guarantee to the stockholders that their money will be honestly and efficiently administered.

### Plans For Arena

The plan, made public today, contemplates a steel, concrete and brick building on the east side of Wetfieldfield avenue, just south of Mendow street, a site selected because of its moderate realty value joined with its accessibility from all sections of the city and from surrounding towns.

White hockey will be the keynote activity in this arena with membership fees incorporated in the general plan—boxing, wrestling, public ice skating, automobile shows, etc.

Hines, 51-year-old former blacksmith, was the first "higher up" whom District Attorney Thomas E. Dewey has prosecuted in his three year warfare against racketeers. He has charged the existence of an alliance between New York crime and politics.

## GIRDLER EXPLAINS PRICE OF STEEL

### Head Of Republic Corpora- tion Says Present Costs Force Them To Keep Up.

New York, May 26.—(AP)—T. M. Girdler, president of the American Iron and Steel Institute, said today the price of steel has not declined in recent months "simply because each producer knows his price can't come down in the face of present costs."

Addressing the Institute's annual meeting, Girdler, who is chairman of the Republic Corporation, declared:

"Unfortunately, the problem of adequate profits is one that the (steel) industry is finding ever more difficult to solve. That is true not only in bad times, but in better times as well. The reason is not hard to discover. It lies in the fact that costs have climbed up to the roof. It seems, however, frozen there."

Unmistakably that fact, the industry is so-called infeasible because of so-called infeasible prices. Some critics, most of them pseudo-economists, with only a faint knowledge of the steel industry, are fond of pointing to the price of agricultural and certain other products on the one hand and the price of steel on the other as evidence that the industry, by monopolistic
