CULBERTSON IS LOSER IN SUIT IN TOP COURT

Conn. Court Of Errors Reverses Judge Booth, Gives Former Owners Foreclosure On Ridgefield Estate.

Hartford, June 1.—(AP)—In a three-to-two decision bludgeoned on technically in the \$75,000 mortgage on the palatial Ridgefield estate of Ely Culbertson, the supreme Court of Errors today reversed Judge John Rufus Booth's dismissal of Superior Court foreclosure proceedings brought against the noted bridge expert by the former owners of his estate.

The court ordered a new trial of the foreclosure suit which the trustees of the estate of the late Frederick E. Lewis of Ridgefield instituted after Culbertson refused to reimburse them for a \$337 premium for \$121,600 in fire insurance.

Chief Justice Mathias and Justices Avery and Brown held that the insurance premium for the protection of the mortgaged premises was a charge against Culbertson to pay the insurance. Justice Jennings and Hinman dissented, claiming that there was no such agreement and that Culbertson was justified in refusing payment especially in view of the disproportion of the amount of insurance to that of the debt.

Fears for the child's safety increased after \$10,000 ransom money paid by the father, prospering gas-station chain proprietor, failed to bring his return as promised by the kidnapers.

SEIZE A MAN OUT OF CROWD IN CASH CASE

G-Men Grab Spectator At Home Of Kidnaped Boy, Rush Him Toward Miami; Scant Hope Child Is Alive.

Princeton, Fla., June 1.—(AP)—Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation emerged from the home of James Bailey Cash, Sr., today, seized a spectator standing in a crowd a hundred yards away and rushed him off in an automobile. The car headed toward Miami before the crowd, numbering about 400, realized what was taking place. Five minutes later Sheriff D. C. Coleman and several deputies, who arrived here this morning to start an intensive search of the neighborhood for five-year-old James Cash, Jr., kidnaped Saturday night, sped off in the opposite direction toward Homestead, a village a few miles south.

U. S. DEMANDS RETURN OF PROPERTY SEIZED, RETAINED BY JAPANESE

Strong Note Declares Infringement Of Rights Of Owners In China Is Giving Government Increasing Concern—Sees No Reason For Interference.

Washington, June 1.—(AP)—The United States demanded today that "Japan take immediate steps to restore American properties in China to their rightful owners."

In a strong note presented Ambassador Joseph C. Grew to Japanese Foreign Minister Ugaki, the Japanese were told that their "infringement of and interference with American rights in China" was "giving the government of the United States increasing concern."

It was pointed out that while Japanese civilians have been permitted to enter and do business in areas from which the Sino-Jap conflict has moved on American businessmen and missionaries have been denied permission not only to resume their former residences but even to visit their holdings.

The State Department officials estimated that over 800 Americans have been waiting in Shanghai for many months to get permission to return to their properties in the Yangtze valley, including Nanjing.

PRESIDENT URGES SPEED IN CREATING NEW JOBS

Asserts That Unemployment Situation Has Grown More Serious Since His Message Was Delivered.

Washington, June 1.—(AP)—President Roosevelt asked today that Congress impose "no restrictions" over the administration of relief funds provided in the \$3,247,000,000 spending bill.

In a letter to Senator Adams (D., Colo.), floor manager for the relief bill, Mr. Roosevelt asserted that the unemployment situation has "grown worse" since he sent his relief message to Congress six weeks ago.

"Emergency employment, therefore, should come right away, instead of being delayed," the President said, adding:

"It is the gap existing now that we want to fill. Therefore, I greatly hope that the emergency appropriation bill in its final form will put no restrictions on the immediate starting of works projects, and that it will make possible the selection of those projects which can be got under way most speedily."

Hand To Hand Fighting As Spanish Rebels Move For The Capture Of Valencia

Hendaye, France.—(AT the Spanish Front)—June 1.—(AP)—Intensified scaled precipitous movements on the front east of Teruel today led to hand-to-hand fighting with government militiamen in a general offensive aimed at the capture of Valencia.

On land and in the air, the fighting in this new drive by General Francisco Franco's army assured proportions equal in severity to any in the nearly two-year-old civil war. His warplanes pounded cities and concentrations on the eastern coast while the full power of his infantry, cavalry, and artillery slowly dislodged government troops from their beleaguered positions north of the highway that reaches from Teruel to Sagunto and Valencia.

Reports reaching the frontier said the death toll from yesterday's fighting was in the thousands, 15 miles north of Barcelona, would be three or four times as many.

Farmer Lugs Own Coffin; Hopes To Crash Movies

Hugo, Okla., June 1.—(AP)—Grizzled Chas Hunter shoved his own hand-witted pine coffin down the road toward Hollywood, and he hopes to make a million dollars.

When night overtakes him, he will crawl under the ornate lid of his casket and snugly go to sleep.

The 55-year-old farmer and deputy sheriff said today he had a dream and a "warning of death" came to him.

NEARLY TWO MILLIONS WON BY 23 AMERICANS

Held Tickets On Three First Horses In English Derby; Total United States Winnings Over 3 Millions.

New York, June 1.—(AP)—Twenty-three first-horse Sweepstakes tickets held in the United States won \$1,925,000 on the running of the English Derby at Epsom Downs today.

This bigged the total winnings to \$1,925,000 on the race and previous drawings from the Sweepstakes drum to \$3,920,000.

Americans had paid about \$6,800,000 for their hopes for sudden wealth.

Each of five of the 23 tickets of winning horses bore their owners \$150,000 when Bob Roscoe came in first.

Scottish Union, second, won \$75,000 each for 11 tickets held in the United States.

The favored Paech, finishing third, returned \$50,000 each on seven American-bred tickets.

The winnings were paid from a total of \$1,925,000, and \$750,000 of our government in the interest of the race.

The \$1,925,000 won in the race, including \$33 other tickets held in the United States on horses that did not start or failed to finish.

REORGANIZATION NEXT BIG ISSUE

Plan Abandoned For This Session Of Congress, But May Come Up Next Year.

Washington, June 1.—(AP)—Government reorganization became an issue today for the next Congress—and possibly for the November elections.

Congressional leaders, with the approval of President Roosevelt, formally abandoned for this session the legislation which had aroused nationwide controversy and resulted in a major defeat for the administration.

A statement issued yesterday by Senator Byrnes (D., S. C.) and Representative Warren (D., N. C.), chairmen of the Senate and House Reorganization committees, said some form of a reorganization bill would be placed before the next Congress.

"It is our opinion that the American people overwhelmingly desire some kind of effective reorganization of our government in the interest of greater efficiency and pretentious economy," their statement said.

Some legislation declared, however, that the people clearly did not want reorganization legislation in the form recently considered by the administration.

The Japanese, the communication added, have refused permits "on the ground that peace and order have not been sufficiently restored."
