PREMIER LAUDS ITALY AS PLANE BOMBS 2 SHIPS

Mussolini Keen For Operation Of Pact, Says Chamberlain; Bomb Italy's Island Base—Lloyd George

London, June 22.—(AP)—Prime Minister Chamberlain told the House of Commons today that Italy was anxious to put into effect the Anglo-Italian agreement covering Mediterranean issues but denied that Rome was trying to "drive a wedge" between Britain and France.

From Chamberlain's previous statements it was clear Britain would do nothing to retaliate for the repeated sinkings of British ships by planes which the London government believes to be Italian craft in the service of the Spanish insurgents. The latest victims were the freighters Thorpeness and Sun-ton.

Efforts for Truce Before Chamberlain spoke in the House the cabinet met, presumably to discuss the prime minister's efforts to convince Premier Mussolini that he should join in efforts to bring about a truce in the Spanish civil war.

Addressing Commons the prime minister said that in the course of exchange between Rome and London "the Italian government have made plain their desire in which the British government participate, that the agreement should be brought into force at the earliest possible moment consistent with fulfillment of the prerequisite conditions."

Interpret "Settlement" The conditions mentioned included "settlement" of the Spanish war which diplomats have believed to mean an insurgent victory ending the conflict.

Arthur Henderson, laborite, who was doing the questioning, asked "whether in view of the fact that the Italian government have suspended the discussions which they were having with the French government, the premier will give assurance to the House that the Italian government will not be allowed to drive a wedge between France and ourselves."

Chamberlain replied: "I have no reason to think the Italian government wish to drive a wedge between ourselves and the French."

The British minister assembled as the determined prime minister every day to convince it. Due to that a Spanish war truce entered the sole hope of curtailing what had been Europe's most bitter spot for nearly two years.

But Mussolini's Chamberlain's friend in the thus far "inoperative" Anglo-British pact of April 16—was believed to be unimpressed by the prime minister's arguments.

JUDGE INGLIS MUST RULE ON HIS OWN ACTION

In Novel Position From Protest On Alcorn; 5 Defendants Do Not File Motions In The Brass City Cases.

Waterbury, June 22.—(AP)—The legality of the appointment of Hugh M. Alcorn as special prosecutor before the Waterbury Grand Jury remained today a matter for Superior Court Judge Ernest A. Inglis, who himself made the appointment, to decide. Placed in the unusual position of having to rule upon the validity of one of his own actions, Judge Inglis reserved more than an hour to arguments by Alcorn and Thomas P. McDonough of New Britain, attorney for Alcorn's brother, before the grand jury.

McDonough based his argument that Alcorn was named to the post without statutory authority on the contention that such an officer could be named by the court only if a cause was pending before it at the time.

"Silly," says Alcorn. "Defending his right to serve as special prosecutor, Alcorn termed McDonough's argument 'absolutely and perfectly silly' and said that if the court had been powerless to appoint a special prosecutor, then Judge Inglis, Kelly and the rest of the gang who milked the city of Waterbury over a million dollars in the past six years could go their joyous, unimpeded, unharmed and unmolested."

Leut. Gov. Frank Hayes, also mayor of the city, Daniel J. Leary, former city comptroller, and Kelly, who are the five defendants in the grand jury cases, were among 27 men charged by the grand jury investigating municipal affairs with conspiracy to defraud the city.

Alcorn was appointed special prosecutor after state's Attorney Lawrence Lewis and his assistant, McDonough argued that such designation was not legal, and that even if it had been proper, then State's Attorney Daniel H. Hoyt of New Haven, or his assistant, should have been appointed.

NAVY SPEEDS UP BUILDING PLANS

Construction Of Fleet Expansion To Start At Once; Funds For 39 Warships.

Washington, June 22.—(AP)—The Navy accelerated its warship construction program today by authorizing the start of the \$400,000,000 fleet expansion act.

The three-year 60-year-old program, three submarines, three destroyers, three destroyers, three fleet tugs, and the propelling machinery for a fleet of 39 warships. Two of the six destroyers expected to cost \$2,000,000 each, were authorized in the act to expand the fleet by 20 per cent. The others were approved in earlier legislation.

The award of contracts, expected in a few days, will speed up naval construction toward a rate unmatched since World War days.

About July 1, officials said the Navy will ask bids on either two or four battleships, costing \$70,000,000 or more each, and probably on other warships.

Bids have been asked July 27 on the six destroyers, three fleet tugs, and a small mine sweeper, and on Sept. 21 on a 3,500-ton seaplane tender and a 4,000-ton destroyer tender. Fifty-nine vessels, ranging 1,500 to 10,000 tons, are included. (Continued on Page Two.)

POLICE GUARDING HOME OF AMERICAN HEIRESS

London Reports Kidnap Threats Against Baby Son Of Former Barbara Hutton; Details Kept Secret.

London, June 22.—(AP)—Silent guards watched the stately mansion of Countess Barbara Hutton Haugwitz-Reventlow from behind locked gates today after reported kidnap threats against the baby son of the five-and-a-half-year-old heiress who fled the United States because "of a frightful American kidnap."

The Countess merely said she had taken "certain precautions" to insure the child's safety. Her attorney said it was impossible to give a statement at the moment "for legal reasons."

Scotland Yard authorities said they had provided no special guards or other protection and disclaimed knowledge of a kidnap threat. An official said he had no "confirmation" that the late Royce R. Copeland, but he did not directly deny the report.

SENATORS DALY, LAWLOR, THOMS SUBMIT PLEAS

Answer "Not Guilty" To Charge Of Taking Bribe; Hickey To Plead Later Today; Demurrer Overruled

Hartford, June 22.—(AP)—State Senators Matthew A. Daly of West Haven and Joseph H. Lawlor of Waterbury and Rep. John D. Thoms, also of Waterbury, pleaded innocent today in Superior Court to charges of accepting a bribe for supporting certain legislation before the 1935 General Assembly.

Former Rep. Daniel F. Hickey of Stamford, accused of a similar charge, will be put to plea later today.

Daly, Lawlor and Thoms personally put in their pleas of "not guilty" after Judge Robert L. Stungger had overruled demurrers filed by Thoms and Hickey attacking the information on the ground that it did not specify that a crime had been committed.

No date was fixed for trial, but trial during the term of the Attorney Hugh M. Alcorn is busy with other work including the Waterbury Grand Jury probe.

Result of Pleas The result from the report of the Waterbury grand jury. Immediately after Daly, Lawlor and Thoms had entered their pleas, clerk of the court, J. H. Stungger, asked the court if it could be understood that the accused would be tried by jury, which was their alternative.

James W. Carpenter of Hartford, counsel for Thoms, told the court that as far as his client was concerned, the decision of trial by court was final.

"We want a trial as soon as we can get it," he said. Both Carpenter and Frank Rich, Stamford counsel for Hickey, in their arguments on the demurrers contended that the information has to charge there was an agreement.

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PWA BEGINS LENDING, SPENDING; APPROVES NEARLY 300 PROJECTS

Over 41 Millions In Grants And Nine Millions In Loans Allowed; Construction Work Will Be Allocated Daily To Put Men On Jobs In The Nation.

Washington, June 22.—(AP)—The Public Works Administration began its 1938 spending-lending program today with allotments of \$41,652,717 in grants and \$9,021,000 of loans for 291 projects.

Howard A. Gray, assistant administrator, said the 291 projects would involve \$98,520,374 of construction. The grants were for 45 per cent of the cost and the loans for 65 per cent. The difference between the total of loans and grants and total of construction cost, Gray said, would be made up by the applicants.

Six grants fell in the million dollar class but the vast majority were from a few thousand to as much as a half million.

In Million Dollar Class Others in the "million dollar" group were Fort Wayne, Ind., with a grant of \$2,322,000 for \$3,160,000 of sewerage improvement; Miami, Fla., with a grant of \$1,200,000 and a loan of \$2,800,000 for harbor development; Jacksonville, Fla., a grant of \$1,674,450 for \$2,112,175 of canal construction; Shelter Island, N. Y., \$1,637,181 of grants and \$890,000 of loans for highway bridges costing \$3,527,181; and Natchez, Miss., grant of \$1,250,000 for a \$2,500,000 bridge.

President Roosevelt even before he signed the \$1,700,000,000 spending-lending bill late yesterday at Hyde Park, N. Y. His pen strokes were the signal for PWA and all Federal spending agencies to swing into action with their programs of details of which have been ready for weeks.

Public works officials said this week's projects were being taken from nearly 5,000 applications held over from the old PWA program of the last five years. They had been approved but could not go forward because of lack of funds.

New applications were expected to bring the total to about 4,000, or enough to produce \$2,000,000,000 of construction by June 30, 1940.

The work progress administration, which received \$1,425,000,000 in the spending-lending bill, also prepared to put new funds into operation, but on a more limited scale.

Work relief rolls, which have been increasing at the rate of about 30,000 persons a week, are near the 2,800,000 average which Administration Secretary Harry Hopkins said he expected to carry with a possible maximum of 3,000,000.

The new funds are supposed to last until next March. "This money," WPA officials said, "is to be looked upon as additional funds to keep us going in our present stride and we intend to carry on without fuss or feathers."

The \$25,000,000 inserted in the WPA appropriation for direct relief will be subject to Presidential order and probably will be held for emergencies.

None believed it would be used at once for the relief of cities, such as Chicago and Cleveland, which have exhausted local relief funds and failed to get additional appropriations from the state legislatures.

KENNEDY TALKS ON IRISH PACT

U. S. Envoy to Britain Lauds Premier Chamberlain's Part of the Transaction.

Boston, June 22.—(AP)—Great Britain's settlement of the Irish question today was described by Joseph P. Kennedy, ambassador to England, as "the outstanding achievement of British statesmanship in the last 200 years."

The ambassador said at a press conference that the effect of the settlement went far beyond the composition of the Irish difficulties because it proved to the world that when Prime Minister Chamberlain sets out to make a bargain, he concludes a fair agreement.

He said that when Great Britain made a trade "someone had to pay the bill."

"Now," he said, "Mr. Chamberlain can do with his policy of dealing with dictators with a reputation for fair dealing established and no one can say to him while he is negotiating with others, 'If any American is really living in England, doing business there, and is a bona fide resident then I'll do something. I'll do it because it will be of some value, but I won't introduce many explosives or people like that who make a lot of money and then run out to England for the continent to live. That's out.'"

He added he would leave tomorrow afternoon for Washington to complete his report to the President, and would return next week to London.

SWATOW BOMBED TWICE BY JAPS

Warships Laid Several Hundred Marines Under Barrage; Flood Blocks Troops

Shanghai, June 22.—(AP)—Japanese planes twice bombed Swatow, Kwangtung province treaty port, 220 miles northwest of Canton, today while ten warships stood off the harbor.
