

# China's Sorrow

TTANKOW is China's "Chicago." It is much farther inland than Nanking and since the fall of Nanking has been the Chinese government's headquarters and the Japanese invaders' goal.

There are three main routes to Hankow: (1) A railroad from Canton, a southern port, (2) A railroad from the north. (3) The Yangtze river. The Japanese have attacked rom the air and striving to open a new route of their own by moving troops overland between the northern railroad and the Yangtze.

On the Canton route: The Chinese have been getting upplies via Canton. Japanese have combed Canton relentlessly, Such bombardments have been de-nounced by U. S. Secretary of State Hull, to discourage sale of American-made bombers to Japan. And the Japanese have expressed regret that Americans in Canton were en-

On the northern route: The railroad entering Hankow

from the north crosses the Yellow river ("China's Sorrow") near Chengchow. That river's dikes have been destroyed and it swirled over hundreds of square miles this week, halting the Japanese and drowning Chinese. 




