Arthur Dale Homesteads, W. Va., May 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt announced at the Arthur Dale homestead school commencement exercises today that he would permit the five billion dollar tax bill to become law without his signature.

"If I sign the bill," Mr. Roosevelt said in his address to the Arthur Dale homesteaders and to the nation over the radio, "and I have until midnight tonight to sign it—many people will think I approve the abandonment of an important principle of American taxation."

"If I veto the bill it will prevent many of the desirable features of it from going into effect."
