

EXPECT EARLY ACCEPTANCE OF PLAN ON SPAIN
27 Nations Join In Session Of Neutrality Group To Pass On Britain's Proposal To Count Foreigners

London, July 5.—(AP)—Early acceptance by Spanish insurgent Generalissimo Francisco Franco and Spanish government of a British plan to withdraw foreign volunteers from Spain was forecast today. The prediction was heard as representatives of 27 countries assembled for a full session of the European non-intervention committee under Viscount Halifax, British foreign secretary.

Upon adoption of the scheme, Great Britain will send a 70-page printed document detailing the project for withdrawing volunteers from Spain to both Spanish factions with the request for urgent consideration.

Francisco Ready to Accept
 Reports reaching London from Burgos, Franco's capital, said the generalissimo was prepared to accept the plan unconditionally upon receiving it.

Although Soviet Russia, made reservations to its acceptance of the project, other major powers accept the scheme after a year of haggling and frequent deadlocks necessitating many amendments to the original proposal.

Acceptance of the plan has vital significance for Great Britain and Italy. Both are anxious to get the Anglo-Italian friendship agreement signed April 16 working, but putting the pact into operation is conditional on "progress" in the withdrawal of volunteers from Spain.

The program for the withdrawal is operative. Two commissions will leave for Spain to count the number of volunteers on each side and make detailed arrangements for their departure from Spain.

When the commissions on each side are determined, a proportion will be withdrawn from the lesser side and rights will be granted both sides. Camps will be established near airports and withdrawn will take place at the rate of 500 men daily in shifts. The withdrawal is non-intervention commission.

This rate would mean that half of the volunteers would be granted rights over four weeks after the first contingent had left.

FRANCE, JAPAN AT ODDS OVER BASE ISLANDS
Japs May Protest French Seizure Of Parcels, Valuable As Seaplane Station; 2 Hankow Routes Hard

London, July 5.—(AP)—New diplomatic tension between France and Japan appeared likely today as a result of French occupation of the strategic Parcel Islands in the South China Sea, about 150 miles southeast of the Chinese island of Hainan which Japan has been reported planning to seize.

Reports from Tokyo said the Japanese foreign office was studying the situation with "great care." It was thought here that Japan might protest against occupation of the islands, which the Japanese contend belong to China.

Seaplane Base
 It was said at the foreign office, however, that the Parcel Islands serve as "excellent seaplane bases" and were seen here as a logical preparation for the occupation of Hainan, which dominates the Indo-China coast.

A group of French customs officials and policemen effected the occupation. The parcels in the islands, which are owned by an apparent Chinese, although Chinese people might have been there for generations.

France has been uneasy over Japanese intentions toward Hainan, because that island commands the eastern approach to Indo-China and is near the sea lanes between Hongkong and Singapore.

The British government disclosed on June 27 that Britain and France had agreed to joint action to demand the islands from Japan. The French foreign office said, however, that French warships were concentrating off Indo-China as a preliminary practice.

ON THE BATTLE FRONT
 Shanghai, July 5.—(AP)—The fighting which has been going on since the capture of Hankow, established positions today for another major effort to reach Hankow, provisions capital of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's government.

SEKING A HAVEN FOR GERMAN JEWS
South America And British Dominions Are Suggested, Conference Tomorrow

Washington, July 5.—(AP)—South America and the British dominions, in the opinion of the State Department, should be the principal havens for the oppressed Jews and other political refugees from Germany and Austria.

The transportation of the refugees should be financed in large part by private organizations of the allied nations such as the United States and Great Britain.

These ideas will be presented to the International Conference of Refugees convening tomorrow at Evian, France, on the call of Secretary of State Hull. Delegates of the nations will attempt to arrange a haven for the hundreds of thousands of persons seeking new homes.

 The United States will be represented by Myron C. Taylor, former head of the United States Relief Corporation. He is assisted by Robert Stettin, assistant secretary of the State Department, and George Le Brandt, former chief of the visa division of the State Department.

The United States can not take care of more than a small portion of the refugees, Secretary Hull said. He said that assistance was to be given within the framework of existing immigration laws.

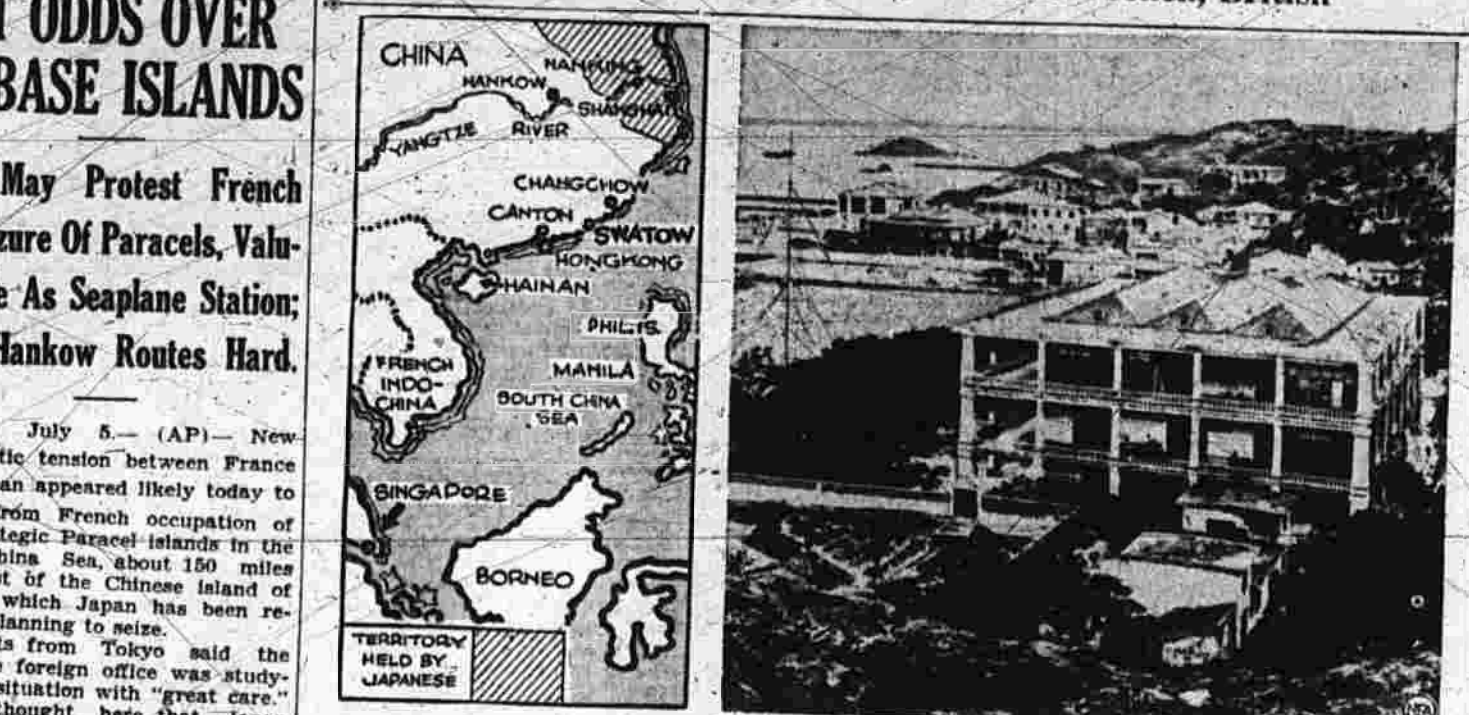

Washington, July 5.—(AP)—President Roosevelt starts today on a "journey to San Francisco which may become the most spectacular bit of political tough-boasting he ever has done. SPANISH REBELS REPORT VICTORY
Loyalists Almost Surrounded In Mountains After One Of Fiercest Battles

Hendaye, France.—(At the Spanish front)—July 5.—(AP)—The Spanish insurgents reported today that they had shattered government lines between the important Teruel-Medina del Campo highway in the Saragon region and put the militiamen to flight.

Dispatches from General Jose Vazquez said he had advanced twelve miles since his capture of the town of Sagunto. He also reported a slight formation of 300 anti-aircraft guns south of the highway was started Saturday.

Thousands of government troops defending almost-surrounded positions in the Unzueta mountains were in danger of being trapped.

On the extreme eastern bank of the 30-mile Castellan de la Piana front, along the Mediterranean coast, insurgents were reported to have stormed the heights dominating Nules, strategic city on the Sagunto, where the Teruel-Medina del Campo highway is a vital link.
