Boston, June 17—(AP) — Commissioner Joseph B. Eastman of the Interstate Commerce Commission urged today that "warring factions" be brought into line under one "responsible leadership" to save the railroad industry from ruin.

"It is the duty of the government to accomplish this result," Eastman told the Harvard Business School Alumni Association.

Describing the railroads as "desperately sick, financially speaking," Eastman sald that employes, security holders, shippers and the government "must put their shoulders to the wheel."

"On the other hand," he added, "if all these interests continue to divide themselves into warring camps, they will most certainly bring ruin to the industry.

"We have suffered from a deficiency in transportation leadership or statesmanship.

"Nor can we look for leadership to any group with special interests, whether they be executives, employes, shippers, investors or financiers.
