SENATOR HAGEARTY CALLED TO TESTIFY BY WATERBURY JURY

New Britain Democrat Introduced Bill Which Resulted In The Recent Arrest Of Five Legislators.

Waterbury, June 14.—(AP)—State Senator William E. Hagearty who introduced the bill in the 1933 General Assembly in connection with which five legislators were recently arrested on bribery charges was called as the first witness today before the Waterbury Grand Jury.

The New Britain Democrat, a state senator since 1931, was the only witness reporting to the jury area as the Grand Jury investigation was resumed following a 15-day recess.

Hagearty, one of a group of Democrats long allied with Mayor Thomas J. Spillay of Hartford, introduced the bill in the 1933 session which called for the installation of certain sterilizing equipment in public rest rooms.

Five present or former legislators were arrested last week on charges of accepting bribes from City Councilman Daniel J. Leary of Waterbury for their efforts on behalf of the bill, which, the jury said, was introduced "apparently for the purpose of creating a monopoly" for a corporation Leary controlled.

One, former Senator Nathan D. Spiro of Danbury, pleaded guilty and was fined \$1,000. Others surrendered.

Senators Matthew A. Daly of New Haven and Joseph H. Lewis of Waterbury, Rep. John D. Thoms of Waterbury and former Sen. Deane R. B. Shikany of Stamford, whose names were on the list of legislators who were arrested for accepting bribes for the passage of the bill, were the second group of defendants arrested as a result of the jury's report.

Previously Lieut. Gov. Frank Hayes, also mayor of Waterbury, Leary and 25 others were arrested on charges of conspiring to defraud the city of over a million dollars.

Nicholas Mona, jailer at the New Haven county jail, came to the jury area as reports were current that the secret body was investigated at the last Waterbury municipal election.

Mona, jailer for the last three years, has been active in Democratic politics for some time and formerly was registrar of vital statistics in New Haven.

The jailer said he had no idea why he had been summoned and remarked that he never had occasion to visit Waterbury.

Before calling Mona the jury was closed along with Special Prosecutor Hugh M. Alcorn, presumably to confer on his course.

YELLOW RIVER FLOOD THREAT TO JAPANESE

Occupied Region, Lines Of Communications Are Menaced; Own Bombings Helped To Break River Dikes.

Shanghai, June 14.—(AP)—Flood waters cascading through breached dikes of the mighty Yellow River blocked the Japanese before Cheungchow today, while engineers familiar with the ways of the moderate stream feared one of the greatest catastrophes of the century would result.

Chinese reports from the front said the Japanese had been forced to retreat as far as Kai-geng, 43 miles east of Cheungchow on the Longhai railway.

These reports said the boiling yellow water was ten feet deep north of Cheungchow, about 25 miles east of Cheungchow, that numerous villages were inundated and that the flood was two and three feet deep at several points where it crossed the Longhai railway.

URGE PROMPT APPROVAL OF WAGE, HOUR MEASURE

Administration Leaders Request Senate And House To Act On Compromise Before Congress Adjourns

Washington, June 14.—(AP)—Administration leaders asked the Senate and House to give prompt approval today to compromise on the wage-hour and relief bills, last major legislation before the 75th Congress.

If no hitch develops on those measures, they said, a host of important bills can be cleaned up in time for adjournment about mid-July.

Members already were making train reservations and packing their office records into government-provided chests so that they will have no time in getting home to campaign for reelection.

The program arranged by the President's lieutenants called for the House to act this afternoon on the wage-hour compromise.

Leaders expected to go through the bill on Friday.

GOVERNOR DEMANDS ACTION ON CHARGE

Earle, Of Pennsylvania, Asks That Enemies Arrest Members Of His Cabinet.

Harrisburg, Pa., June 14.—(AP)—Governor George H. Earle, answering moves for a Grand Jury probe of charges filed at his administration during the recent primary election, today demanded that his cabinet members be arrested.

Only a few hours after the State Supreme Court yesterday delayed its ruling on a petition for writ of habeas corpus filed by the cabinet members, Earle said in a radio address, "I demand that the cabinet members be arrested and held in custody until they have answered to me for their conduct during the recent primary election."

Earle said he had no doubt that the cabinet members were guilty of some crime, but he said he had no proof of it.

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JUDGE BALDWIN RULES ACCUSED MAY INSPECT GRAND JURY EVIDENCE

Here Is Complete Text Of Court's Decision

Decision Unprecedented In State's History Based On Kemp's Appeal In Parkway Case—May Have An Important Bearing On The Waterbury Investigation.

Bridgeport, June 14.—(AP)—The Superior Court Judge Alfred C. Baldwin ruled today that an accused person has the right to inspect certain Extraordinary Grand Jury evidence—a decision unprecedented in the state's history.

The ruling, based on one of three defense motions filed by counsel for G. Leroy Kemp of Mount Vernon, N. Y., former state highway land agent indicted by the Merritt Parkway Grand Jury, was regarded as extremely important in Connecticut where another Grand Jury is proceeding in Waterbury.

Kemp and eight others were indicted on conspiracy charges in connection with the purchase of rights of way for the \$25,000,000 super highway through Fairfield county to the New York state line.

Judge Baldwin denied two other motions by Kemp's counsel, John Keogh, who had asked a change of venue and a joint trial with the other defendants.

Kemp, not in court, was reported ill at his Mount Vernon home, when Judge Baldwin handed down the decision from the bench.

Immediately after the judge's decision to permit Kemp and his counsel to inspect the evidence produced before the Grand Jury insofar as such evidence relates to the accused and the offense with which he is charged, including the testimony of the accused, State Attorney Lorin W. Willis asked for time to "determine my next step" which was granted.

The state's prosecutor said he would decide whether to appeal to the Connecticut Supreme Court or Errors later today.

The unprecedented decision was believed to have paved the way for a similar request to be made in his ruling. Judge Baldwin pointed out that the decision does not give the accused the right to inspect any minutes or records of any of the deliberations or any vote or votes of the grand jury.

The jurist emphasized the fact that although it is the policy of the law to require the utmost secrecy as to Grand Jury proceedings while the accused had, in seeking the purposes of this policy of the law are largely accomplished, as far as concerns the evidence adduced before the secret body, after the indictment or presentment has been found and published, the custody of the accused had, and the Grand Jury finally discharged.

The rule of secrecy concerning matters transpiring in the jury room, it has been said, is not designed for the protection of witnesses before the Grand Jury, but for the protection of the public interest in the administration of justice.

He wrote that "this case has advanced to that stage where the disclosure of secrecy insofar as the evidence produced before the Grand Jury relating to this accused is concerned, has substantially met its purpose."

The state had insisted that the right of inspection is contrary to law and is a violation of the principle of secrecy of proceedings of the Grand Jury and in conflict with the public interest.

NO RETALIATION FOR SHIP RAIDS

SAYS PREMIER As Chamberlain Promises No Action; Recall Of Eden, Critic Of Cabinet, Hinted.

London, June 14.—(AP)—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the House of Commons today that Britain planned no retaliation against the bombings of British shipping in the Mediterranean but was trying to work out a system of safety zones to end the attacks which normally is filled by German men production.

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1 Highball Warms Fingers, Three Warm Your Toes

San Francisco, June 14.—It takes heat, for example, only the fingers are likely to warm. But at 75 the fingers, but at least three to warm your toes.

There is a curious fact about man's "cooling system," the action of the skin of face, hands and feet in regulating his temperature, came to light in medical studies shown today at the American Medical Association's scientific exhibit.

The reason for the temperature changes in the extremities is vasodilation or constriction, opening and closing of the small blood vessels, either to give off heat, or to prevent loss of heat when the temperature is high.

Cigarette smoking has one of the quickest effects in cooling the skin of the fingers. Why it causes the face to warm up, getting rid of heat from the body, is rather shrewd, quick in all the work the "cooling system" has to do for one highball.

Eating a meal has exactly the same effect, except that the time is much slower. The Mayo experiments showed that finger temperature starts a rather sharp, quick rise in about an hour and a half after a meal. What kind of meal helps to make no difference. There is no more finger heating from a "high protein" dinner than from any other meal.

The loss also rise in temperature after a meal, provided nature has been cured by surgery.
