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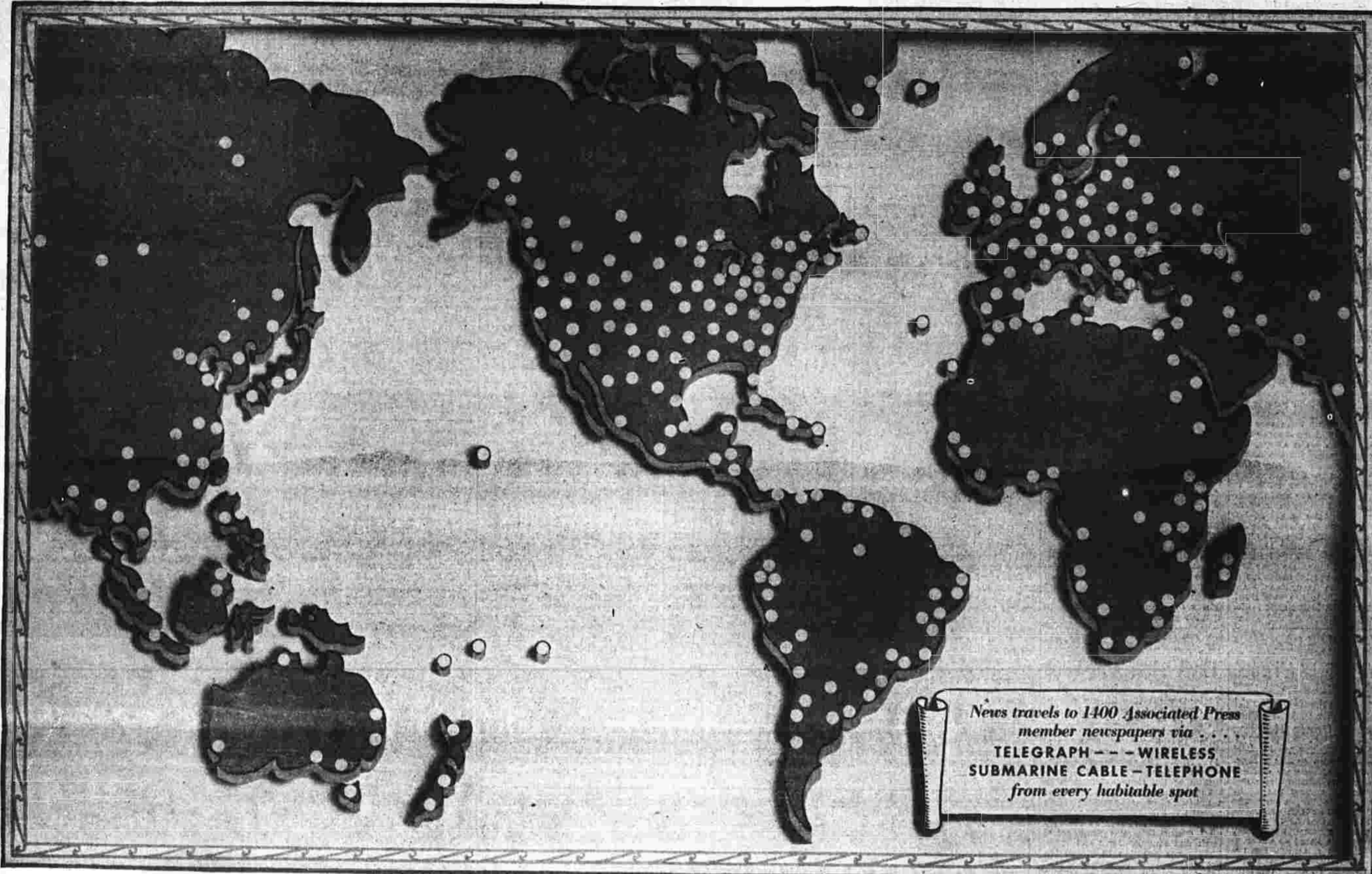

BREAK DEADLOCK, GOVERNORS URGED

Senator Walsh Calls On New England Chief Executives To Act On Flood Control.

Washington, May 31—(AP)—Senator Walsh (D. Mass.) called today upon the governors of Vermont, New Hampshire, Massachusetts and Connecticut to break the deadlock between their states and the Federal government over power rights which have blocked Congressional ratification of their flood control compact since last August.

Walsh proposed that the governors ask Secretary of War Woodruff to determine whether power is economically justified at the proposed dam and reservoir.

Walsh said if the secretary found power was not involved, the states and the government could proceed with flood control work without resorting to the compact.

By agreement among the states as to allocation of costs, already determined in the compact, Walsh said the states could acquire the lands and rights-of-way and instruct Army engineers to start work.

The state would retain title to the land, he continued, and the question of power would be eliminated.

Walsh saw "no middle ground" for a compromise between the states and Federal government on the issue of power rights and title in the compact.

He did not believe there was any immediate chance of starting work on any reservoir where the secretary of war might report power development feasible.

The same controversy over power rights and title would crop up, he said, where any potential power was reported.

BOY SCOUTS COMMITTEE TO MEET AT CAMP

Plan To Make Site Available For More Camping Opportunities For District Troops.

Rockville, May 31—A meeting of the Rockville District Committee of Boy Scouts will be held this evening at seven o'clock at the camp site on Mile Hill. In case of rain, the meeting will be held at the Police Court room.

Following the meeting held last week, it was announced that additional opportunities would be given this year for the Scouts to enjoy camping. At the present time there are six troops in the district, three in Rockville and one each in Vernon, Ellington and Broad Street.

Some time ago a building was erected on the plot of land which the Rockville Fish and Game Club set aside for the use of the Boy Scouts. This building has been used for a mess hall and for overnight camps. The building is now in need of repairs and there is considerable additional material on hand.

The suggestion has been made that the District committee purchase the site for use as a camp for each troop instead of erecting a building, and the material at the Camp site could be used for floors for the tents. If the tents were purchased, they could be used for only at the Camp site, but also at Broad Street if a District Scout Camp were held there at least year.

A committee was appointed including Rev. Dr. George S. Brooks, Arthur E. Chatterton and Mr. Nielson of Vernon to investigate the suggestions made and to report at the meeting tonight. Definite action will be taken tonight and also there will be a discussion in regard to the District Camp.

Common Council Meeting
At the meeting of the Common Council to be held this evening, it is expected that a decision will be made in regard to the proposed city ordinance regarding peddlers, itinerant vendors and junk dealers. The ordinance has been under consideration for some time and was drafted at the request of merchants.

These merchants desire additional protection against this part of outside competition. The licensing of peddlers to the Police Captain and the City Clerk would be required to keep a record of all licenses issued and make a monthly report to the City Treasurer, but they would receive no additional compensation for such duties.

The proposed ordinance requires peddlers to take a license out for one year instead of monthly as has been the case. The fee would be \$20. The year license would also be given to peddlers who come only during the summer months and skip the rest of the year.

The regulations for the junk dealers require each dealer having a license for each team of vehicles used and their hours shall be from 7 a. m. to 5 p. m. The fee will be \$2 a year for each team or other vehicle. Badges would also be given to junk dealers which must be worn in plain sight while they conduct their business and a number must also be placed on their vehicle.
